We goofed last week in the publication of the story about the inclusion of Sanderson in the teletype system over West Texas. The goof was not completely ours, nor was it a complete goof.

As the original story stated, the grant was for a teletype service to cover West Texas including Sanderson, It did not state that it was a sharing

And Sheriff Bill Cooksey, in relating all of the facts about the thing to us, was not at odds with the commissioners and their decision to not be a part of the wire system at this time. He said that he understood their problems, and they had more than just a few in trying to "budge" the budget and keep taxes within some bounds of reason.

The teletype system would have put Sanderson on a state wide service - which also has national connections - for information about law enforcement. There would have been regular incoming information about major crimes over the state where the criminal was not apprehended, and thus alert the officers of the state of the facts to aid in apprehension of the criminal. It also would have been available for answers to information needed locally for speedier handling of cases, such as determining if a car from out of state has been reported stolen, or if a person apprehended in wanted in some other town or state, and their criminal record, if any; and many other details pertaining to law enforcement.

But for right now, Terrell County, like many families within the county, is going to do without a convenience because, in the opinion of the purse -string -holders, they can't afford it.

We don't know a better way to run a county, or a family budget. We wish that some of those in other levels of government would take the same at-

We did read recently, again, and we have heard it before -"Aren't you glad you don't get as much government as you pay for?"

Teletype Service Is **Cost-Share Project**

The story of the grant of funds for the installation of a teletype system for West Texas towns, including Sanderson, was lacking in detail and the information was clarified by Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey follo lowing the release of the story last week.

The grant for the system was on a share basis between the county and the state. The county's share of the cost of the system was considered by the Terrell County Commissioners after a study to the details and presentation of the plan by heriff Cooksey. He related that the commissioners decided, after a lengthy study of the costs, benefits, and related circumstances, that they would not, at the present time, elect to be a part of the teletype system over West Texas. The sheriff stated that the commissioners explained that the cost of operation of the county government the cost of taxes presently, and their efforts to keep the costs of operations in line with the revenue and tooptevent, if possible, any tax increase in taxes, was their reason for declining the facility at this time. Cooksey explained that with a mutual understanding of the wants and problems of the commissioners and his department. there was also a mutual effort of cooperation and understanding of reasons for declining the teletype service,

Sheriff Cooksey explained that the offer to join the facility was available at any time the financial picture of the county permitted the expenditure in the eyes of the commissioners and they expressed a willingness to reconsider the project at some future date.





NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5) Special Election May 18, 1971

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or selfcare, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons; "(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate.

The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to co-operate with the Government of the United States in pro-viding assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE shall not exceed the amount LEGISLATURE OF THE that is matchable out of fed-state OF TEXAS: eral funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy

Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal con-dition of vision. Nothing here-in shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is s regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which elec-tion the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy dis-abled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."
