## Tif President Mixon In Holiday Policies

 The new Public Law 90-363. providing for Lincoin's and washinglon's Birthdays and Columbus Day to always honward not only for the general public but for the business community as well.Those holidays that fall in the middle of the work week are secking production and workchedules of most businesses We must continue to revise the days of our holidays so that they wh lall on Fridays and Mondays opermit uninterrupted four-day work schedules and three-day weekends.
Years ago, Thanksgiving was changed to Thursdays: why not change it again to Friday? As to July 4 , I suggest that we re shedule that holiday as "Indexandence Monday.
Holidays break down broadly to two kinds: those of national syificance and those of reli gious significance. The forme may be expected to lend themelves to the suggested accom modation relatively easily; the teigious holidays less so. Yet in he most sacred and solemn of Chistian observances-those of Good Friday and Easter Sunday -the principle of celebrating ates on specific days rather than dates is a hallowed tradition. So there may be a good reason to sope that eventually religious holidays, too, may blend into wach a reform.
Since my proposal is of great benefit to business, I believe pet to a long-range program of odding more holidays to increase the number of three-day long holiday weekends. Over a period of many years we may achieve the four-day work week everyone talks about. We all are tware of the inflationary probcrate if it's thrust upon ws can plan is non-inflationary us. My plan is non-inflationary, since dyy week by adding one fourfoilday each year.
