Eggs hatch in about one week, giving rise to a tiny The-millimeter-long larvae. The larvae live off the sap at first, and later the developing yucca fruit. In about a month the mature larvae emerges from its nest and lowers itself to the ground by means of a silken thread. Burrowing into the ground,
