Credit Card Holders Told Of Liability When Their Cards Are Lost or Stolen
Credit card holders are not
liable for any losses resulting from stolen or lost cards if
they notity the issuer of such
card before anthin in card before anything is
charged, according to int mation received last week.
This provision was stipulated in a law which was passed on January 24, 1971, according Also included in the provision $\$ 50.00$ even if the card is used before the holder notifies
the company issuing the card the company issuing the card
that the card has been lost. According to the informa in 1970 which the law passed liability of the courtesy card holder, stated that the issuing company must notify the holder of his liability and curnish the card holder "ith velope for reporting a lost or stolen card, and that withou such notification, the holder is not liable for any amount that is charged after his card ${ }^{1 s}$ lost or stolen.

 Incentive Checks by County Ranchers

Terrell County sheep and goat ranchers were mailed dratts April 9 in the amount
of $\$ 519,157.54$ as production incentive marketings during 1970 . The payment rates were the highest in the history of the program, 71 producers of shorn on 891,837 pounds of wool sold through normal trade channels. The rate of payment was 102. 8\%, the amount needed to bring the national average price up to
sired $72 \&$ per pound.
54 producers selling unshorn lambs received $\$ 56,896$. 48 on the sales of $4,112,846$ pounds at the rate of $\$ 1.46$ per hundredweight. The above mentioned producers in addition paid $\$ 16$,
415. 96 into the promotion fund administered by the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc. to promote the sale of wool and the improvement of the product through research. These funds a mount to $11 / 2 \mathrm{t}$ per pound for shorin weigh for ushorn hums.

April 30 Deadline For Mohair Vote
Mohair producers have until dum on continuation of the promotion for mahair and mohair products during 1971-73. If producers vote approval, culture will deduct of Agri-1 cents per pound from praducer price-support payments for mohair promotion by the Mo hair Council of America. The vote will decide the fate of the mohair promotion program for the next three years. fect the mohair support payment which was extended by law through 1973.
If producers accept a propos
ed new agreement reached by ed new agreement reached by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin and the Mohair Council of America, Inc
the Council will continue to use the payment deductions for advertising, promotion, and market development. The promotion program, authorized under the National Wool Act, was first approved in a
1967 referendum by $80 \%$ of the grow ers who voted.
The referendum is being conducted through the county offices of the Agricultural Stavilization and Conservation Service.
Any corporation, partnership or individual who owned An older, for at least 30 consec utive days during 1970 may vote. The agreement requires ap,roval by two-thirds of the total number of producers voting, or by producers account -
ing for two-thirds of the volume of mohair production
represented by the vote.
Ballots have been mailed to all known mohair producers in Terrell County. Any one who thinks he meets the requireballot should check with the county office in Alpine, Box 397, or call 915-837-2325. To be counted, ballots must
