It is our opinion that a section of advertising from Fort Stockton - for example - is a cooperation on our part to get people here to go over there to do their business. For this reason we have been rejecting these sections of advertising to pull all of our trade away from here. There is enough of it going away as it is, and we who are trying to keep all of it at home that we can have no business pushing it away.

There are lots of reasons in our opinion - for keeping as many of the trades and services as we can keep in Sanderson. Maybe all of our reasons are what some would call "selfish" on our part, but we like the business we can get from them and we are trying to respond in kind.

Bread is generally not a part of our diet, but we would hate to see the time come that you would have to drive to Fort Stockton to get a loaf of bread in an emergency. And that would happen if all at once or gradually everybody quit buying bread here.

And the same thing is true for adding machine paper and milk and aspirin and insurance and shirts and butane and oil and anything else you can think of.

And, too, we always wonder if merchants in towns of our area would appreciate the Sanderson merchants invading their pastures.

You might rebut with "it's a dog-eat-dog existance", and you would be right only if you consider all of us as dogs. We still like to think of our potential and real customers as people".



She and Nancy Harkins, the doubles' team in tennis, won the tournaments at Iraan and Fort Davis, their district UIL matches, and are going to Austin this week to play in the state finals. As a basketball player, she averaged 25 points per game last season and 22 points per game in distict competition. She was named to the all-tournament teams at Iraan and McCamey, and was outstanding forward at the Alpine tournament.

Barton Harkins was named most valuable in boys' tennis, having placed second at the Iraan tournament, winning the Fort Davis tournament, and won the privilege of reresenting Sanderson High School at regional competition in Lubbock.

Peggy Louwien was named the outstanding member of the girls' track team. She ran on three relay teams which qualified at district competition, and was on the mile relay team which qualified for the state finals.

Manuel Olivas was named most valuable player of the football team. He scored 86 points during the season, gained 1,023 yards offensively, intercepted 15 passes, and was captain of the 1970 team. He was named all-district defensively and on the second offensive team, and was also named to the All West-Texas defensive team. He was also named most valuable member of the track team. He was a member of the 440-relay team and has gained the state level in the 440 and 220 dashes, in which he will compete in Austin this week. Leslie Hall is the winner of the most valuable title in basketball for the boys. He had an 11.6 average points per game for the season, and a total shooting percentage of 49%. He was named to the All-Tournament team at Iraan, and was on the second all-district team. He served as a co-captain of the cagers in the season past.


Sanderson won the 440-yard relay with Ja Chriesman, Danny Montalvo, Carlos Munoz, and Frank Luevano.


