The amendments include one to create a state ethics commission empowered to set
rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, state officers, and legislative officers, to investigate violations there of, and to recommend compensa-
tion for members of the Lesislature and the lieutenant governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process. Also, the amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of ine Legislat:Ire.
Another amendment is for removing the limitation on the total state appropriations for assistance grants for the needy blind and setting a 1 im-
itation on total state appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. The fourth amendment to be voted on May is is to author 000 (one hundred million dollars) in bonds to provide financial assistance to citles and other public a gencies for water quality enhancemen purposes, proviand continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water De velopment Bonds at $6 \%$.

## Tower Supports Local Dam Project

Senator John G. Tower, Re-
publican of Texas, last week expressed support for Congressional authorizations for project in Texas. He delivered his remarks to the Senate Public Works Committee's subcommittee on flood conrol, rivers, and harbors, which has the three projects nder consideration. Sen. Tower's remarks follow:
"Mr. Chairman, ed to recommend to you and to the Subcommittee on Flood Control, Rivers and Harbors the watershed projects submit ted to you by the Soil Con servation Service and the
Corps of Engineers for the San Corps of Engineers for the San
derson Canyon Watershed in the State of Texas.
"These projects are important to the areas involved for protection against floods and against soil erosion. In addi-
tion, the recreational uses of tion, the recreational uses of
the water impoundment area will provide a most welcome
fringe benefit from the authorization and construction of hese projects.
"The Sanderson Canyon wa-
tershed Project involves three large West Texas counties: large West Texas counties:
Terrell, Pecos, and Brewster The erosion problem would be substantially improved by accelerated conservation land treatment of 84,000 acres, and the substantial flooding problem would be taken ca floodwater retarding structure that are planned.
