## LISTEN TO LUKE

 We had some inquiries as to why we did not mention the railroad strike in last week's paper. It's simple: When we sent the paper to Alpine Wednesday for printing that night there was a chance that the strike would be settled. And we had to write the story prior to the Wednesday deadline and the outcome could not have been known then since it was not settled! It is still not settled at this writing on Monday, but there is some indication and all hope that it will be so that things may get back to some state of normalcy real soon for everybody's sake. And, sure enough, at noon Monday it was!

It will probably be several days before employees know just what the new work rules, wages, etc., are. The local U. T. U. members were involved in the strike and other railroad employees, other than those in supervisory capacity, honored the picket line. There has been some lay-off of local employees, hopefully only until the strike is settled.

Dr. A. N. Clanton has insisted in his stories about the immunization clinic results, that we include in his appreciation listing our own name as he wants everyone to know that he is grateful, too, for the publicity given the clinics. We appreciate his appreciation.

We have said before, and we don't mind saying again, that there is some appreciation due him, also, from the local residents for his bringing the immunization clinics to Sanderson for the benefit of the children and parents. And some of the other work he has done, like helping in getting some cleaning up at the dump ground, getting the spraying for mosquitoes out there accomplished by C. H. Stavley, for the elimination of some health hazards over town, for his attention to food handlers' health certificates, for the rubella clinic that was in no way connected with the school immunization requirements, and for several other things that he has done that were in line with his duties as county health officer, but not the result of any pressure on anyone's part.

And speaking of spraying for mosquitoes at the dump ground, there is a possibility that the rains received this week will nullify the good that may have been possible because of the spraying. Mr. Stavley used a 10% solution of Malathion we were told, just in case of a rain, but time alone will tell whether or not there was too much rain for that solution. And if it was too much water for the 10%, then the additional water will cause an additional need for an additional spraying since there will be more accumulations of water as possible breeding places for mosquitoes.

## New Phone Rates For Long Distance

An adjustment of long distance telephone rates, which features a new reduced rate for Direct Distance Dialing and increased rates for operator-assisted calls within Texas, was announced this week by Southwestern Bell.

The new DDD rate will be available in towns which are not equipped for DDD when station-to-station calls are placed by providing the operator with the area code and complete telephone number, and when the operator is not required to provide any additional assistance. Telephone subscribers may even ask the operator for the new DDD rates when placing a station-to-station call complete with area code and number to insure the reduced rates.

The increase in rates will be for long distance calls when the operator-assistance is necessary, such as on person-to-person calls.

In addition to the new reduced rate for Direct Distance Dialing, adjustments also call for the introduction of a one-minute initial rate period (rather than three minutes) on the "night" DDD; new rates for all operator-assisted calls during all calling periods; and establishes rate periods (day, evening, night, and weekend) and DDD calls which are the same as now in effect for calls going outside of Texas.

Two holidays - Labor Day and July 4 - also have been added to the list of days on which reduced rates apply for DDD calls.

Comparing previous rates with those which will go into effect September 1, H. D. Schodde, vice-president of Southwestern Bell's operations in Texas, pointed out that an evening 3-minute station-to-station call under previous rates for a distance of 300 miles would have been 85¢. Schodde stated that the same call under the new customer-dialed rate (or in the case of a Sanderson subscriber giving the area code and number) would be 66¢. He also noted that a call after 11:00 p. m. in Texas would cost 22¢ or less under the new one-minute initial rate period.

Under previous rates, a 3-minute person-to-person daytime call up to 300 miles would have been \$1.70. Under the new rates, the same call would be \$2.30.

## General Rain Covers County

What is considered to be the most general rain to fall in Terrell County in several months began Sunday morning and lasted through Monday.

The rains fell in all parts of Terrell County that were contacted with amounts varying up to two inches of rainfall.

Downie Draw was running bank-full across US 285 Sunday morning, Sanderson Canyon had a light flow Sunday locally, but a heavier flow to the west prior to sinking into the gravel in the draw.

The heaviest rain locally was on Sunday morning before daylight with light showers, mist, and drizzle most of the day, with some clearing late Sunday afternoon. The rain began again Monday night and continued until the afternoon, falling intermittently as showers, mist, and drizzle.

Heavy cloud cover was prevalent all day Sunday and most of Monday and there was also a heavy dew mornings of both days.

Official rainfall in Sanderson as of 8:00 a. m. on Sunday was .73; Monday .08; and on Tuesday morning the gauge showed .03-inch.

Another record was probably set for cool weather for July and August with a high in the low 70s Sunday and Monday.

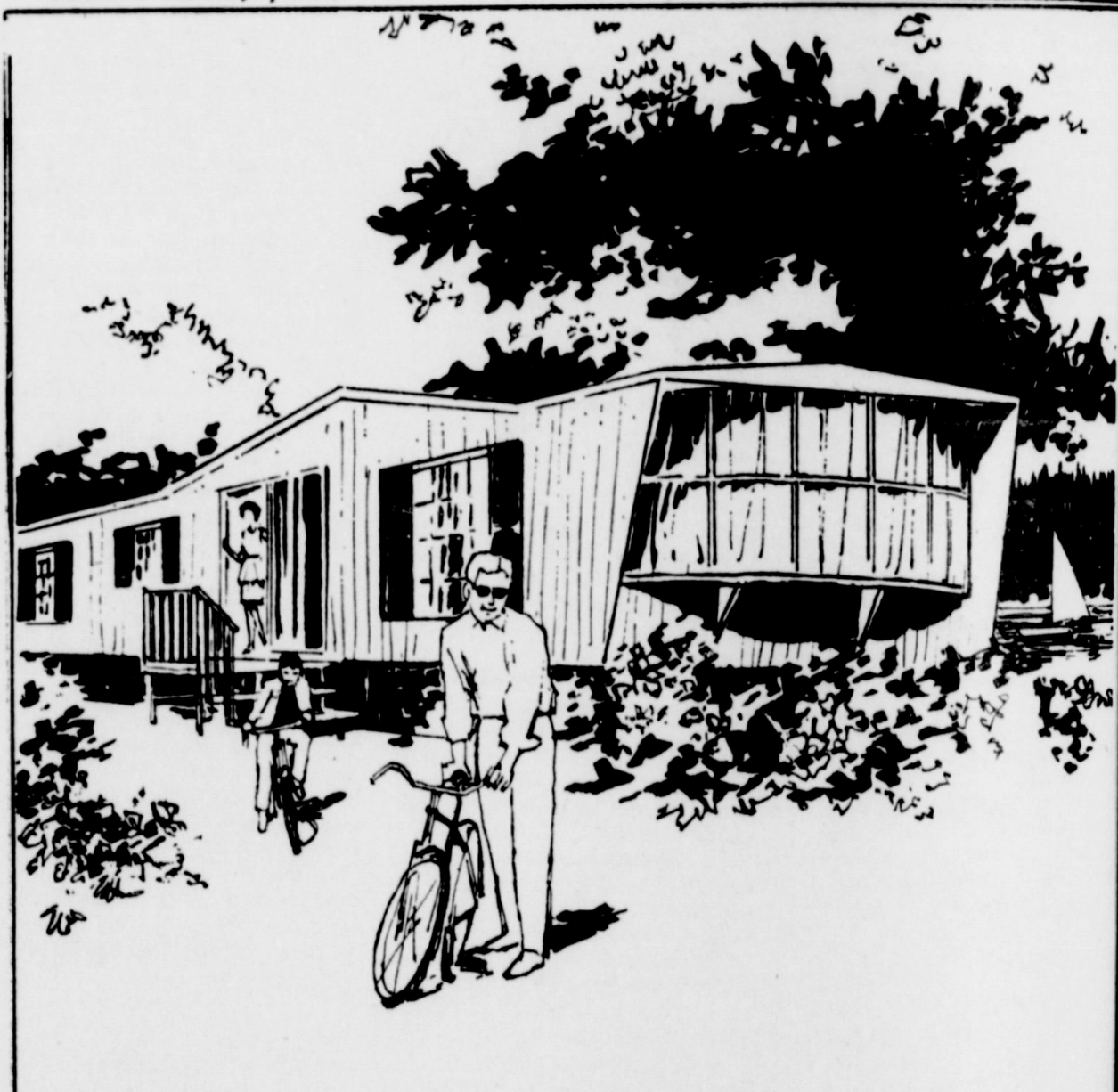

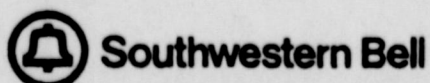
### Notice to Long Distance Telephone Users

Effective September 1, the charges for long distance calls within the State of Texas will be changed as follows:

- Rates will be reduced on most station-to-station calls dialed direct, without any operator assistance.\*
- New one-minute initial period calls will be introduced, at low night rates, for station-to-station calls dialed direct without operator assistance between 11 p.m. and 8 a.m.\* This will make it possible to call anywhere in Texas for 22¢ or less.
- Time periods when the various customer dialed rates are effective will be the same as those for interstate calls.
- Rates will be increased on all person-to-person and station-to-station calls requiring operator assistance in any way, except as noted below.\*

\*Where direct dialing is not available, the customer dialed rate will be charged for station-to-station calls from non-coin phones, on which the caller furnishes the area code and number, and the call is charged to the telephone from which it is made.

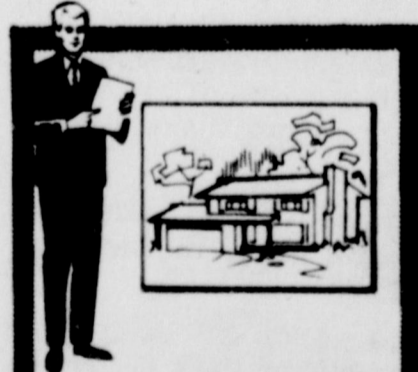
