We are glad to report that we are happy that we do not come into this classification! It is like some opinions of a business man: when he obviously gets to somebody in a deal, he's considered shrewd. But the guy he got to calls him crooked!

I doubt very seriously that a newspaper man's honesty would be upheld and his ability praised if he was completely honest and frank to this degree:

Mr. and Mrs. John Doe returned from their vacation last week. They couldn't have stayed gone so long if they had paid their bills before they went; or - -

Mr. Doe stood behind the bridal pair with a double-barrel shotgun obviously cocked. His suit was of imported wool with some synthetics mixed in; - - - or - -

Frankly, the refreshments were lousy, but they were attactive to look at; - - - or

The local Little League team won their regional title, but if they hadn't had two ineligible players, they probably wouldn't have; - - - or

The business meeting of the bridge club consisted of a rousing condemnation of the bidding habits of the three names that were submitted and all three of them, namely --, --, --, were unanimously blackballed.

Nope. We don't want to be frank and completely honest! As we stated before recently, people have an obligation, at times, to stand up and be counted for or against something. But discretion is still called for at times in the way one should express him-

The telling of the truth or withholding some or all of it has to be decided in the light of many things. One's purposes are not always known or understood, so the person has to be considered.

If an editor is always trying to hurt someone or something, in the eyes of a reader, then his every action will be interpreted in this light. If, on the other hand, some one else knows truly his actions and reasoning, then he will have another opinion of the writer.

Our every word is intended to help in the over-all view. Our words, for example, about some poor drainage conditions are not intended to point out a lack of action in the past, but a possible need for future activity.

Three word definitions we thought interesting:

"discriminate" to make a difference in treatment or favor on a basis other than individual merit;

"preference" the act, fact, or principle of giving advantages to some over others; continued to second page

Budget Down For This School Year

The budget for the operation of the Terrell County Independent School District for the current school year is down \$5, -249.00, according to A. H. Zuberbueler, tax assessor-collector for the district. He stated that almost all of the reduction in the budget was due to the reduction in school personnel.

There will be some slight amendments to the budget, Mr. Zuberbueler stated, at the next meeting of the board of trustees on transportation items, but these will not seriously affect the total figures.

The figures released took into consideration the built-in pay raise for teachers and could be changed pending the outcome of pending litigation between the state and federal governments.

Deer Season Set Nov. 27-Dec. 12

Deer season in Terrell County this year will be November 27 to December 12, both days included, with the bag limit being one mule deer buck and one antlerless mule deer by special permit, no more than two white tail bucks, no more than three antlerless deer, according to a release by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department this week.

The quantity of deer this year is said to be as high or higher than last year in some areas of the county and recent rains offer the probability of the deer being in good shape.

Help Offered County Ranchmen

Terrell, Pecos, and Brewster Counties were among nine Texas counties offered emergency conservation assistance Thursday of last week by the Department of Agriculture, Congressman Richard C. White said.

Other counties in Texas eligible for the assistance number 127 and all are in what was determined to be severe drought damage areas.

Practices to be carried out under the program include the drilling of wells and construction of pipelines to provide water for livestock, and to permit grazing where pasture forage exists.

Student Numbers Down By 37

Total school enrollment is down 37 from last year, according to figures released by Terrell County Independent School District Superintendent C.B. Card Monday.

There were 477 students at the beginning of the last school year and the figure decreased to 450 at the end of the school year, while the beginning enrollment this year is 413.

Supt. Card stated that he knew of a few more students that he expected to enroll, but it would not appreciably increase the total enrollment.

In the kindergarten are 25 students; 1st 36, 2nd 36, 3rd 23, and 4th 35, for 155 children in the elementary building.

In the junior high school: 5th 34, 6th 37, 7th 27, 8th 34, for a total of 132.

There are 126 students in the high school building. The 9th has 33, 32 in the 10th, 34 in the 11th, and 12th has 27.

Local Residents View TurboTrain

A crowd estimated at more than 500 was on hand to view the Amtrack TurboTrain when it arrived in Sanderson at 2:00 p.m.' Saturday.

The large overflow crowd began making the trip through the two passenger coaches as soon as the train stopped, but the trip was abbreviated to one car after it was decided that the crowd was too large for the time allotted for the local stop.

A large number of people decided to ride the train to Alpine free of charge and they were also treated to a movie, sandwiches, and cold drinks on the ride.

The TurboTrain is leased by the U.S. Department of Transportation and now on a 20,600mile cross-country tour. Two of the trains are now in operation between New York and Boston.

Joe Matthews, a representative of Amtrak, the National Rail-road Passenger Corp., said during a 30-minute stopover in Sanderson, "We wanted to bring it out here and let the people take a look at it and give us some indication of what type of train they would like to ride if we would try to get the people back on the railroads which we are trying to do."

Although the TurboTrain has a top speed of 170 miles per hour, the speed is determined by the condition of the tracks. He said the top speed in Texas so far has been 79 miles per hour, but stated the speed is varied from railroad to railroad, depending on the local maximum speeds of each line.

The train left San Antonio on Saturday morning and stopped in Del Rio before arriving in Sanderson. The red and white streamlined passenger train was developed by the United Aircraft Corp. and is the only new non-electrified inter-city passenger train to reach operational status in the United States in the past 15 years.

The tour is scheduled to end back in Providence, R.I., on September 9.




