
It takes some time and maybe even some money and/or some work to clean things up, but most anyone will admit that property, like people, look a little better when cleaned up!


BOYS' RANCH STOCK PICKUP TO BE NOVEMBER 15TH

Voter Registration Law Clarified

Some of the information concerning voter registration was misleading and slightly inaccurate and is being clarified to help prospective voters qualify for the privilege.

Registration will continue to within 30 days of a state or national election. A voter may register at any time during the year, but his voting eligibility will be determined by the time he votes in relation to the date of the election.

A citizen may register by mail on application forms which conform to state standards. A voter who is registering for the first time might save time and effort by going to the office of the sheriff to register.

A person who votes in party primary, state or national election automatically re-registers to vote for three years and any act of voting during the three years extends his eligibility for three additional years. A citizen is allowed to register his wife, parents, or children.






