Robert Douglas Treloar, 41, died instantly as a result of the accidental discharge of a .44 magnum rifle he was cleaning at his home shortly after noon Sunday. His two sons, Doug, and Pat were at his side and his wife and her sister, Miss Rita McMannis, who is visiting here from Rivers, Manitouba, Canada, were in the kitchen preparing lunch. Treloar was in the dining area when the accident occurred.

He is reported to have been at the local rifle range earlier in the day shooting the weapon.

Treloar was born in Rivers, Manitouba, Canada November 25, 1929. He came to Sanderson in 1954 and began working on the Southern Pacific Railroad. He was in the U.S. Navy Air Force from 1956-59 and returned to Sanderson following his military duty and continued working for the railroad as a brakeman. Mr. Treloar was married to Miss Molly McMannis of Rivers, Manitouba, on November 13, 1962, in Las Cruces, N. M. Three children were born to the union, the two sons who survive, and a daughter, Michele Anne, who died as an infant.

Treloar had an interest in a local television cable company and television sales. He was a past master of the Sanderson Masonic Lodge, and he and his wife served as patron and matron of the local Order of Eastern Star Chapter.

The body was taken to the Owens Funeral Home in Fort Stockton and then to Midland and flown to Canada for burial. accompanied by his family and Miss McMannis. Services were at the United Church in Rivers, Manitouba, Canada, and burial in Roseville Cemetery there.

Besides the widow and two sons, he is also survived by his mother, Mrs. George Treloar of Rivers; sisters: Mrs. Sheila Burton, Brandon, Man.; Mrs. Mary Magee, British Columbia; Mrs. Ethel Campbell, St. John's, N. B.; and brothers: Albert Treloar and Harold Treloar of Rivers, and William Treloar of Minnedosa, Man.

# **Predator Control** Referendum Set

Control of predators is considered one of the prime needs of the ranch industry, according to action taken by members and directors of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association in San Angelo last week. They voted to sponsor a proposed referendum which would involve 16,704 producers and 5, 578, 000 head of sheep and goats in 73 counties including Terrell County, and would, if accepted, raise revenue needed to go into a predator control program.

The proposed program calls for the maximum deduction of 20¢ a head on sheep and 10¢ a head on goats, and would be expected to raise over \$400,000 from which 32 new trappers would be hired to help combat predators by coordinating with the county trappers to assist them in some problem areas.

The proposed program is not meant to take the place of any predator control work now being done in counties but to add to their present control work. Assessment in the program, the referendum is passed, will be made on all sheep and goats coming off pasture and/or producer-raised lambs going into feedlots. Assessments will be collected and forwarded to the Commodity Board at the end of each month. Collections will be made by any firm or individual who purchases sheep or goats off pasture.

The referendum which now must be petitioned to the Commissioner of Agriculture for his certification, would be conducted by mail ballot sent together with a self-addressed, postagepaid envelope to all sheep and goat producers in the 73-county area. Producers would then vote for or against the referendum and elect one director from each of the six districts which comprise the 73 counties. Three directors at large will also be elected, and these directors will make up the producer board of nine directors.

The first half ended with a 0-0 tie, but Rankin found some fire during the interlude and returned to the field to score twice on the Eagles during the third period, converting both extra points with kicks, and then scoring a field goal in the final frame to conclude their scoring. Sanderson's score was by the quarterback, James Druse, on a 4-yard run and the running play effort for two extra points was no good.

In statistics, Sanderson trailed 9-15 in first downs, 17-229 in yards rushing. The Eagles in the passing department by completing 10 of 25 aerials for 113 yards and Rankin had 5 of 12 complete for 47 yards. Rankin intercepted 1 Sanderson pass and the Eagles intercepted two. Sanderson lost 1 fumble and Rankin 2. Sanderson received two penalties for 20 yards and Rankin had only one 5-yard penalty. The Eagle punts were 8 for 32-yards average, Rankins four punts averaged 36 yards.

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



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
