### Sanderson Canyon Flood Control Project Work Plans Are Approved

After years of study, planning, and working, another step has been taken toward the completion of flood control dams on the Sanderson Canyon Water-

The work plan has been approved and will be turned over to the Terrell County Commissioners at their next meeting.

Work can begin as soon as all rights-of-way and/or easements are secured and contracts let, according to information from the Soil Conservation Service, who directed the planning of the project and will also direct the work to completion.

The project is being sponsored jointly by the Commissioners Courts of Terrell, Brewster, and Pecos Counties, and the Rio Grande-Pecos River, Trans-Pecos, and Big Bend Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

The cost of the project will be \$4,681,983.00 with local governments - the counties involved - providing \$85,655,00, according to figures received.

There will be 11 structures in the flood control project, with eight in Terrell County, two in Pecos County, and one in Brewster County, controlling run-off on approximately 150 square miles of land that drains into Sanderson Canyon above San-

The purpose of the project is to prevent repetition of another tragedy like the one that occurred on June 11, 1965, when the lives of 27 people were lost in flood waters that came down the canyon just before 7:00 a. m. Besides the loss of lives, there was the destruction of property - business, ranch, and personal - in hundreds of thousands of dollars of value.

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


