

Alien Register Due Before Feb. 1

Howard L. Adams, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, El Paso, estimated that more than 72,000 aliens will report their addresses in the district during the annual federal alien address report program in January of the new year

Mr. Adams pointed out that all non -citizens, except those in diplomatic status and foreign representatives of certain international organizations, are required to file the address report each January even though their address is unchanged since the last report. In addition, aliens who may be absent from the United States must file their address reports with the Immigration and Naturalization Service within ten days after they return to the United States.

According to Mr. Adams, address report cards will be available at all immigration offices and at all post offices beginning January 3, 1972. The immigration official emphasized the importance of filing the address reports as required by federal statute, reminding that wilful failure to comply with these requirements may lead to serious consequences.

The State Department of Health is sponsoring a course in emergency care of the sick and injured. Classes will be held in Sanderson Elementary School, January 10-13. Registration will begin at 6:15 p.m., January 10. Sessions will run from 6:15 p.m. to 10:45 p.m. nightly.

Ambulance attendants and others interested in emergency care are urged to attend the four-night course. It is offered free of charge.

Experts in the field of emergency care agree that ambulance personnel must be prepared to make a quick survey to determine medical priority and to perform life-saving measures. Physicians and other medical personnel throughout the state of Texas are giving their time to provide the instruction needed to reduce the number of fatalities and injuries occurring each year.

Athletic Director Willie Myers notified The Times this week that installation had been completed on two additions to the physical education department, each of which had been received with pride by the coaches and the students involved.

There is a new weight machine in the gymnasium purchased by the Eagle Boosters and presented to the school which would enable up to 15 boys to work on weights at one time. The machine is designed to permit the exercise of all muscles of the body by the use of the various stations.

Supt. C.B. Card stated that the Eagle Boosters had paid \$1,000 toward the total cost of \$2,500 and had two years to pay for the machine with no interest charged during that time. He stated that there was a consideration being investigated of the school's applying \$500.00 out of the physical education department's budget toward the total cost of the machine.

The second piece of equipment purchased is a new score board in the g mnasium donated by senior classes as follows: seniors of 1970 - \$251.52; 1971 seniors \$378.83; 1972 seniors - \$150.50 or a total cost of \$780.93.

Coach Myers stated that the new score board showed which team had called time-out, and bonus shots, extras over the old score board, as well as indicating the score, period, and the buzzer.
