LISTEN TO LUKE

The news of the necessity for changing the financing procedures for the school districts of the state was one of the happenings of the week past that has caused some concern in some circles, and there is more concern to be forthcoming, in our opinion.

Those who try to stay close to things pending were not surprised at the move, but there is nothing concrete as yet, that we have seen, about how things are going to be done in the future.

What certainly appears to be forthcoming is a pooling of all the state's school money and distribution on some sort of an equality basis over the state - say like a per capita student basis. This could be amended on the basis of something like the Minimum Foundation which takes in every conceivable economic factor and averages out with the average daily attendance and the average mean temperature of every other Sunday afternoon except those during Lent.

One thing that we feel certain will come out of the changes, is a re-evaluation of the needs of each district and another look at whatever their current budgets are. There will be, nor should there be, due to the intent of the change, any more comparisons made between the various districts that have been so prevalent in the past. Such-and-such pays their teachers so much, or has a certain item on their campus or in their elementary school, so we ought to have one also, and such as that! We would not be surprised if there was not a down-grading in the finances of many of the schools in West Texas, forcing the curtailing of some of the expenditures that have been considered almost essential during past years.

If there is a loss in finances, then the necessity of a re-evaluation of the purposes of the schools in the first place might occur, and some of the choices that are made by boards and administrative personnel might cut into the quick of many of the patrons.

It will be interesting to watch!

The news is carried by The Times this week of the resignation of one of the County Commissioners and his replacement, David Mitchell replacing Sid Harkins. Sid served as the commissioner from Precinct 3 and his replacement must come from that same precinct.

We never know whether to congratulate the person going out of a job like that or to congratulate the person stepping in. Whichever one thinks he should be congratulated, or both of them, has our congratulations.

One thing we do know, the person who serves in this capacity has done a service to the county if he has served as he should serve. It is no easy and simple matter to be responsible for conducting all

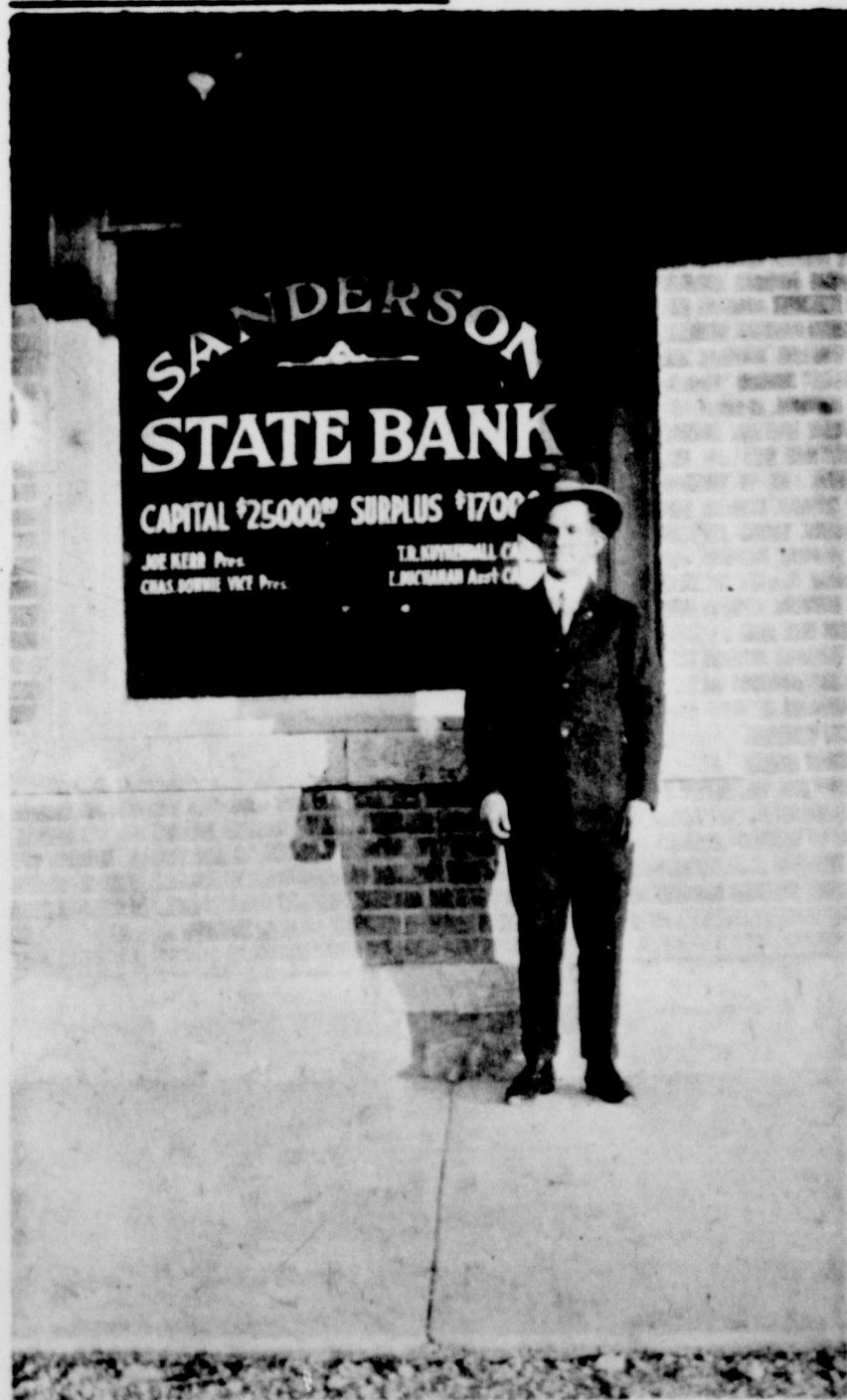

Harkins was first elected as a County Commissioner in 1940, replacing J.C. Mitchell.

Dr. Paul R. Weyerts, veterinarian of Alpine, reported to The Times Monday that he had a confirmation of a case of rabies found in a Brown Swiss calf on the Keith Jackson Rancho Verde on San Francisco Canyon southwest of Sanderson.

Dr. Weyerts also reported the probability of another rabies case in the general vicinity of the confirmed case, but that there was no confirmation yet of the second case.

The confirmed case was reported to the county health officer in Brewster County, Dr. Lockhart, Dr. Weyerts stated.

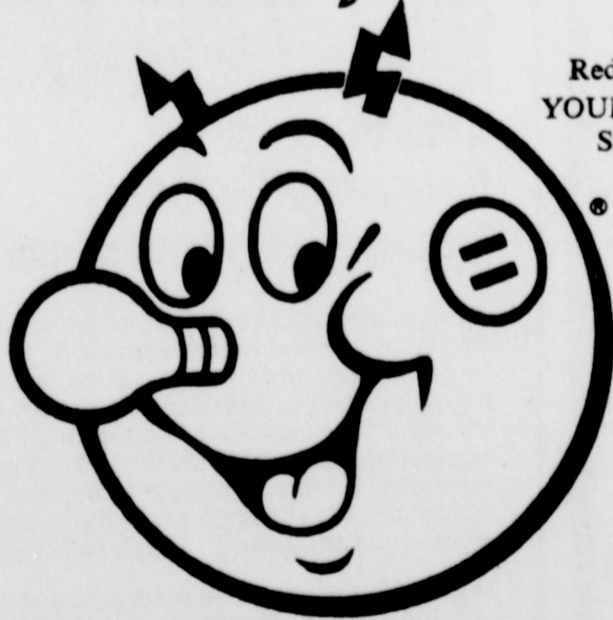

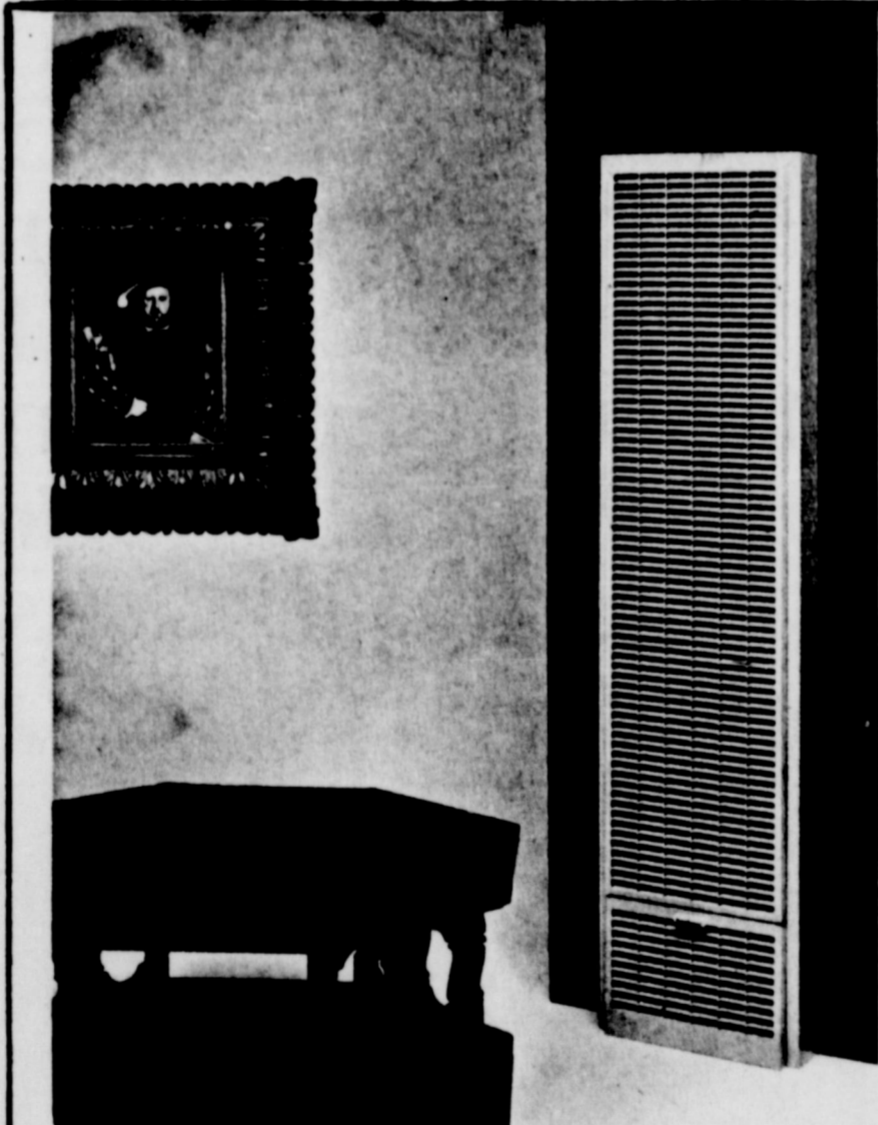
