LISTEN TO LUKE

The Terrell County Commissioners and County Judge with the help of Jim Turner and other employees of the county, are really sprucing things up around town and anyone should be proud of the way things look. We used the picture of the trash dump in the paper last week and several commented on the picture and on the condition at the dump after an on-site inspection.

This week there was a continued improvement of the drainage ditches on most of the east-west streets in town by the use of chemical week killer to prevent the clogging of the ditches. Most of them had already been cleared of trash and many rocks and some dirt and this effort will aid in keeping the ditches clean so that more proper drainage will result after rains. The week-killer was also used around the courthouse block, and some private residences, and public buildings.

All of the efforts being expended by the county, besides having the good effect of a better appearance of those properties, have encouraged some others to get out and get something done in the way of clean-up, and this is showing some good results also.

There are many things about our little town that are good to look at and a little bit of cleaning up adds to some of the picturesqueness considerably. What seems to show through the most to us is the pride that is expressed in cleaning up. We suppose that there is not always pride involved in cleaning up and sprucing up, but it is not harmful to suppose that those who do some or a lot of cleaning up have some pride. At least that's the way we look at it!

All of the fruit trees in town have either bloomed or are in bloom now. There is a good crop of apricots, plums, peaches, etc., that could make if we do not have a timely - or untimely - freeze that gets them all.

We learned recently that trees should not be fed after they begin to bloom and grass under the drip line of the tree should not be fed after blooms begin or before fruit is harvested - it causes the fruit to drop off before ripening so we were told.

This little bit of news is available to those who did not know about that fact and is a public service of the "expert" horticulturist who doesn't know a yucca from a dagger, but is reported to be factual!

Essay Contest For 4th, 5th Graders 'It's Your World'

Fourth and fifth graders of Alpine, Ft. Davis, Big Bend Park, Marathon, and Sanderson will again have the opportunity to participate in the "It's Your World" essay contest. The winning author will receive an engraved trophy plus an expenses paid weekend for himself and his family, and his teacher and family in Big Bend National Park. Second and third place winners from each school will have their names engraved on resident plaques.

The 1972 contest will be sponsored by the Big Bend Natural History Association, in cooperation with the National Park Service, and the Alpine Rotary Club. National Parks Concessions will donate park lodging. Co-chairman Ro Wauer and Paul Forchheimer said that the topic of this year's contest is "The Value of National Parks in Our Society." The national park idea is in its one hundredth year.

Here are the contest details: Packets of booklets and information sheets will be distributed to fourth and fifth grade teachers during the week of March 13 to 17. Teachers will then have the opportunity to acquaint themselves with the materials and prepare lesson plans. A Park Ranger will be available to appear upon request at each school to talk to the teachers and students from March 15 to 24. Essays will be written between March 23 and 29, and sent to the final selection committee by March 31.

Absentee Voting Began Monday

Absentee voting for the school trustees and members of the county school board in precincts 2 and 4 in Terrell County began Monday. Voting is during the regular office hours of A.H. Zuberbueler, Terrell County Independent School District Tax Assessor and Collector, at his office at 106 N. Persimmon. Mrs. H.M. Petty, deputy tax collector-assessor, is clerk for absentee voting and either one is authorized to take absentee ballots.

In the trustee race for the school district, drawing by the candidates placed the names of W.E. TenEyck, N.M. Mitchell Jr., and W.J. Murrah in that order in the race for the full 3-year term and voters are asked to vote for only two of the three candidates. In the race for the unexpired term, Don Allen and Mrs. Irvin Roblisted in that order on the ballot and voters are given the privilege of selecting only one of the two candidates.

Balloting will be on April 1 in the county with polls open at 8:00 a.m. and closed at 7:00 p.m. In precinct 1, at the court house; at the Dryden Methodist Church in precinct 2; at the Herman Couch ranch in precinct 3; and at the community building of the El Paso Natural Gas Co. plant in precinct 4. Election judges, polling places, and details of the election were printed in the Notice of Election in last week's Times.

All eligible resident voters in the county are authorized to vote in the trustee race, and resident eligible voters in precincts 2 and 4 may vote in the county school board election for which there are no announced candidates.

RR Engineers Need Agreement On New Planned Schedule

According to information received last week, railroad engineers' union representatives began negotiations Monday with officials of Southern Pacific Railroad in an effort to reach some kind of agreement concerning the operations of trains over this division in the future. There was no indication as to the amount of time that might be necessary for an agreement.

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers' contracts with the management are in no way affected by the agreement between the United Transportation Union and the Southern Pacific, according to information received, and separate and distinct contracts will be necessary for the B. of L.E. and the operating company prior to the initiation of through-train service between Sanderson and El Paso.

The agreement between the B. of L.E. and the company is for the operating of trains under the present circumstances, and any change in procedures must be agreed to by both parties, according to the information received.

open, within one hundred feet of any outside door through which a voter may enter the building in which a polling place is located. Any person who violates this provision is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not to exceed one thousand dollars. (Art 8.27, Texas Election Code, as amended 1967).

We may not agree with or like all of the laws we have, but we are obligated to live by them until we can get them changed.

The only reason for this is to possibly save some embarrassment or trouble to someone down the line. Violation of this law might call for throwing out some ballots or maybe even the election.

For us to withdraw to our own little part of the world and say that we are not being involved with or concerned about other people's actions is to say that we simply do not care about people.

And we do!
But I guess it depends on how you look at it!

To: The Students for Sanderson High--Your letter received and appreciated. There has never been a blanket condemnation of local students, only those that give all the rest a bad name. 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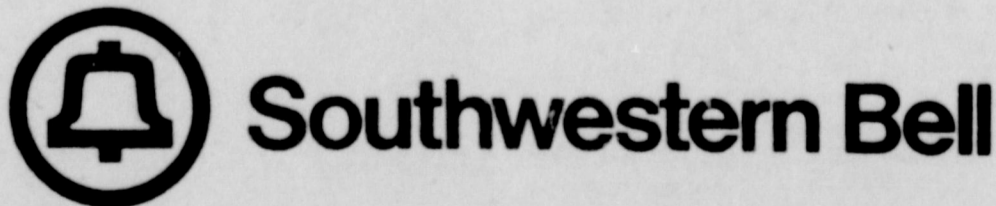

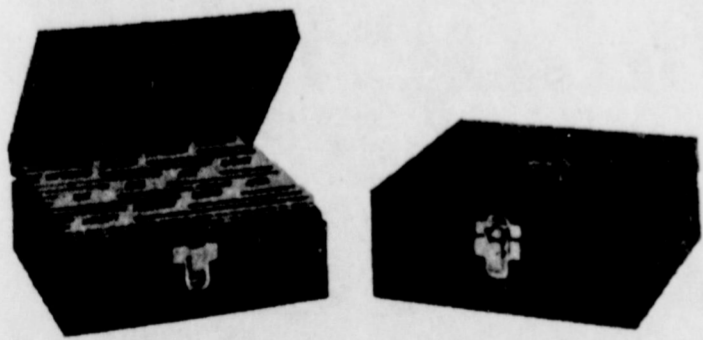

**New Approach For
Soil Conservation
Given By Senne**

Herb Senne, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Sanderson reports that a new approach to modern range management has developed in the last year which ranchmen in some parts of the State are already using. "Research people at our universities and research centers continue to learn more about range management and range care. Ranchmen using this technique are adding more and more practical knowledge to the field every day", said Senne.

Unfortunately more techniques are known in modern range management than are being practiced.

The new approach to modern range management is the intensified rotation grazing system. This method of planned range forage harvest allows on pasture (or units consisting of one or more pastures) to be grazed no longer than 4 to 8 weeks while all other pastures are rested as much as six months, or more, before being grazed again, according to Senne.

Here are some of the real advantages listed to using this new approach in grazing management: (1) More harvestable pounds of high quality range forage that can be produced per acre on a given amount of rainfall (whether it be 5" or 25") so more net returns can be made. The reason for this is more efficient individual livestock performance in terms of more pounds of beef produced per cow, pounds of lamb raised per ewe and pounds of wool and mohair per sheep and goat can be obtained. (2) Frequent and long periods of rest provide maximum improvement in range condition. This simply said means the more palatable, productive, high quality plants are given a chance to grow and reproduce. Thus, improving the composition of the plant community. (3) Soil loss is held to a minimum when one-half, by weight, of the key plants produced each year are left on the land throughout the year. Since more actual pounds are produced it is easier for the ranchmen to leave this amount of residue on the land so less soil erosion due to wind, rain, and sunshine occurs. (4) More

efficient use of the rain that falls is made. Since more old and new grass stubble is present more water gets into the ground. Since the plants growing are more vigorous and healthy more efficient use is made of the rainfall, and consequently more grass is produced and more important, less water runs down the draw carrying soil particles to somewhere be lost needlessly.

Senne said these were four good facts supporting his way of thinking. Other advantages such as less labor required to run the ranch and more effective use of all forage were pointed out.

Senne went on to say that some ranchmen in the local SWCD have started some grazing systems and were real satis-

more than 100 years, but this industry is in danger of being destroyed because ranchmen are finding it increasingly difficult to maintain production because of predator losses.

In wool production alone, major producing counties have shown tremendous decreases from 1960 to 1970. For example, Pecos County has had a 41 per cent decrease in wool production during that time. The county produced 2,069,000 pounds of wool in 1960, as compared to 1,212,000 pounds in 1970. Some other wool and mohair producing counties have had decreases up to 90 per cent.

In a questionnaire sent to a representative number of sheep and goat producers in 77 Texas counties, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association learned that coyotes and bobcats are considered the most damaging predators in two-thirds of the counties polled.

Predator Vote By TS&GRA Coming

Texas Sheep and goat producers will be faced with one of the greatest challenges in the history of their industry when they vote March 27-31 in a mail referendum being held to finance more effective predator control measures in Texas.

Any eligible voter who does not receive a ballot, or who wants voter information may obtain both at the office of County Judge R.S. Wilkinson.

The referendum, sponsored by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, will be conducted in 73 counties of Texas which contain 97 per cent of the state's sheep and goat population and 81 per cent of the producers. Permission for conducting the referendum was granted by the Texas Department of Agriculture at a hearing held in Austin January 7. Ballots will be mailed 15 days prior to March 27.

The top portion of the referendum ballot for ranchers is printed above. The lower half is for write-in candidates and verification of production.

The state's sheep and goat producers say they are in serious trouble due to the unchecked invasion of predatory animals. Although control measures have been in effect for many years, most livestockmen do not believe the present program is adequate. If approved, the referendum will allow a deduction to be made on sheep and goats marketed to provide additional funds for financing a stronger and more effective

predator control program in Texas.

Ranchmen contend that if predators are not controlled more effectively, their multi-million-dollar industry will be virtually wiped out. Documented economic losses suffered by sheep and goat producers in Texas in recent years is staggering. According to the Texas Crop Reporting Service, sheep and goat losses to predators totaled more than 305,000 head in 1967. Value of these animals, excluding the loss of wool and mohair production, was more than \$3,000,000.

The fiber loss is even more damaging to the state's economy since the average value of these raw products which would normally be produced by these animals had they survived would be in excess of \$50 million. Wool and mo-

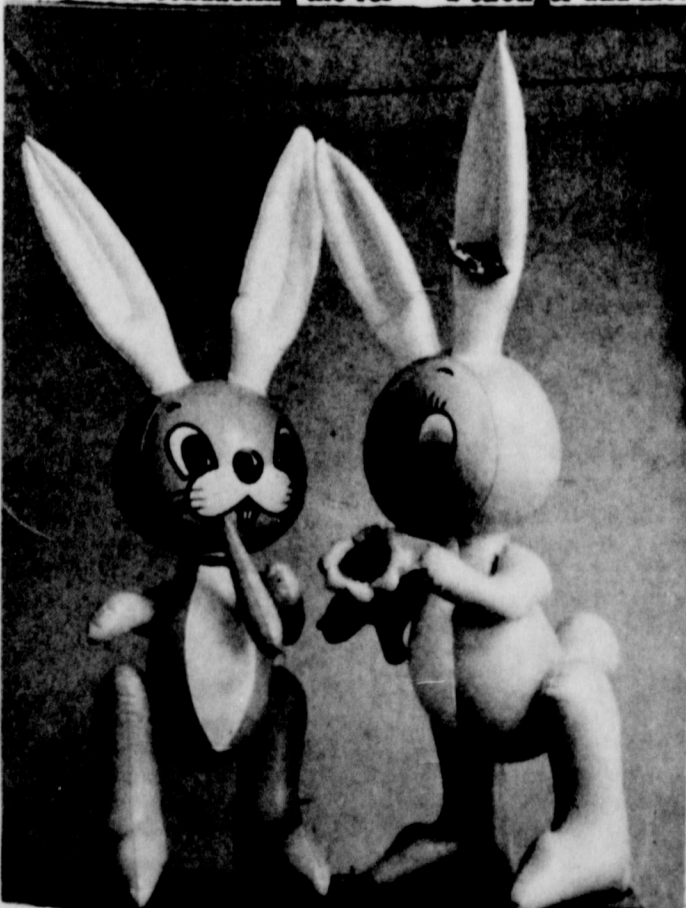
