Rodeo Club Plans Seven Events For Summer Fun

The Sanderson Rodeo Club has planned seven events for the summer months with contestants vying for gold and silver buckles in calf roping, ribbon roping, break-away, steer roping, barrel racing, and flag racing. There will also be an all-around buckle given to the top money winner in two or more events. Contestants must be entered in at least five of the seven summer events to qualify for buckles, according to rules laid down by the club.
The break-away roping will be for boys 15 and under, and barrel races and flag races will be broken down into age group brackets for youth competition. Steer roping rules are to have the steer facing, and the rope either tied or dallied.
The first of seven events will be on April 29 at 1:00 p.m. Other afternoon ropings will be on May 20, July 4, and Sept. 30. Night events will be June 17, Aug. 5, and Sept. 2 and will begin at 7:00 p.m.
The members of the organization were cited by rodeo fans of the area last year for their staging of the series of events which drew many contestants and fans to Sanderson. Local business people were also appreciative of the organization's efforts to boost Sanderson and furnish a means of diversion for local participants and fans.

Bids Opened For Water Dist. Bldg.

The low bid of Coastal Contracting Co. of Eagle Lake, Texas, was accepted at a regular meeting of the board of directors of the Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District #1 last week. The bid was for a 20 x 40 feet steel building on a concrete slab to be constructed at the district's well site north of the James Caroline home on US 285.
The construction company's attorneys are drawing up a contract for approval of the directors of the water district, according to Don Allen, manager, and the contract will be negotiated following approval of the contract.

Train Crews Begin El Paso Runs

Local train crews began operating specified trains on a run from Sanderson to El Paso and El Paso to Sanderson on Sunday. The engine men, who are negotiating on a contract in which the longer runs are a consideration, are working only to Valentine as they have done in the past.
Two boards have been set up locally for the trainmen, one on the short runs to Valentine, and the other for those who are working to El Paso.
A train came in from San Antonio early Monday morning with train and engine crews that had originated in that city and the engine crews were beginning "student runs" on that segment of the line, according to information from those employees of the Southern Pacific. The run from San Antonio to Sanderson was said to have kept the crews on duty for eight hours.
A local motel has been leased by the Southern Pacific Railroad, according to reports, to house the employees of the railroad working into Sanderson on the long runs from El Paso and San Antonio.

School Board Races To Be Determined In Voting Saturday

Balloting will be Saturday for places to be filled on the board of trustees of the Terrell County Independent School District, and two posts on the Terrell County School Board.
In the vote for board of trustees, there are two races: for a 2-year term - with Don Allen and Mrs. Irvin Robbins as the candidates; and for a 3-year term - with W.E. TenEyck, N.M. Mitchell Jr., and W.J. Murrah as candidates, and only two to be elected.
Voters in precincts 2 and 4 will elect a member of the county school board.
Balloting in precinct 1 will be at the courthouse, in precinct 2 at the United Methodist Church building in Dryden, at the Herman Couch ranch in precinct 3, and at the recreation building at the El Paso Natural Gas Plant in precinct 4.

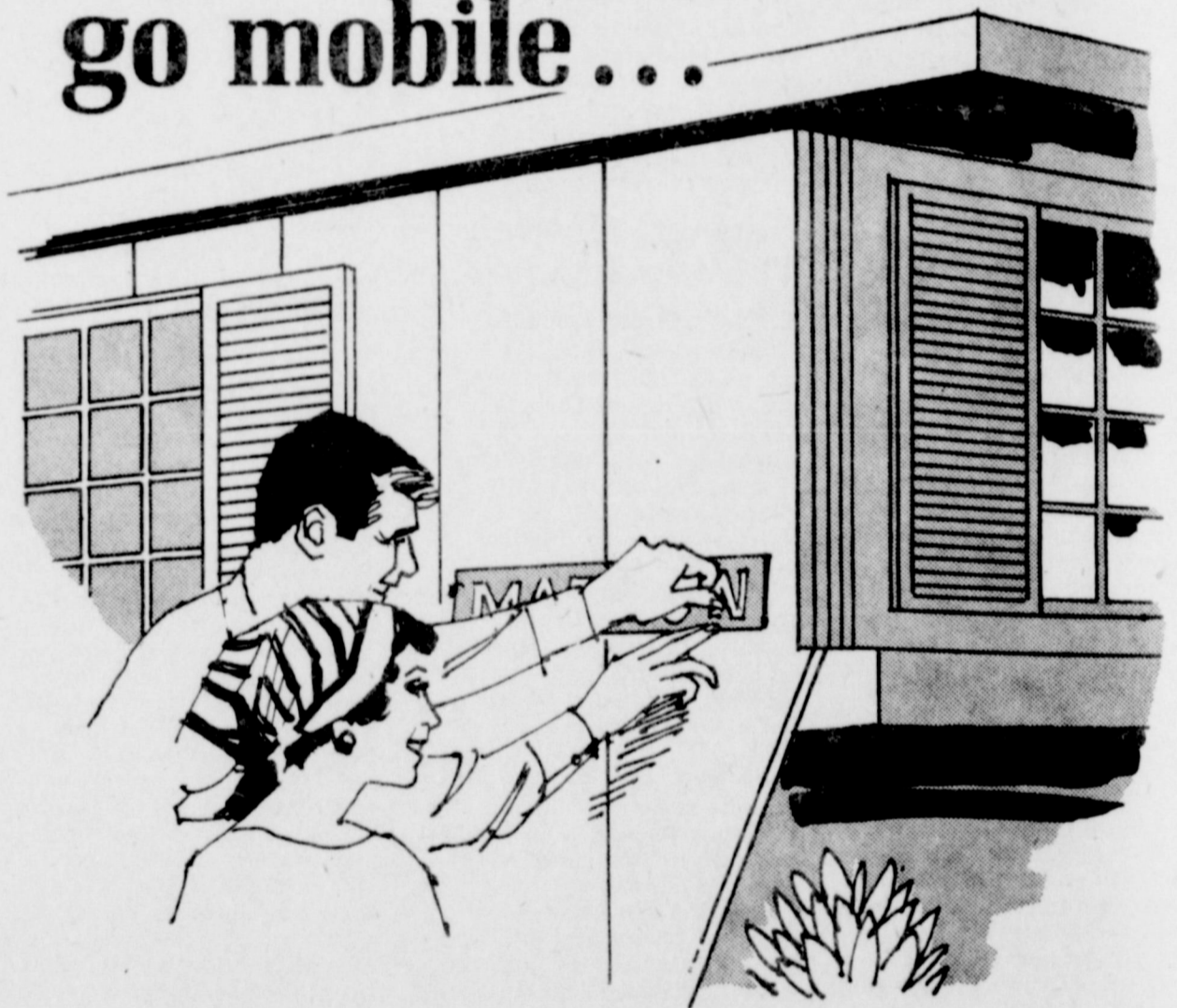

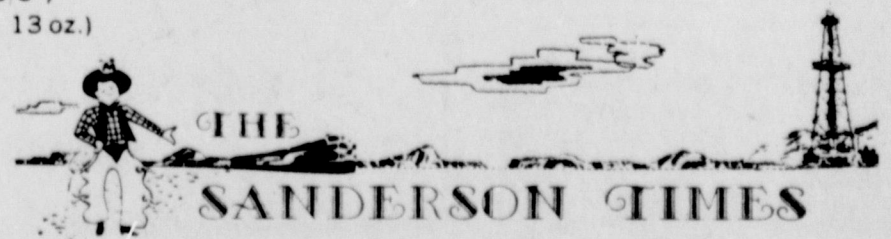

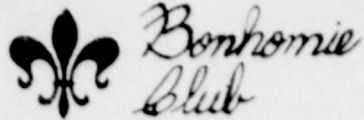
