"Deals" seem to be the acceptable way of life these days in so many circles. We wonder what has happened to just plain old "honesty". If something is permitted to go on for a little while, maybe even in hopes that it will "die out", then the excuse is immediately available: "well, so-and-so did it and got away with it. Why are you punishing me?"

Maybe it's just the way you look at it.

Dogs have gotten to be quite a problem again locally. Ranchmen are complaining about "kills" of sheep and lambs, and wounding of the animals by dog packs that come from town. Dogs may be seen in packs locally, and the noise of the dogs at night has been a common complaint in all parts of town.

There is a law on the county's books that requires that all dogs be penned or leashed at night, so there is some justification for requiring this.

There is also the possibility that there will be an outbreak of rabies, or something else might happen as a result of the increase in "stray" dog population, that would be most unfortunate. Must we always wait for a calamity to make some kind of a change? Cannot we use preventive measures sometimes to forestall a calamity? Are we completely indifferent to the financial loss of area ranchmen because of "our" stray dogs? Isn't the reason for their problem "us"?

Proposed Program for Medical Aid Given Favorable Response Locally

Mrs. J.M. Davis, president of the Sanderson Emergency Squad, reported that a favorable reply had been received in the telephone campaign conducted last week locally.

There was no definite plan proposed, nor was there a promise that any plan that was conceived would and could be implemented, but the doctor was interested in trying to find some kind of plan to present to the Texas Medical Association and use Sanderson as a "pilot program" so that others may be able to benefit from the program that was conceived for trial here.


Dr. Chase felt that with the program's beginning -- a very indefinite date and circumstance -- and with the sponsorship, possibly, of a medical association, that every effort would be made by the sponsors to make a success of the "pilot program", and that the citizens of Sanderson who supported the program would have a better chance of receiving better medical attention that was possible with the miles separating the town from a doctor.

Emphasis was put on the fact that possibly many local residents should now be getting some kind of medical attention, but were not getting it due to the fact that with the expense of traveling, the inconvenience for some, and other circumstances made it difficult for them to have adequate or much-needed attention.

Dr. and Mrs. Chase's visit to Sanderson was at the instigation of Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey.

The information received in the telephone campaign will be relayed to Dr. Chase so that he may have it for presentation to the Texas Medical Association's meeting in May and also for his own information in talking to others who have the same interest.





Aq Census Compares 1964-69 Figures Terrell County showed a

total of 80 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census. a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics administration.

In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 85.

Of the county's total farms in 1969, 76 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as compared with 74 in 1964.

The report also shows average farm size in the county was 18, 104.5 acres, and average value of these farms (land and buildings) was \$422,211. Other figures from the

report are:

- 1. Value of all farm products sold in 1969 \$3,082,769; in 1964, \$1,780,450.
- Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$52,896; in 1964 \$7,406.
- 3. Value of all livestock, poultry, and their product sold in 1969, \$3,-028,963; in 1964, \$1,-

742,493. Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of

farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, 3 of the

county's \$2,500-and-over

farms are incorporated. A comparison of the figures also shows that in 1969 there was 142,548 sheep and lambs and 76,863 were sold; in 1964 the sheep and lamp population was 138,785 and 72,673 were sold; the market value of the stock sold in 1969 was \$3,-080,546, and in 1964 was \$1,774,752.

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
