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

Rainfall Here **During Last Week**

Sanderson had almost one inch of rainfall Friday of last week with some light hail accompanying the high wind. There were reports of heavier rains southwest of Sanderson and some wind damage to a barn and trees on the Janice ranch, the former Cliff Roark ranch

Another rain came locally about 9:00 p.m. Sunday night leaving abut .75-inch in local gauges. There was no hail or high winds with the rain Sunday night, but extensive lightning.

Most of the rains received in the country during May have been thundershowers. spotted, and of short duration, but dumping near and upwards of one inch of moisture in the heart of the downpour.

A slow-falling rain began early Tuesday morning and lasted until noon. There was no run-off from the rains, except on pavement, and everything received a good soaking. The rainfall measured about .30-inch in several local gauges.


Reading Program Begins Monday





Garbage Pick-Up Is On Schedule Of Daily Route

Tommy Turner, Terrell County work foreman, asked The Times to relay information about the collection of garbage to residents of Sanderson.

Turner has worked out a schedule of route pick-ups for the trash truck so that there will be a systematic and regular pick-up of trash in town. The crews are instructed to adhere to the schedule as closely as possible so that householders will know when to expect the truck. He also asked that householders try to observe the days that the trucks come around and not burn their trash that day as it is difficlut and painful to handle a hot barrel full of burning trash.

Barring unplanned difficulties and inclement weather, the truck should make a pick-up at each house once a week so that it is not necessary ordinarily for most householders to burn their trash. Anyone who is not having their trash picked up is asked to call Turner at 2566 or if there are any questions about trash pick-up.

Turner also stated that a pit had been dug at the dump for the disposition of carcasses of dead animals and fowls and that diesel fuel and lime were available for burning of the carcasses that were dumped there. He added that there were signs galore at the dump directing people where to take animal carcasses and trash for dumping and that it would be a tremendous help if anyone taking refuse to the dump ground would follow the directions given by the

signs. Every effort is being made to do a good job in the disposition of trash, garbage, and carcasses, and the cooperation of all citizens of Sanderson is urgently sought by Turner.
