There were some upset people in the county Saturday about the election. We were sorry for the upset, but there was nothing we could do about it, except report what was told us.

Tuesday morning we were told that there would be voting in Precinct 1 only for all of the voters of the county, and that's the way that the story was. This was the decision of the Terrell County Democratic Executive Committee, according to what was told us.

Then Thursday morning, the day the paper was put in the mail, we learned that the local committee was told by a letter received from the Secretary of State that day to have the balloting in all four precincts, the same as in the first primary.

Certainly, it was too late for printing the change in voting places in the primary run-off for the benefit of our readers, but we did tell several people who live in the country, in hopes that they could get the word around a little.

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Many, many times in past years, there have been other instances where The Times was told something and then something changed so that by the time the paper got out the situation was different. And almost every time, we ust swallowed and bit our tongue, because there was nothing that could be said hat would be meaningful. We don't get a signed statement every time we are told something. We are not going to start doing that, either. We were told this time that the Democratic executive committee was admitting their "bust" to people who came to the courthouse from outlying precincts, so we are explaining it further. We don't tell the Democratic Executive Committee what to do any more than we tell somebody else what to do. But we spend a lot of time trying to get ourselves and others to try to do things correctly. We probably will make some other mistakes, too, but we've all got to try! Something that we were taught - or at least efforts were made - was: If there is any question about whether or not it should be done, it is better to not do it! There . is some good logic still in this practice.

Wednesday of last week marked the completion of 27 years of teaching for Mrs. W.J. Morris and her retirement. Fourteen of those years have been in Sanderson when she taught the fifth grade.

Unofficial but complete returns of the Democratic Primary Run-off Election are printed below.

The ruling by the county executive committee of the Democratic Party to hold the election only in Sanderson and the subsequent nullification of this decision by the Secretary of State caused several people to lose their opportunity to vote as they

had arranged their business to conform to what they thought was the proper place for them to vote.

Voting was much lighter in the county for this election, by comparison with the first primary, with most of the difference in numbers and percentage being in the absentee vote and in the vote in precinct 1.

SAXAPHONE QUARTET GETS IV AT STATE





BEAUTIFICATION PROGRAM FOR 'Y' IN PLANNING




ry, cartridges, doils, quilts, etc.





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

List Given Of **Tax Exemptions** For Ranchmen

Information received from the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas help to clear up some con fusion concerning iteas exempt from state sales tax and used by people in the agricultural industry.

The incomplete list includes: annual plants (the products of which are edible by humans or livestock or which will be resold in the regular course of business); block salt, sulphur and mineral blocks; *cultivators; *defoliants; #desiccants; feed crumbles (vitamin and medicine treated) for livestock; feed for farm and ranch animals; #feed for non-farm animals held for sale in the regular course of business (dogs, birds, etc.); fertilizer; *gates; horses, mules and work animals; medicine or drugs for livestock (sold on prescription); herbicides; insecticides which are used on farm and ranches (does not include rodent or any poison or poisons used for the household); #irrigation equipment; plows and plow points; portable stock feeders to be used on farm or ranch; *portable fences and chutes; *prefabricated or portable storage facilities, sheds, and ranch buildings; *repair or replacement parts which are specifically designed for farm machinery or farm equipment; * replacement motors and pumps for irrigation equipment; *saddles, bridles and harnesses for working animals; seeds, the products of which are edible by humans or livestock or which will be resold in the regular course of business; sprayers for use on farms and ranches; *sweeps; *tractors, combines, swathers, sprayers, and other farm machinery; *turkey and chicken feeders. The asterisk (*) is by items to which the tax applies unless purchaser issues an exemption certificate, specifying why said item is not taxable to him. It is the responsibility of

the farmer or rancher to furnish the tax exemption certificate which are available from the state comptroller's office.

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


