#### Family Planning Grant To Include Terrell County

Governor Preston Smith this week announced his approval of a supplemental community action grant of \$16,165.00 in federal funds to Permian Basin Planned Parenthood, Inc. in Odessa for family planning.

Funds will be used to establish a family planning program in Pecos County which will also include patients from Terrell County who come to Fort Stockton for various community services. An estimated 650 patients need these services, and at least 300 are expected to participate during the first year.

The grant is funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, and is effective August 1, 1972, through July 31, 1973.

Also, the existing opera-

tions in Midland, Ector, and Reeves Counties will be extended to include 1,100 patients.

Special attention will be given to the Mexican-American patients.

#### Senior Citizens To Be Polled For Area Survey



The survey is sponsored by the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission and is for future reference only, depending upon the findings of the surveys. Other surveys are being made in other towns of the 17-county Planning Commission.

There will be a meeting of the Emergency Squad at 4:00 p.m. Sunday, and any person interested in the survey or senior citizens. The group will go over the questionnaires and the plans for the survey, including deciding on the 30 senior citizens to be interviewed.

The questions include information about hobbies, interests, needs, habits, housing, living conditions, etc.



#### New Traffic Signs to Rely On Symbols Instead of Words

Yew traffic signs making use of symbols in stead of word messages are being erected throughout the nation in accordance with the Highway Safety Act of 1966. Many of the signs are already in place along roadways in metropolitan areas of Texas and New Mexico.

Traffic experts say the symbols provide the best means of communicating with drivers because of their simplicity. legibility and ability to be recognized at a glance. And since the symbols are international, they will help U.S. drivers in foreign countries as well as aiding foreign visitors to this country.

The new signs have new shapes, new colors and new legends. However, some of the highway signs now in use, such as the stop sign, will not change.

One of the most important changes will be the use of the international red circle and slash as the symbol for "no." This symbol, when superimposed over the symbol for a particular type of vehicle or traffic movement, will indicate "no" for that type vehicle or movement. For example, the sign for no trucks will be a red circle with a diagonal slash over a black truck. No left turn will be a red circle and slash over a black arrow turning left.

Symbols will also be used on warning signs. The slippery when wet sign will show a picture of a black car and skid

At first many of the new signs will carry both word messages and symbols, but eventually the word messages will be dropped.

ently, stop signs are octagons; warning signs are diamond-shaped; yield signs are triangles; and information signs are rectangles. These shapes will remain the same, but three new shapes will be added. A pentagon, shaped like a little red schoolhouse; will be seen at school zones and crossings. A pennant-shaped sign will be placed on the left hand side of the road to indicate a no-passing zone. And a trapezoid will be used for recreational area guide signs.

Colors are also important. Red will mean stop or a prohibition; yellow will signify a warning; green will indicate directional and route information; and blue will be used for service informa-

Two new colors have also been added: orange for construction and maintenance hazards and brown as a background to the trapezoidal recreational area and scenic guidance signs.

These color schemes also will be carried through on pavement markings. When all roads and highways are marked, yellow will be the only color used for the centerline markings on twoway roads and streets. Red on curbs will mean no parking as it does now.

Finally, traffic signals will have three turn arrows rather than one. In addition to the green arrow that means proceed, a yellow arrow will indicate the end of allowed movement, and red will show that the turn may not be made.

By the end of this year, pavement markings should conform to the new standards, and highway signs should be replaced by the end of 1974. The traffic signals will take longer, with 1976 as the target date.
