AMENDMENT PUBLICATION BEGUN THIS WEEK

November 7, Texas voters will join others in the nation in the general election. At the same time, Texans will vote on 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

The amendments will be run in The Times for four consecutive weeks, starting this week.

Schedule For School Opening

Details of registration for the opening of school have been released for the information of students and parents.

Seniors will register at 10:30 a.m. August 18, and juniors at 1:30 p.m. the same day. Sophomores will register at 10:00 a.m. August 19 and freshmen at 1:30 p.m. the same day, all high school students going to room 5 in the high school building.

August 18 the junior high students will register with the 8th grade going to room 1 at 10:30 a.m. and the 5th grade going to room 5 at the same time. The 7th graders will go to room 1 at 11:15 a.m. and the 6th graders to room 1 at 1:30 p.m.

Elementary students will all register on August 19 with the kindergarten reporting to room 1, 1st grade to room 4 (both in the south wing), 2nd graders reporting to room 12, 3rd graders to room 7, and 4th graders to room 9 (in the north wing) and all reporting at 10:00 a.m.

The first day for bus runs is August 21, which is the day that classes begin.

High school students who did not attend school in Sanderson last year are asked to see Principal Wayne Mitchell during the week of August 7-11.

VOTER REGISTRATION POSSIBLE ANY TIME

Persons who have attained the age of 18 years and wish to vote in an up-coming election, may register at any time to vote, according to information received, but will not be eligible to vote in any election until 30 days after registration.

Regarding the above, be sure you are able to prove the fact that the Indians you accuse of having attacked the town actually did or you may be in trouble. Or maybe the writer just wanted to know if they were black-haired, redskinned, brown-eyed, and the one with the noticeable limp on the left leg; also the one with the scar on his right little finger, and one particular hippie-type that wore his hair a little longer and with a peculiar twist in his braiding.

Local Tax Funds Match Grant For S-O Kits

Terrell County Commissioners Court recently approved a cash match of \$3,800.00 for acquiring crime scene search kits and other technical equipment. A \$11,400.00 grant to assist small rural police agencies was approved for the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission last week by Governor Preston Smith.

Word received from the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission is that none of the more than 35 separate police agencies has an adequate laboratory facility. Police officers located within the 24,000 square miles of the PBRPC are often required to drive round trip distances of 100 miles or more when investigating an offense.

They money will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administers funds from the U.S. Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas, and from the Terrell County coffers.

Participating agencies are sheriff's offices of Borden, Crane, Dawson, Martin, Midland, Terrell, and Upton Counties and police departments of Crane, Fort Stockton, Lamesa, McCamey, Midland, Monahans, and Odessa.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 58)

General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE resentatives shall not be invalid LEGISLATURE O OF THE

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

Section 24. Representatives

shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Hundred Dollars Four \$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall re-ceive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Rep-



"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposi-tion: "The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives."

"(b) The Legislature may, by general law, exempt proper-ty owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the

armed services of the United States who is classified as disabled by the Veterans' Administration or by a successor to that agency; or the military service in which he served. A veteran who is certified as having a disability of less than 10 percent is not entitled to an exemption. A veteran having a disability rating of not less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$1,500. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 30 percent but not more than 50 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,000. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 50 percent but not more than 70 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A veteran who has a disability rating of more than 70 percent, or a veteran who has a disability rating of not less than 10 percent and has attained the age of 65, or a disabled veteran whose disability consists of the loss or loss of use of one or more limbs, total blindness in one or both eyes, or paraplegia, may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$3,000. The spouse and children of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while on active duty will be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. Superintendent C.B. Card announced this week that no changes were made in the school dress policy this year from last year. Students are expected to look neat, dress in good taste, and be clean.

The guideline for boys is still: no hair over the ears, no hair over the collar, no hair below eye brow, and no sideburns below the ear lobe.

For girls: may wear bluejeans, slacks, and pant suits so long as they meet with the approval of the building principal and do not create a disturbance.

No Bermuda shorts, as well as conventional shorts will be worn to school by boys or girls.

School dress policy will be observed during registration.

Absences Explained For Parents

Terrell County Independent School District issues three types of excuses for absences, according to Supt. C.B. Card. They are:

Excused makeup - given for the following reasons - personal sickness, sickness or death in the family, quarantine, severe storm which makes travel dangerous, unusual causes acceptable to school authorities. Excuses to be in writing and signed by parent or guardian.

Unexcused - given when a student deliberately misses school and/or fails to bring an excuse or the parents fail to notify the school. Students will have three points deducted from each subject missed. Included in this category are taking children on out-oftown shopping trips, banking, etc., on school days.

Absence Accounted For this type of an excuse will be given when a parent takes the child from school for personal reasons. The teacher is not required to give any makeup. It is also recommended that the parent notify the school prior to the child's absence. Any work for the time missed must be done before the absence. This does not apply during six-weeks tests, when the student must be at school unless he is sick or an emergency exists. Hunting, fishing, etc., absences are not excused and will cost three points per subject per day.

\$20-Million Need Foreseen By Some In Texas Taxes

According to information received from the Texas Press Association this week, James McGrew, Texas Research League director, told the Texas House Revenue and Taxation Committee that spending from general revenue and other key state funds will jump \$700 million over the present level next biennium. But he figured an additional \$375-million to \$400-million in revenue is anticipated from present 'growth" taxes, and a \$100million federal welfare windfall is foreseeable.

McGrew advised the committee that they may be look. ing at a \$200-million money shortage for the next biennium when it reports next year. Governor Preston Smith strongly disagreed with Mc-Grew's forecast and said there was a strong possibility no new taxes at all will be needed next year, according to the TPA story.

Tower Supports Screwworm Fund

Senator John Tower last week supported programs for screwworm eradication, insect control, foreign meat inspection, rural electrification and rural environmental assistance, and opposed a reduction in farm payment limitations, as the Senate considered this year's Agricultural Appropriations Bill.

Tower stressed approval of the committee-recommended increase of \$3,116,000.00 in the screwworm control program. "The outbreak of screwworms in Texas this year, one of the more severe ever recorded, could possibly have been contained with proper funding. Further, it is an indication of what can happen next year. This additional funding and the prospect of a cooperative program with Mexico now being negotiated, should be effective in preventing the costly losses which occurred in Texas this

This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund

"(e) The convention, by re-

solution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for e vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, coun-

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE cluding sheriffs who also per-LEGISLATURE OF THE form the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is com-pensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be com pensated on a fee basis.
