We had no more than gotten last week's paper in the postoffice than it began to rain. and before the weekend was over, everything that we said about what was being done in the way of completing the dam easement project, was more clearly realized.

Monday morning, the Commissioners' Court of Terrell County again had a report and discussion of the progress of the project. They are very aware of the need for continued action to bring the project to a speedy end and are working toward that goal.

The Commissioners are also very aware of the need for improvement in drainage of water run-off locally and are doing some work toward improving that situation.

One of the great bottlenecks in drainage in many areas is just that -- a bottleneck! Too small flumes or culverts or pipes have been installed in many instances and they clog up easily or just do not carry enough water.

For instance, where the ditch is sloped across three feet and about 18-inches deep at the deepest point, that ditch may have a flume across a driveway that is 10" in diameter, or in some instances less! A pipe this size or smaller cannot carry the water of the full ditch, thus causing the ditch to overflow on someone's prop erty and causing further trouble or damage. This is not right and it should be corrected by the person who put in the flume, or when a person puts in a flume he should put in a large enough tin-horn to carry the full capacity of the

Commissioners David Mitchell and Austin Chriesman are taking steps to see that some of these "bottlenecks" are eliminated.

Extensive and costly weed cutting has been going on to rid barrow ditches of obstacles that would deter or prevent the flow of drainage, but this alone is not the answer.

People who put in flumes need to take the responsibility of having a large enough pipe to carry all the water and allow even for some accumulation of gravel in the bottom.

With the advent soon of football season, one thing that we wonder about -- and we wonder about this every year -- is how do the pep squads of some schools handle the names of their towns?

Amendments Are Subject to Approval Schedule Is Set Of Texas Voters

Fourteen proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas will be voted on by the people of the Lone Star State in the general election in November.

The full text of the 14 alterations to the constitution were published last week in The Times the first of four times.

A brief summary of the 14 proposed amendments is given below for the information of Terrell County residents:

No. 1: Amending Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the senate and house of representatives.

Amend ment No. 2: Amending Article IX, Section 6, of the Texas Constitution to abolish the Lamar County Hospital District.

No. 3: Amending Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution to require the commissioners courts in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973.

No. 4: Granting authority to the legislature to establish a constitutional revision commission which would report its recommendations no later than November 1, 1973, and providing that members of the 63rd Legislature would then be convened in January 1974 as a constitutional convention to serve 60 days for the purpose of drafting a new constitution for submission to the voters of Texas.

Amendment No. 5: Amending Article VIII, Section 2, relating to a tax exemption on certain property owned by a disabled veteran, to provide that exemptions, which would range from \$1,500 to \$3,000, be made on a graduated scale based on the percentage of the veteran's disability.

No. 6: Amending Article VIII, Section 1.b, of the Texas Constitution, to provide that the various political subdivisions of the state may exempt not less than \$3,000 of the value of residence homesteads of all persons 65 years or older from ad valorem taxes under certain con-No. 7: Amending Article 1

Damaging Rains Fall Last Friday 3½" in 25 Minutes

About 2-1/2 inches of rain fell late Friday afternoon locally, causing some damage locally when high water entered homes and some businesses.

The rain fell in less than 30 minutes.

Water entered the C.G. Morrison Co. store threatening entrance into other buildings on the south side of Oak St. and further east.

Several homes in the eastern end of town had water in them following the downpour.

Run-off was exceedingly heavy and is attested to by the size of the rocks that were washed into the streets by water which overflowed the barrow ditches, particularly on the north-south streets. With most of the drainage ditches on east-west streets being on the south side of the black-topping, the overflow of water from the north side of the streets often flows across the street and enters the drainage ditches in its southeastward flow.

A deluge of rain that fell west of Sanderson and just west of Longfellow caused some damage to the highway when the black-topping was washed away.

There was no damage reported by water that flowed down the canyon other than to water-gaps.

Heavy clouds and intermittent showers have prevailed since the middle of last week.

The rainfall has been widespread over the county, covering most of the county during the past week with heavy rainfall. All of the major canyons have been reported as having run heavily during some part of the past 10 days.

(a) All occupa-tion taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxa-tion public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no reve-nue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school pur-poses and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educa-tional and physical develop-ment of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such in-stitutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property mentioned in this Section shall be null and void.

"(b) The Legislature may, by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and

or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the

States who is classified as disabled by the Veterans' Administration or by a successor to that agency; or the military service in which he served. A veteran who is certified as having a disability of less than 10 percent is not entitled to an exemption. A veteran having a disability rating of not less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$1,500. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 30 percent but not more than 50 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,000. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 50 percent but not more than 70 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A veteran who has a disability rating of more than 70 percent, or a veteran who has a disability rating of not less than 10 percent and has attained the age of 65, or a disability rating the second se abled veteran whose disability consists of the loss or loss of use of one or more limbs, total blindness in one or both eyes, or paraplegia, may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$3,000. The spouse and chil-dren of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while on active duty will be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A deceased disabled veteran's surviving spouse and children may be granted an exemption which in the aggregate is equal to the exemption to which the decedent was entitled at the time he died."

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
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

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE resentatives shall not be invalid LEGISLATURE OF THE because of the anticipatory na-STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read

Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Hundred (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall re-ceive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature.
