| BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE <br> STATE OF TEXAS <br> Section 1. That <br> Article <br> XVII, Section 1 , Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows <br> at any regular session, or at special session when the matter is included within the purposes for which the session is convened, may propose amendments revising the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for statewide offices and propositions, as de- fined in the Constitution and statutes of this State. The date of the elections shall be specified by the Legislature. The proposal for submission must thirds of all the members elected to each House, entered by yeas and nays on the journals. <br> A brief explanatory statement of the nature of a proposed amendment, together with the date of the election and the wording of the prothe ballot, shall be published twice in each newspaper in the State which meets requirements set by the Legislature for the publication of official notices of officers and departments of the state government. The explanatory statement shall be prepared by the Secretary of State and shall be approved by the Attorney General. The Secretary of State shall send a full and complete copy of the proposed amendment or amendments to each county clerk who shall post the same in a public place in the | courthouse at least 30 days prior to the election on said amendment. The first notice shall be published not more than 60 days nor less than 50 days before the date of the election, and the second notice shall be published on the same day in the succeeding week. The Legislature shall fix the standards for the rate of charge for the publication, which may for the publication, which may paper's published national rate for advertising per column inch. <br> "The election shall be held in accordance with procedures prescribed by the Legislature, and the returning officer in each county shall make returns to the Secretary of State of the number of legal votes cast at the election for and against each amendment. If it appears from the returns that a majority of the votes cast have been it shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation thereof shall be made by the Governor." <br> Sec. 2. | BE IT RESOLVED BY THE <br> STATE OF TEXAS: <br> Section 1 . That Section 2 Article VIII Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: <br> 'Section 2. (a) All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious socie- ty ty, and which yierds no reve- nue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniused exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educa- tional and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit, and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all pows exempting property from taxation other than the property mentioned in this Section shall be null and void. <br> (b) The Legislature may, <br> by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the | armed services of the United States who is classified as dis abled by the Veterans' Administration or by a successor to that agency; or the military service in which he served. A veteran who is certified as having a disability of less than 10 percent is not entitled to an exemption. A veteran having a disability rating of not less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to ability rating of more than 30 percent but not more than 50 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to $\$ 2,000$. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 50 percent but not more than 70 exemption from taxation for property valued at up to disability rating of more than 70 percent, or a veteran who has a disability rating of not less than 10 percent and has attained the age of 65 , or a disabled veteran whose disability consists of the loss or loss of use of one or more iimbs, otal blindness in one or both eyes. or paraplegia, may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to $\$ 3,000$. The spouse and children of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while on active duty will be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to veteran's surviving spouse and children may be granted an exemption which in the aggreto which the decedent was entitled at the time he died." <br> Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposi- tion: "The constitutional amendment allowing certain tax exemptions to disabled veterans, their surviving spouses and surviving minor children, and the surviving spouses and surviving minor children of members of the armed forces who lose their life while on active duty. |
