There were 413 students at the beginning enrollment last year, according to the files of The Times.

Dove Season Begins Sept. 1

Dove season begins in Terrell County September 1 and runs to October 14, according to information received from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The season then is picked up again on January 6 to January 21 of 1973.

White-wing dove season in Terrell County is September 2,3,4, 1972.

On birds taken in counties where the white-wing season is oven, the retention of one fully-feathered wing on dressed doves is required when both mourning and whitewinged doves may be taken.

Daily bag limit on mourning doves is 10 and possession limit is 20, with the same on white-winged doves.

Shooting hours are from 12

noon to sunset. Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than 10-gauge. Hunting doves with rifles is prohibited.

A white-winged dove stamp for a \$3.00 fee is required of all persons who hunt whitewinged doves. This stamp is required in addition to the valid hunting license.

That's the way we look at it!

Representatives of the Young People's Chamber of Commerce met with the Board of Trustees of the Terrell County Independent School District Monday night to possibly initiate a survey to determine the interest in a lunch room for school children.

We do not know how much investigation -- if any -- has been done by the board concerning this possibility. We do not know anything ourselves about how much is involved in such a facility -- the amount of federal funds available, the cost to the local taxpayers, if any, or the requirements of personnel.

We will go further and state that we do not know what the YPCC has in mind in making the survey -- if they want a facility for only the students who ride to Sanderson on the buses, if it is for any or all of the local students, if it is only for one meal a day during school, or as some schools have - two meals a day, or what.

This is all stated to lead up to this!

There has to be some kind of a priority set on local needs, in our way of thinking. For example, there needs to be continual and costly improvements in the local drainage system, we need to consider the amount of tax money that will be necessary to maintain the flood control dams and channels for drainage of those reservoirs, there are many who think that there is a local need for a sewage system, as there is some apparent maximum saturation indicated in some areas; there is definitely a need for black-topping or seal-coating local streets in the near future; there is the possibility of the need of expenditure of a considerable sum of money to get a doctor to come here.

We have not tried to think of all the things we need or could use, nor have we tried to place them in any order of priority by our standards. They are things that come to mind that have been mentioned in the past as possible needs.

It may be that the lunch room should head the list. It may be that it should not. We do not know, and at this stage we do not have an opinion.

But if local taxes are involved -- and we are only presuming that they may be -we think it's time for everyone to start thinking about priorities.

As we have stated before -there are only so many tax dollars to be extracted from local taxpayers. We do not know, either, how near we

are to that saturation point! A lot would depend on how you look at it!

We believe that an education in taxes will be received by those who go into this!

(a) All occupa-tion taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educa-tional and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such in-stitutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the proper-ty mentioned in this Section shall be null and void.

"(b) The Legislature may by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran of by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran tive duty." veteran is a veteran of the

States who is classified as disabled by the Veterans' Administration or by a successor to that agency; or the military ser-vice in which he served. A veteran who is certified as having a disability of less than 10 percent is not entitled to an exemption. A veteran having a disability rating of not less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$1,500. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 30 percent but not more than 50 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,000. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 50 percent but not more than 70 percent but not more than 70 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A veteran who has a disability rating of more than 70 percent, or a veteran who has a disability rating of not less than 10 percent and has attained the age of 65, or a disabled veteran whose disability consists of the loss or loss of use of one or more limbs, total blindness in one or both eves. or paraplegia, may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$3,000. The spouse and chil-dren of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while on active duty will be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A deceased disabled veteran's surviving spouse and children may be granted an exemption which in the aggregate is equal to the exemption to which the decedent was entitled at the time he died."
