

The appointment was approved by Dr. Grover E. Murray, president, and announced by John A. Buesseler, M. D., vice-president for Health Affairs and dean of the School of Medicine.

Arredondo is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Rodolfo Arredondo of Sanderson. He graduated from Sanderson High School in 1962, received his B.S. from West Texas State University in 1971, and completed his work for the M.Ed. at Texas Tech this year.

Prior to his appointment at the School of Medicine, he served as a counselor for Project Upward Bound at Texas Tech and was involved in vocational, academic, and personal guidance and counseling of Project Upward Bound students. He holds a Permanent Provisional Secondary Certificate.

Cooksey Resigns Local Sheriff Post, To Teach in Odessa

Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey informed The Times Tuesday morning that he had given his resignation to County Judge R.S. Wilkinson, effective on September 15.

Cooksey stated that he had accepted a position with the Odessa Junior College as instructor in Police Science.

He said that he would be doing some classroom teaching and also some extension service teaching of officers in law enforcement agencies in this area.

Cooksey was also the nominee of the Democratic Primary for the office of sheriff, tax assessor-collector, and he stated that he was also asking that his name be removed from the ballot as the nominee from the primary election. His regular term as sheriff expired on January 1, 1973

Judge Wilkinson stated that routine procedures would be undertaken for calling a special meeting of the Terrell County Commissioners to consider the appointment of an interim sheriff to fill out the unexpired term of Cooksey.

The sheriff stated that he would publish a letter of explanation of his action and his gratitude to the citizens and officials of Terrell County for their cooperation during the time that he has held the office of sheriff.




