Jaycees' Fifth Annual Rodeo Begins Tomorrow

Last week when we were talking with Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr about the proposed new football stadium for Friona High School, he mentioned that the new stadium would be "completely enclosed."

I couldn't resist the opportunity to interject the statement "Oh, it's going to be a domed stadium, then?"

What Superintendent Farr was referring to was the bottom of the stadium, which will be solid, and wind-proof, and not a top for the new FHS structure. For a second there, we thought maybe we'd have something to rival the Houston Astrodome. (Or was it just the fact that I had been working on the Star's April Fool page, and still had a little devilment in me?)

Once again, our thanks to all of those people who were good-natured enough to allow us to poke a little fun their direction in last week's April Fool "spoof."

We understand there were some who took the "foolish" front page seriously for awhile. Just goes to prove -- you have to read the fine print in anything these days.

Speaking of the April Fool promotion, our hats are off to all the local merchants who went along with the fun. Almost all of the retail stores along Main Street had their employees in "April Fool" costume, and it added to the promotion greatly.

The waitresses at Friona Lanes Snack Bar caused some raised eyebrows by adding a little to the occasion. All they did was serve coffee in glasses and ice water in the coffee cups.

Bill Brandt brings us an eyewitness account of the "other side" of the Selma, Alabama racial disorders, and we thought we'd pass it along to our readers.

The story, clipped from an area newspaper, the Lynn County News of Tahoka, tells of a Tahoka resident who has relatives in Selma, and has visited them, having a first-hand view of the goings-on there.

Strangely enough, his report doesn't "give" with the reports we get in the national press and television.

The account was given by W. L. (Cap) Rowe, who has two sisters who live in Selma. He reports in the article that Selma, an old Southern town, has a population of 15,000 Negroes and 14,000 whites. The Negro schools are the best in town, and there are two fine Negro colleges there.

Until recently, there has been little racial hatred evident, Rowe says, and although the town was segregated, most white and Colored people are friends and have lived in harmony all these years.

Most of the Colored people are of the better class, and even during the recent racial strife, these folks have "no truck" with the disorders.

The Selma residents told the Tahoka man that trouble started when Rev. Martin Luther King came to town from Montgomery, escorted in a U. S. Government car. Selma sheriff James Clark and later Governor George Wallace questioned the use of a government car by a Civil Rights agitator.

This got into the national press, and King and government officials were embarrassed. As a result, Rev. King told them he would make Montgomery, Selma and Alabama sorry they gave him trouble over the government car use.

He kept his promise.

The Tahoka man tells of how most of the agitators who took part in the marches are outsiders, how they meet in the Negro section for their "orders."

Some of the local Negroes, mostly the "n'er do wells," do take part in the marches, and they try to get arrested, the man pointed out, because then they are paid \$7.50 for each arrest by the NAACP.

We had intended not to get into the Civil Rights discussion -- you get enough of it every day, anywhere you want it, but we thought you might be interested in this partial report of a West Texan who has visited Selma.

The Fifth Annual Junior Rodeo will kick off a three-day run tomorrow night at the Jaycee Arena west of Friona. Under the sponsorship of the Friona Junior Chamber of Commerce, the rodeo will continue Saturday night and Sunday afternoon.

As of Tuesday afternoon, a total of 38 entries had been received, and rodeo secretary Dale Williams predicted that

by rodeo time, the number of entries would be doubled.

"The rodeo has been getting bigger each year, and everything points toward this year's show being the biggest yet," Williams said.

Performances of the show Friday and Saturday nights will be at 8 p. m. each night. The Sunday performance will be at 2:30 p. m.

Through Tuesday, entries had

A \$10 entry fee, which entitles contestants to two go-rounds in each event, is charged. The exception is in the goat tying event, where a \$5 entry fee is charged.

Entries can still be mailed or called to Dale Williams or Robert Zetsche in Friona.

Trophies will be presented to the winners in each event as well as winners of each go-round.

The number of go-rounds in each event will be determined by the number of entries. Events include bare back bronc riding, bull riding, tie-down roping, goat-tying (girls and boys), barrel racing, pole bending and ribbon roping.

Ratjen Brothers of Happy are the stock producer for the show. A dance is set for Friday and Saturday nights following the rodeo performances at Eighth and Jackson in Friona.

The Friona Jaycees will operate a concession stand at each performance of the rodeo.

NEW HIGH SCHOOL SITE

City Annexes 24 Acres From School Property

The Friona City Council officially annexed 24.03 acres of school property at the new high school building site, and agreed to enter into contract with the school for paving adjacent to the property at its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

The city agreed to participate in the paving expense up to 15 per cent of the costs.

In opening ceremonies, the newly re-elected councilmen were sworn in for new terms.

In other business, the council approved the city entering into contract with Dan Etridge on sharing its proportionate costs of the water-sewer costs of the undeveloped portion of the first increment, Staley Addition number three, as per the new city ordinance.

A payment of \$1,637.30 to the engineering firm of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, for engineering fees on city water well number 6 was approved.

The city council also voted

to enter into contract with Jennings Flying Service for its annual mosquito control program, whereby all lakes within a two and one-half mile radius of the city are sprayed.

Councilmen gave their okay for the purchase of a budgeted item, a 12-foot gravel spreader with agitator, expected to aid tremendously with the application of gravel to "bleeding" streets during the spring and summer months.

An authorization of city funds to pay the water and electric bills for the Little League and Pony League baseball parks during the summer. A resolution was also passed establishing a "City Cleanup Week" as April 11-17.

The City Manager was authorized to solicit bids on a small tractor and shredder for the city's use.

In his monthly summary of activities at the City of Friona, City Manager A. L. (Jake) Out-

land stated that there were eight changes of ownership within the city during the month of March as reported by the county clerk's office.

Eight building permits were issued, Outland reported, for a total estimated construction worth \$62,300. Included in the permits are a residence valued at \$26,000; an industrial warehouse at \$23,000; a portable cement plant at \$10,000, three additions estimated at \$1,700 and two shop alterations at \$1,600.

The water department reported that four new service taps were made during the month to bring the total active meters to 991 as of March 31. The concrete ground storage tank at the west plant (Sixth and Grand) was painted light blue during the month. This is in keeping with the state health department policy, and also improves the appearance of the area considerably.

The city fire department recorded only three fire alarms during March, one inside the city limits for an estimated damage of \$500, and two outside the city for an estimated \$2,000 loss.

Fire Chief Shirley and Assistant Chief Reeve left March 30 for North Branch, Minnesota to inspect, approve and receive the new fire truck and pumper ordered last November.

The police department reported 39 arrests during the month. Of these, 26 were for traffic violations, five for drunkenness, three for driving while intoxicated.

Imposters Get Check Locally

Three men, impersonating employees of Deaf Smith Rural Electric Cooperative, secured a check in the amount of \$300 from Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Flipplin, Sr., it was reported by company officials this week.

However, the men were unsuccessful in an attempt to cash the check at a local store, Allen's Jewelry, and in the meantime payment was stopped on the check.

Leo Forrest, manager of Deaf Smith County REC, reminded patrons that all of the cooperative's trucks have the sign plainly visible. "Also, if he calls himself an 'REA man,' he is probably an imposter," Forrest said, in urging other patrons to be on the lookout for such impersonators in the future.

NIGHT FINALS SCHEDULED

Twenty-Four Chieftains Enter District 3-AA Meet

Twenty-four members of the Friona High School track team will enter events in the District 3-AA track and field championships at Olton Saturday.

In a change from the routine, the finals in the district meet will be held at night under the lights, to enable more fans the opportunity to witness the meet. Preliminaries for four divisions (seventh, eighth, ninth grades and varsity) begin at 7:30 p. m. Running finals start at 7:30 p. m.

Head track coach Bob Owen figures that the Chieftains will be battling for third place in the district meet, with Abernathy and Floydada fighting it out for the top spot, according to early-season meet results.

However, the Chieftains have several entries who should place high in the meet.

For instance, the Chieftains have one of the top sprinters in the entire area in Danny Murphree, who will be a threat to win both the 100 and 220-yard dashes. Murphree is unbeaten in the latter race and

has posted a 22.1 timing, one of the top times of the entire state.

Murphree will also enter the pole vault and will run a leg on the mile relay.

Contract Given For Roadwork

A contract for 8,867 miles of construction on F.M. Road 2013 in Farmer County has been awarded to a Lubbock firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Kerr Construction Company submitted the low bid of \$125,750.94 on the project, which includes grading, structures, base and surfacing from New Mexico State Line, E. and S. to present FM 2013 at Rhea Community.

The job is expected to take 110 working days, according to O. L. Crain, District Highway Engineer at Lubbock.

Rhea E. Bradley, Resident Engineer at Littlefield will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

Who Should Pay For Teacher' Pay Raise?

The Texas Legislature now in session, has many problems facing it, and one which looms very large are the proposals to increase salaries of Texas Public school teachers.

The difference of opinion concern how much teachers should receive (Texas ranks 29th nationally), when they should receive it, and most important, who should pay for it.

The latter point may well be the point on which the issue turns. In essence the T.S.T.A. proposal, which calls for an increase of \$45. per month, and will cost a total of \$42 million for the year 1965-66, will have the state paying \$33.6 million or 80% and the local districts paying \$8.4 million or 20% of the cost. The 80-20 breakdown is the same as it is today under the Minimum Foundation Program.

The Governor's bill offers \$90. per year for the next ten years and for the years 1965-66 would cost a total of 19.1 million, but under this plan, the state would be paying only \$5.3 million or 28% and the local districts would be paying \$13.8 million or a whopping 72% of the total cost.

No final decisions will be made until sometime in late April or May, as both bills are now in committee and the general appropriations bill must be finally passed.

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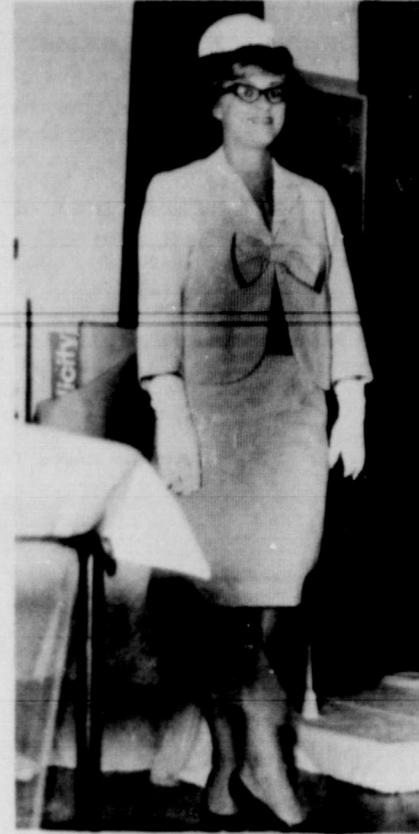

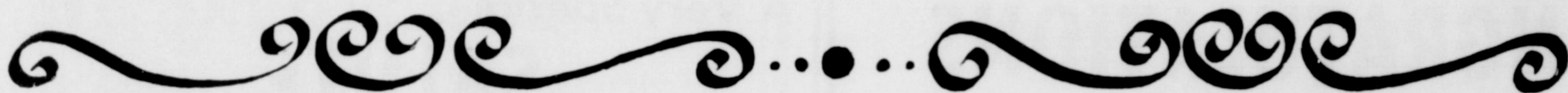



Friona Preacher Secures Patent On His Invention

Rev. Russell McAnally, pastor of Friona Methodist Church, in addition to his many other facets, is an inventor.

About three years ago he built a device that can be used as a footstool, coffee table and an exerciser. He calls his invention the "Loller," and began by making them for friends.

Baker Duggins encouraged Rev. McAnally to get a patent on the Loller and attempt to sell a few. Members of the McAnally family have worked and produced about 100 which are now on sale. If there is an

interest in his product, Rev. McAnally plans to try producing them on a larger scale.

The Loller has one flat side and one curved side, enabling it to be used in many different ways. Children love to rock on it, though its primary purpose is for exercise. Rev. McAnally claims that almost any type of exercise can be done with it to take off pounds or to just keep trim.

He has produced a brochure explaining the dozen or so different positions for its use. Sheryl Long and Merylene Messie modeled a series of photos for the brochure to demonstrate the Loller.

They show standing, sitting and lying exercises as well as the two footstool positions. The rounded side is turned up for use with a straight chair and the flat side is up for use with a rocker. When turned on its side, it becomes a small coffee or coke table.

Rev. McAnally has been designing and building "things" for many years.

"Some of my ideas have turn-

ed out useful items. Others we have laughed at and thrown away," the Methodist pastor explains.

He "carried the idea around" in his head for a long time before he took the time to build the original model for the Loller. Then one day while lounging on the stool, he realized his muscles were being exercised while he relaxed. Thus the name "Loller" came into being.

The McAnally's son, Danny, has spent many hours in the garage of the parsonage to get the first hundred stools made. They will sell for \$22.50 and \$25.00.

"The trouble with most people in the matter of exercising is that they make it into work and feel that they have a 'stick with it or die' situation," McAnally states. "Exercising with the Loller is fun."

McAnally has been advised by a manufacturer to make 100 stools and put them on sale. In this manner he can tell if there is a demand for the product. If enough are sold, a company can be employed to manufacture them and if not, there will be no large investment lost.

The newly patented Loller is now on display at the local Ben Franklin Store.

1. Make local districts pay 20% of this increase for teacher salaries.
2. State will continue to pay textbook costs and teacher retirement matching costs. (WHY SADDLE LOCAL DISTRICTS WITH THIS ADDITIONAL COST?)
3. State has many tax sources other than real estate.

THIS PROGRAM WILL AFFECT TAXES AS FOLLOWS:

1. Make local districts pay 72% of this increase for teacher salaries.
2. Make local districts pay 20% of the cost of textbooks and 20% of teacher retirement deposits.
3. Cause local school property taxes to be increased immediately.
