

any way you look at it!) for about \$19,000.00 as our part of the Revenue Sharing fund.

We have noticed that some cities have sent their money back for some reason or other, and that's their business. But it seems rather ridiculous to us to send it back. It doesn't save anybody anything!

If everyone would send back all the federal money they get as some kind of a hand-out, we would scream "Hooray" be sincere about it. But if only a few keep the money and the dole continues, then the few who keep the money are the ones who come out ahead and everyone else is the loser.

The same thing is true with the doles given the ranchmen through the soil conservation guise, the money given the schools to increase their capabilities, the doles or grants put out by the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission, and all the other sources of federal "gifts" -- refusal of a small number of the recipients of those funds to accept the money only means more money for those who do accept it.

And it seems strange to us to accept one of the doles and to refuse another one.

But maybe it depends on how you look at it!



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

# Extension Granted Hiway Sign Owners

The Texas Highway Commission has extended the license and permit filing deadline for owners of signs along interstate and primary highways.

The Commission extended the filing deadline from December 31 to June 30, 1973. Advertising industry and individual sign owners requested the extension because the previous deadline did not permit sufficient time to comply with the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The Act requires a permit for each existing of planned sign. Also, anyone erecting or maintaining signs within 660 feet of an Interstate or Federal-aid highway must have a license to engage in outdoor advertis-

Sign owners are advised to apply for a license and all necessary sign permits as soon as possible since no further extension of the deadline is contemplated.

The State license fee of \$25 is valid for an indefinite period. In addition, sign owners are required to post a \$2,500 bond in each county in which they have signs. Maximum bonds of \$10,000 are required of owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond applications are available through the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department, P.O.Box 5075, Austin, Texas 78763.

In addition, owners must obtain a \$5 permit for each sign. Permits for new signs will not be issued unless they conform to the law. Sign permit application forms can be obtained from the right of way sections of Highway Department district offices.
