We were unable to verify at the time whether or not it was an immediate termination or a termination of the program at the end of the fiscal year of the government.

There was an allocation of \$30,343.00 for Terrell County ranchers to be used during 1973. The money was to have been distributed among applicants for cross fences, livestock water storage, pipelines, well drilling, and various brush control measures. But not now!

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Bible in Every Home is One Aim of 'Key '73' Campaign

One of Christianity's biggest evangelistic crusades a yearlong effort known as Key '73, got under way in the United States and Canada this year.

Through the rest of this year participating church and denominations hope to saturate both countries with the Christian Gospel in a kind of "evangelistic blitz".

More than 130 Christian organizations, including several Roman Catholic dioceses, have joined Key '73.

Nationally, it has been endorsed by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops and the National Council of Churches. The National Association of Evangelicals, however, has not endorsed it.

National coordinator of Key '73 is Rev. Dr. Theodore A. Raedeke of St. Louis, who served 14 years in the evangelism deparment of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

Dr. Raedeke says crusade participants hope to get a Bible of some sort into every Christian dwelling in the U.S. and Canada this year.

He said the purpose of Key '73 is to "confront the people of our continent more fully and more forcefully with the Gospel of Jesus Christ by proclaiming, demonstration, witness, and ministry, in word and deed.

He said Key '73 is not designed to launch another ecumenical movement or coax churches into some new ecclesiastical structure.



To safeguard autonomy of doctrine and practice, Key '73 has been set up so that participants can develop their own programs.

The broad-based movement got its start more than five years ago when several leading conservative churchmen responded favorably to an editorial in "Christianity Today" an evangelical Protestant publication, calling for a pooling of resources to propagate the Gospel.

The first meeting was called by Dr. Carl F.H. Henry, former editor of the magazine, and Dr. Billy Graham. The meeting was held in a motel near the Francis Scott Key Bridge in Washington, D.C., hence the name - Key '73.

In the early Key '73 discussions, some uncertainty existed over how deeply the crusade should grapple with the social issues.

This was largely resolved at the 1969 U.S. Congress on Evangelism in Minneapolis when evangelist Leighton Ford of the Billy Graham organization urgently called on evangelicals to confront social problems more squarely in terms of the Christian Gospel.


