

# Gas, Distillate Discovery Made

A Pennsylvanian detrital gas discovery was assured in Terrell County with the flowing of gas for 12 hours at the stabilized rate of 950,000 cubic feet daily, along with 17 barrels of distillate and 28 barrels of water at Seco Production Co., Midland, No. 1 Allison, in 17-B2-CCSD&RGNG, six miles southeast of Sheffield and five miles southeast of Pennsylvanian detrital, South production in the Butte multipay field.

Flow was through an unreported choke and perforations at 9,172-206 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons.

Earlier, it flowed for six hours on a 15-64-inch choke, making gas at the rate of 879,000 cubic feet daily, along with 17 barrels of distillate and 17 barrels of water Testing continued.

Formerly drilled by Gulf Oil Corp. as the No. 1 Allison U-Unit, it was plugged and abandoned Oct. 2, 1959 at 11,697 feet in the Ellenburber.

## Cold Weather Hits Hard Briefly

The cold weather that came to the Southwest last weekend was short-lived, but severe during the time that it was here.

Saturday morning there was heavy sleet on the ground and some snow had fallen during the night, but all traces of the cold falling weather was gone locally by noon.

Heavier ice and snow was reported in the northern part of the county with severe ice conditions reported on FM 2400 and parts of US 285 between the junction of FM 2400 and Fort Stockton.

Damage was reported to utility lines west of Sanderson and REA service was knocked out due to icy condition, broken lines and some broken poles, according to word received.

Heavy fog came in locally during the morning and left only moisture from light mist. The fog was present through the early morning hours Sunday and came back again on Sunday night.

#### One Killed In Head-On Crash Near Dryden

One person was killed and three were injured in a two-vehicle accident six miles east of Dryden about 5:45 p.m. on Monday, according to Texas Highway Patrolman Ben Lockhart, who investigated the accident.

The head-on crash resulted when the passenger car driven by Raul Reyes of Kingsville was west-bound and at the top of a hill crossed into the east-bound lane of traffic and hit the pick-up truck driven by Mrs. Claude O. Speed Jr., 45, of Wimberly, according to the report of Patrolman Lockhart.

Injured in the accident and taken to a Del Rio hospital for treatment were Mr. Speed, 45, who was in the pick-up; Reyes, 33, and Maria Garcia, 58, also of Kingsville, who was in the vehicle with Reyes.

The body was taken to the Janes Funeral Home in Ozona. Justice of the Peace W.G. Shoemaker served as coroner at the accident.



system for estimating the market value of all taxable property in the state.

This is just another of the many examples of a fact that should be well known to all people by now: if local people don't do certain things, then there will be some agency of the state or federal government, or both, that will step in and see that it's done-their

The Board is reported to have said that if the legislature fails to enact a system for estimating the market value of all taxable property in the state, then the state should assume all basic educational costs and pay them by state tax sources. Full state funding was proposed by the board's public school finance committee in a report issued November 11. The plan was re-examined by the new board members when they took over in January and was re-issued in substantially the same form by a newly appointed committee after their recent meeting.

The State Board did not adopt the new committee's view, but the recommendations of a "task force" of top Texas Education Agency officals. These recommendations would boost the cost of the minimum foundation program by almost a billion dollars by 1978, according to information received, and the local taxpayers' annual share would rise from \$282 million to an estimated \$740 million, counting the "enrichment" expenditures, by 1978.

The chief recommendation. says the foundation school program should be financed by both state and local funds, but the complex economic index method of determining a local district's share should be abandoned.

It's going to be interesting to watch how education is equalized -- especially since teachers' qualifications are not any more equal than are the abilities of the students.

At least, that's the way we look at it!

#### **Burned Trestle** Halts SP Traffic

A 270-foot timber trestle at Haymond on the Southern Pacific railroad, 43 miles west of here, was completely destroyed by fire last week. The trestle was 22 feet above the ground at the deepest point of the streambed. The fire was discovered Monday afternoon and train service was halted for about 24 hours before the "shoo-fly" was built around the destroyed trestle.

Work has been going on all week on a replacement trestle, built of steel and pre-stressed concrete, according to information received from the construction site.

Haymond is located about 10 miles south of the highway from Lemons Gap west of Sanderson.

Local volunteer fireman took the fire truck to the site of the blaze and were joined there by units from Marathon and Alpine. They were unable to save any of the bridge because of the time lapsed between their notification and arrival at the site.

The passenger train and the SP's fast "symbol" freight trains were detoured over the Texas and Pacific, rejoining the SP at Sierra Blanca during the time service was discontinued because of the fire. This was the second time in as many weeks that service has been blocked west of Sanderson, the other time being due to a derailment near Alpine.

It is also the second time in as many weeks that the fire truck has been called out into the country for a fire, the previous time being to the ranch of Mrs. Mary Cox when grass fires threatened her pens, outbuildings, and ranch house. The truck's water was able to keep the flames from damaging anything besides the rangeland.

Making our environment cleaner, quieter, and safer is everyone's responsibility. And by starting at home to reduce indoor pollution you can make an important contribution toward the improvement of precious resources.

Of course, you'll want to support recycling centers, reuse as many things as possible, and save on water and electricity. But there are many small things you can do to help keep your home in the clear, and your budget in balance, too.

Some of the following suggestions from the home economists of the American Gas Association may come as a surprise. For example, if you eliminate excessive humidity from any part of your home, reduce a lot of indoor

d grease. Adequate at fans in the windows of the kitchen, bathroom or laundry are a great help.

A ventilating hood with a fan over a range also is a help in removing grease-laden moisture before it settles on walls and ceiling. Another neat trick is a splatter-mesh lid to cover frying pans; it eliminates a lot of work in keeping a stove clean. So does wiping up spills immediately with a damp detergent-dipped cloth.


Cover saucepans when feasible to cook food faster and use less fuel. Watch that high flame, too; it's seldom needed for long, and a low flame will do as well. Since water boils at only one temperature, slow boiling or even simmering in a covered pot produces better results than fast boiling.

And don't take a long time to preheat the oven.

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

#### Phone Calls Can **Establish SS Pay**

People can now establish an application filing date for monthly social security payments by making a telephone call to any social security office, according to social security officials here.

"Dates of application for benefits should be established when is appears you may not be able to return a signed application to social security until the following month and may lose some benefits," a spokesman said. "And when you call you must express your intention to claim benefits.

"The date you apply for social security benefits can be important," he said, "especially if retroactive payments are

involved."

People who fail to apply for social security payments at the time they become eligible may be able to get back payments -- but only for up to 12 months before the month they apply. "The date of application helps determine how many months can be paid in back payments," the spokesman said.

Previously the date was established by the postmark on a written inquiry about benefits or the time a written application was received in a social security office.


