# Sheriff Hogg Injured Monday In Turn-Over

Terrell County Sheriff Dalton Hogg narrowly escaped serious injuries shortly after noon Monday about 4 miles east of Sanderson in an accident. He received a concussion, multiple and severe bruises, and possible broken ribs in the accident.

Sheriff Hogg was driving his pickup truck and pulling a trailer with two sows and several piglets which he had just bought. On the western slope of 5-mile hill the trailer apparently started swerving. The pick-up truck went off both sides of the black-top before overturning. It was demolished as a result of the accident.

Hogg was taken to an Alpine hospital for examination and treatment.

Rex Roberts placed 5th in the high jump with 5'8", and won the broad jump with 191. Phillips was 6th in the broad jump with 16'9".

Jim Cash vaulted 11'6" for 1st place in that event.

Kendrick Harrell was entered in the 100-yard dash with Ja Chriesman. Harrell, Roberts, and Chriesman ran in the 220yard dash. Montalvo and Chriesman were also in the 440-yard dash. Watson was entered in the 120-yard high hurdles; Kline was a pole vaulter; and the 440-yard relay team was composed of Harrell, Phillips, Cash, and Roberts, and did not place because of a

dropped baton. Coach Willie Myers stated that there was an extremely strong wind all during the track meet which resulted in some difficult running and

field events competition. Rankin, Sonora, and Iraan were in the first three places in the meet, and following Sanderson were Marfa, Eldorado, Irion County, Balmorhea, Paint Rock, Wink, Grandfalls, and Buena Vista.

The approval of the medical group was one of the hurdles which had to be crossed in the effort to secure the services of a physician here through the National Health Service Corps and the local committee was apprised of the approval by the Society Saturday following their meeting Friday.

The NHSC was notified of the approval of the application by the 9-County Big Bend Medical Society.

And some people are much more concerned about certain issues than they are others! And all of this is only natural, maybe, since we are all human. Few people would be tolerant of a massive number of illegal voters here, for example, but would be tolerant in lax enforcement, or no enforcement of the rest of the election laws.

It just depends on how you look at it!

And getting back to taxes to support the schools over the state -- Sen. Pete Snelson, in a speech to the Texas Press Association's West Texas organization in Midland recently stated: The courts have said that the wealth of a school district cannot be the criteria for future financing. All future school financing in the state is affected by the court suit on the Edgewood District of San Antonio. Public school financing has been challenged in the courts in 30 states.

There is no question in the minds of most people who have done some serious thinking on the matter but that if the states don't do something to equalize the financing of the districts more equally than they are, then someone is going to step in and see that it is done in a way to suit -- not the state or the school district -- but Big Daddy Federal Government!

We like to consider ourselves individualists and independent and all of those nice words to explain what we would like to consider ourselves. But whatever we would like in that respect, we are not going to be, because the days of individual ism are over when inequality is a factor to be considered.

And we really bring all of this on ourselves!

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# HOW TO GET MORE TAX VALUE

Continuing large federal deficits, particularly during periods of high economic activity, are a major cause of inflation which most of us encounter every day in rising prices. Therefore, it is only logical to attempt to control federal spending by cutting back or eliminating inefficient programs and those that have outlived their usefulness.

An individual citizen has a hard time judging which cuts should be made, but he should be applauding efforts by the Administration and many congressmen and senators to keep federal spending in line with federal revenue. Inevitably some programs he likes will be cut back.

He shouldn't be too upset if one of his favorite "federal aid" projects is reduced because such aid is often a bad bargain anyway. By the time the tax dollar makes a round trip to Washington and back home, it is substantially reduced by bureaucratic handling. We'd get a lot more for our tax money if we decided what governmental services we wanted locally and paid for them. And, of course, if we control inflation, such public spending, as well as our personal and business spending, would bring us better value for our dollars.
