# ISTEN TO LUKE

We read a story syndicated by Associated Press last week and we are quoting the first two paragraphs of that story: "Texas must upgrade its jails if it wants to avoid federal court orders that would force reform, says Dr. Charles Freil, director or a jail research institute at Sam Houston State University. Unless we put these jails in order soon, the courts are going to put them in order for us, probably at a greater cost, Freil told a House State Affairs sub-committee Wednesday night."

We know that this is just an opinion of Dr. Freil, but his opinion is shared by many and we would be more than just naive if we continue to ignore the warnings of many and not begin to do something to avoid intervention by higher authori-

The story goes on to say that under the present law, counties are required to meet certain minimum standards, but there is no penalty if they do not. There is a bill now before the state legislature that would create a state commission on jail standards, made up of a director of the Department of Corrections and six persons to be appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. Of the six, one would have to be a county judge, one a sheriff, and one a medical doctor. The commission would establish minimum standards for jails in Texas, and could order prisoners moved to an adequate jail, with the cost to be paid by the county failing to meet the standards set down by the law.

And there is always the possibility that it would be cheaper to transport prisoners to other jails and pay for their incarceration in some area jail. It might be very inconvenient for local law enforcement officers, but it may be better. We don't know the answer to that!

There is no point in anyone trying to play "ostrich" about something like that, and say that if we ignore it, it may go away. Or there is not any justification in saying: "if the news media would shut up, maybe nothing will have to be done about it" -- or anything else!

Locally, we can remember when a fire on the top floor jail of our courthouse caused one person to be overcome by smoke and might have caused one or two deaths had the fire department or someone else not been able to get there in time. We can remember that incident, because the person who was overcome by the smoke weighed a bunch of pounds and the carrying wasn't easy. And we can also remember when a woman was overcome by smoke from a fire in the downstairs cell and died as a result of that incident. And we can remember that because it was not easy to act as a coroner under those conditions, knowing that that woman had as much right to protection, even from her own foolish (by our standards) de-

# Accident Tally Of Texas Motorists Noted by DPS

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that a record 3,688 persons died last year in 3,099 fatal traffic crashes on the streets and highways of Texas. Another 128,158 persons were injured in 83,607 injury accidents.

Rural areas led in traffic deaths, but city crashes produced the greatest number of reported injuries.

Overall, a total of 432,998 traffic accidents were reported last year in the state. Reported accidents increased 10 per cent from the 394,166 occurring in 1971.

The total economic loss to Texans from traffic accidents during 1972 was \$1-billion, 35-million. (\$1,035,000,000)

Looking at some of the 1972 traffic statistics, there were eight fatal accidents last year in which six or more died for a total of 57 deaths. In one of these accidents 10 were killed and another resulted in nine fatalities.

For the second year in a row, July had the most traffic deaths--404. This is the first time Texas has ever had 400 or more persons killed in one month.

September 20 was the only day of the year on which no traffic deaths were recorded.

# Wildcat Slated In NE of County

HNG Oil Co., Midland, will drill a 7,500-foot wildcat in Terrell County, 22 miles southwest of Sheffield, 5 1/2 miles southeast of the one-well K-M (Ellenburger gas) field and 6 3/4 miles southeast of the one-well Little Canyon (Strawn gas) field and 5 3/4 miles west of 6,221-foot Wolfcamp gas prodection in a northwest area of the Brown-Bassett multipay field. It is the No. 1-53 Korn.

Location is 730 feet from the north and 900 feet from the east lines of 53-1-TCRR, Abst. 996. Ground elevation is 2,417 feet.

It is also a northwest twin to a 7,000-foot failure, Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 Annie Spencer, abandoned Jan. 9, 1961, after unseccessful tests of the Wolfcamp through perforations at 6,471-518 feet. It flowed gas at the maximum rate of 588,000 cubic feet daily and recovered 93 feet of gas-cut mud on a drillstem test at 6,473-6,525 feet. A subsequent test at 6,579-618
