state legislature that would state legislature that would
create a state commission on jail standards, made up of a director of the Department of Corrections and six persons to be appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. Of the six, one
would have to be a county judge, one a sheriff, and one medical doctor. The comm ission would establish minimum standards for jails in Texas, and could order prisoners moved to an adequate jail, with the cost to be paid by the county failing to meet the
standards set down by the law.

today that a record 3,688 persons died last year in 3,099 fatal traffic crashes on the streets and highways of Texas Another 128,158 persons were injured in 83,607 injury acci-
dents. dents.
Rural areas led in traffic deaths, the greatest number of eported injuries. Overall, a total of 432,998 raffic accidents were reporte last year in the state. Reportedent from the 394,166 occurring in 1971 .
The total economic loss to Texans from traffic accidents during 1972 was $\$ 1$-billion, 35-milion. ( $\$ 1,035,000,000$ ) Looking at some of the 1972 traffic stat istics, there were in which six or more died for total of 57 deaths. In one of these accidents 10 were killed and another resulted in nine fatalities.
