LISTEN TO LUKE

 Every once in a while a bit of choice information comes through the mail. We have commented on it from time to time, and this week a news release just has to be quoted. The release concerned keeping snakes away from our homes; and since I have been plagued in the past with the presence of copperheads from time to time, this was one of the items that we thought we would be interested in intensely.

And we were until we got to the fourth paragraph and read: "The best preventive medicine for snakes is to keep them away from people. 'A snake bite is not a pest. Only when it comes in contact with human activities is a pest situation created.'"

Now this is what we call real thinking! And it sparked many more thoughts: The other pests that we have in the world -- mosquitoes, lions, eagles, mosquitoes, boll weevils, screwworms, and on and on and on, are not really pests if we could keep them away from the things that they pester! This would eliminate not the pest itself, but the action of the thing (animal or insect) that causes to be a pest, and then we would look on it with a much greater love and kindness.

The avenues of thought that were generated from this classification statement are so numerous that we hesitate to go further with them -- in fact we won't! We will close this part of the discussion with another classic by the same person. He did not give a way to really get rid of the pests except to use a long-handled instrument such as a shovel or hoe to kill them, after being sure they are poisonous. But he did say:

Holes in yard fences and buildings should be blocked. This statement follows the leading habits of snakes, the possibility of poisoning or trapping snakes, and removing all food and cover as a means of reducing the premises of snakes. The only trouble with stopping up all the holes in fences and buildings, is that it causes snakes to pile up outside our yard, which is in the yard of our neighbors, and that is not neighborly at all.

After considerable (?) deliberation, we decided that we would not release to the world, to our readers, that we believe that our system of snake dance is about as good as the next person's -- have a system that lets you know they are there, and a shotgun to kill them when you find them, and hope that the dog finds all of the snakes that come into the yard and that you have something to kill them with.

 We continue to wonder as we wander through life what are the thoughts of some people in an area of friendship, or competition, or love. It seems to be a kind of some kind that all's in love, war, and business. That when we get through fighting, fighting, and cutting someone's throat, we should be friends again and be concerned

Grant Issued For Family Planning

Governor Dolph Briscoe this week announced his approval of a community action grant of \$50,597 in new federal funds to Permian Basin Planned Parenthood, Inc. in Odessa for continuing operation of the agency's Family Planning program for six months, effective retroactively to February 1 of this year.

The grant is funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act. The Family Planning Program will serve some 3,400 low-income women in Midland, Ector, Reeves, Pecos, Terrell Counties. Services will include medical examinations and counseling and provision of contraceptives on request.

Oil, Gas Discovery Finaled in County

Seco Production Co., Midland, completed as an upper Pennsylvanian gas discovery and will dually complete as a Pennsylvanian detrital gas discovery its No. 1 Allison, Terrell County re-entry operation six miles south of Sheffield and five miles southeast of Pennsylvanian detrital, South production in the Yucca Butte multipay field.

It was finalized for a calculated absolute open flow of 1.34 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through upper Pennsylvanian perforations at 9,954-9,060 feet, not previously reported. No treatment was reported.

Operator was taking potential through Pennsylvanian detrital perforations at 9,172-206 feet from which flow stabilized overnight at the rate of 1.5 million cubic feet daily.

An 11-697-foot Ellenburger failure, it originally was drilled by Gulf Oil Corporation as the No. 1 Allison Unit, and abandoned Oct. 2, 1959.

Location is 1,980 feet from the north and 1,440 feet from the east lines of section 17, Block B-2, CCSDERGNG Survey.







such time the grant is funded. The vendor will then have 90 days to start delivery of equipment and 300 days to complete the project.

The results of the communications project when implemented will produce an integrated system of law enforcement radio communications which will be both intraregional and intrastate. The program will replace existing law enforcement radio equipment in the participating agencies with new high band equipment to provide clearer and more versatile communications between base stations and mobile units and between agencies in different cities. This is part of a statewide change over of communications equipment for law enforcement agencies.

Selective Service Registration Laws Still In Effect

Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, has issued a statement reminding young men of their responsibility under Federal law to register with Selective Service.

"The recent nationwide announcement that the draft has ended has misled some of our young men into thinking they no longer are required by law to register with Selective Service. This is incorrect!", Col. Glantz said.

The state director pointed out the fact that Selective Service is being reorganized into a stand-by operation to keep draft machinery operative and ready in case of a national emergency that requires the drafting of young men again in the near future. He pointed out that although inductions have ended -- the Selective Service System continues to operate and the law continues to require each young man to register with Selective Service within 30 days before or after his 18th birthday.

Failure to register makes a young man subject to prosecution under federal law with a severe penalty upon conviction.

During the reorganization of the system into a stand-by basis, registration may be completed at any one of the 63 Selective Service System Area Offices that will remain open in Texas - or at points in every Texas County where volunteer workers will assist the young men in the simple steps of registration.
