Mounted on a gold-covered screen were caricatures of the

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
seniors, the Spanish motif being used with their individual photos. The caricatures were given as favors to the seniors later.

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
O.D. GRAY'S BROTHER DIES

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



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

People 65 and over without Medicare **Hospital Insurance Can Apply Now**

Starting July 1, people 65 and over who haven't been able to get Medicare hospital insurance before may be eligible and they can apply for the protection now, according to social security officials here.

"Previously, to get Medicare hospital insurance, you had to be 65 or over and either eligible for social security payments or have a certain amount of social security work credit," a spokesman said. "Under recent amendments to the social security law, people 65 or over who were not eligible before may now purchase Medicare hospital insurance protection. To get this protection, however, they must also sign up for the medical insurance part of Medicare.

"This new provision is designed to extend hospital insurance coverage to people 65 or over who have little or no work credit under social security and are un-

able to get comparable insurance through private companies," he said.

The initial premium for hospital insurance will be \$33 a month plus \$6.30 a month for medical insurance. "The protection will begin July 1, 1973, for people who sign up before June 1," the spokesman said.

"This year, you can sign up as late as August 31," he said. "If you delay past May 31, though, coverage will begin later. If you delay past August 31, you can sign up in the first 3 months of any year."

Medicare hospital insurance helps pay for hospital bills and many related expenses.

The medical insurance part of Medicare helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses not covered by the hospital insurance. It is funded by individual premiums and by general revenue.

Nuclear-powered cardiac pacemakers developed for the Atomic Energy Commission by ARCO Nuclear Company of Leechburg, Pa., a subsidiary of Atlantic Richfield Co., have been implanted in humans.

The nuclear heart pacers are designed to operate for at least 10 years compared with the two or three year life of conventional batterypowered devices. The longer life of the nuclear pacemakers could mean fewer operations for those who require a pacemaking device to regulate their heartbeats.




