There are few things that could be more important for the students than these achievements and also knowing that it makes some kind of difference to someone else whether or not they make any achievements.

We would not labor under any kind of disillusionment that any students is striving for some degree of excellence in their grades so that they can have their names printed in the paper, or this kind of a blanket commendation for their efforts, but we feel sure that any person is pleased when someone notices that he has accomplished something. And we know that we are glad to recognize and acknowledge the accomplishments of the young people -and old ones, too!

We would not want to be misunderstood by any stretch of the imagination and be thought to be belittling those who have made higher levels of accomplishment in track and field events and in twirling, but we would like to see, also, some students who discipline themselves to the task of attaining some higher levels of accomplishment in some of the literary events of University Interscholastic League competition. Mental exercise or development, too, is a very rewarding adventure. Probably we have stated before, but it is worth stating again, that there are some students who demonstrate a great amount of self-discipline in making even barelypassing grades, and the same thing is true from there on up, and the mark on the card is not, by any means, a true picture of the mental or academiic ability of the student, but rather of what he did during particular time. Mental effort, or success, in other words is not measured by an excellent mark, but is an immeasweable quantity of knowledge

#### Wool Prices High At Recent Sale Here

Prices continued strong on area-grown 8-months and 12months wool that was offered for bids here Tuesday of last week. It was the second sealed-bid sale of the season for the Sanderson Wool Commission Co.

About 221,550 pounds of 12-months spring clip sold for prices ranging from \$1.04 cents per pound, grease basis, up to a high of \$1.42 per pound, grease basis. The average price was about \$1.23 per pound, grease basis.

The price for 8-months wool clips ranged from 88¢ to \$1.04 per pound, grease basis for an average of just under \$1.00 per pound, grease basis.

as an elder and accepted into the conference in full connec-

The conference will also take action on eight amendments to the denomination's constitution referred by the 1972 General Conference.

One proposal would give laymen a vote on such matters as ordination, character and conference relation of a minister.

The second would permit each of the 76 annual conferences in the 10.6 million member denomination to elect as many additional lay members as necessary to equalize lay and ministerial membership in the annual conference.

A third proposal would remove the 21-years-of-age qualification for delegates to General Conference.

Other amendments deal with boundary changes within the denomination, substitution of nouns and pronouns in the constitution and a provision to permit more frequent meeting of the general church body.

The conference council on Higher Education and Campus Ministry will report to the conference and this report is expected to go a long way in determining the future emphasis of campus ministry. Rev. Clyde Chesnutt of Grace United Methodist Church of El Paso is chairman of the council.

The Camps Board is expected to propose a long range plan of development and an architects plan of the Sacramento Camp between now and 1980 with developing being in three phases.

The Annual Session will also honor retiring ministers and hold a memorial service for pastors in the New Mexico Conference who have died within the past year.




