There are somethings not good for the town, there are some things not good for people, and there are some things not good for us. We sincerely try to have the town and its residents at heart, and certainly ourselves and the business, but there are decisions to make. New Tracer System Spots Freight Cars

A national freight car information system that is expected not only to lead to improved car utilization but to be capable of forecasting future demands to minimize shortages has been approved by the Board of Directors of the Association of American Railroads.

The system, to be based at the AAR's Washington headquarters, is scheduled to be fully operational by early 1975, it was announced by Stephen Ailes, AAR president.

The original network (TRAIN) went into operation in January 1970, with the goal of improving freight car distribution decisions of the AAR's Car Service Division. TRAIN II will provide even more up-to-date data than its predecessor. For example, TRAIN II will update its information hourly, rather than daily, as is now the case.
