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

Ruling Expected In Man's Death

A ruling is expected within the week on the death of Roy Starwood, 45, of Los Angeles, Calif., who was found in a wrecked station wagon east of Dryden August 20.

Texas Highway Patrolman Tommy Lowrance stated Monday of this week that it had been learned that the man was charged with a felony in Los Angeles and was to have been in court the day he was found.

Starwood had a severe head wound when he was found, according to Lowrance, and in an effort to determine what he had hit his head on, the pistol with a spent cartridge under the hammer was found. In a Fort Stockton hospital, doctors determined that the head wound was caused by a bullet which entered on the right side of the head above the ear and exited below the left ear, according to Lowrance.

The wrecked station wagon was found about 8:00 a.m. on Monday, August 20, four miles east of Dryden in the pasture off US 90. The vehicle was going west on US 90 and left the road at a high rate of speed, going through the fence and skidding 370 feet into the pasture before turning over.

Starwood was taken from Fort Stockton to Odessa and died on Monday afternoon in the hospital there as a result of the bullet wound, according to reports.

South of Sheffield **Ready** To Drill Monsanto Co., Midland, will

drill its No. 1 Gulf-Rashap, a 13,500-foot wildcat in Terrell County, 11 miles south of Sheffield, four miles southwest of the one-well Allison (Detrital gas) field, but separated by a 12-642-foot failure and five miles east-northeast of opener and one producer in the University Block 34 (Atoka gas) field. Location is 660 feet from the north and 1,200 feet from the west lines of section 1, in Block 176, TMRR Survey. It is also 1-3/4 miles west of Roden Oil Co. (how HNG Oil Co.) Midland, No. 1 Frank Rashap Jr., a 12,756-foot failure, abandoned March 6, 1962. It flowed gas at the rate of 4 to 5 million cubic feet daily while drilling at 10,370 feet. The Strawn was topped by samples at 10,230 feet on ground elevation of 2,597.

Post Office Plans Food Stamp Issue

The first Post Office issuance of Food Stamps under the new state-wide Food Stamp Program will take place at 10:00 a.m. September 4, in the Sanderson Post Office, according to Postmaster J.R. Hodgkins, and Carrol D. Crum, regional administrator of the Texas Department of Public Welfare.

Terrell County currently has a Food Stamp Program, but it will be replaced with the new state-wide plan which has installed this new issuance system. Certified households will be able to go to the Post Office at their convenience and buy their allotment of Food Stamps. They can buy their stamps between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m., on Monday through Friday, except on Federal holidays.

Pilot projects in three Texas counties have shown that Post Office issuance is a faster and better way for certified households to get their Food Stamps. Eligibility is determined by size of household, total net income, resources, and other considerations. Persons who are unemployed, work part-time, or receive small pension checks should contact the


Food Stamp Office at 1303 Dickenson Blvd., P.O. Box 550 Fort Stockton, Tx. 79735. People who are not employed must register for and accept work.

Food Stamps increase the food purchasing power of lowincome households and make it possible for them to eat more and better foods.

The new state-wide Food Stamp Program is administered by the Texas Department of Public Welfare and is financed by the State of Texas. The Food Stamps are provided by the United States Department of Agriculture.

A new law providing a form of "No Fault" insurance designated as "Personal Injury Protection" becomes effective August 27, 1973.

Briefly, PIP coverage responds in the same manner as Automobile Medical Pay and also includes loss of wages and expenses for essential services for qualified insureds. It is comparable to or broader than Medical Pay with one exception: It does not respond to a guest injured in a non-owned vehicle.

SPECIAL FEATURES OF THIS FORM AND RULES ARE:

... Any automobile policy effective August 27, 1973 or later providing Bodily Injury Liability must afford PIP coverage unless the named insured rejects it in writing.



The guests were registered in a bride's book with Misses Bryanann Stavley and Peggy Louwien in charge.


The large assortment of gifts was displayed in the bedrooms.



Grants Will Aid Law Enforcement

Governor Dolph Briscoe last week awarded two grants total ing \$28,757.00 for improving law enforcement and crime prevention in the area served by Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission, Midland.

The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act.

Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission was awarded \$10,000 for a regional drug-abuse program. The project is to develop a complete program that will complement the comprehensive health planning efforts of the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission and answer the needs of the entire region.

Counties in the region are Andrews, Borden, Crane, Dawson, Ector, Gaines, Glasscock, Howard, Loving, Martin, Midland, Pecos, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Ward, and Winkler.





Accomplishments Of Ranchmen Noted by SCS

By Jerry Wenmohs Ranchmen in the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil and Water Conservation District deferred from grazing over 16,736 acres and properly grazed more than 101,054 acres of native grassland during the year ending June 30, 1973.

What does this mean to the residents of the district? This means that we have protected the land from wind and water erosion, bound the soil with fibrous roots, stabilized water yields from watersheds and converted water to economic plant growth, provided forage to feed our livestock, game animals as well as ourselves, beautified our homesteads, parks, recreation areas, and the countryside; and finally, contributed immeasurably to our enjoyment and existance.

In addition to deferred grazing and proper grazing use, cooperators in the district also constructed 11,135 feet of fences, 13,361 feet of livestock water pipelines, and aerial sprayed over 3,000 acres of mesquite to assist in better management of rangeland and allow fast recovery of of native grasses.

Systematic grazing systems are being carried out on over 70,000 acres while 75,407 acres of wildlife habitat management was applied during the past year.

In all, 155 contacts were made involving soil and water conservation work in the district during the 1973 fiscal year. During the coming year emphasis will be placed on obtaining proper grazing use, deferred grazing, and developing planned grazing systems in order to improve our environment and provide a better place to live.
