| SPECIAL ELECTION <br> NUMBER ONE <br> ON THE BALLOT <br> (S.J.R. 8) <br> Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to: <br> Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days; <br> Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding $\$ 15,000$ per year and a per diem not exceeding $\$ 18$ per day for each day of each regular session or special session; <br> Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates. <br> The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: <br> "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of $\$ 15,000$ and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975." |  |

## In Terrell County

The Texas State Department
of Health in conjunction with of Health in conjunction with the American L ing Associa-
tion, Trans-Pecos Area, conducted a Tuberculin Skin Te Survey in Terrell County in October of 1972. As a result of the survey, no active tuberculosis or contagious disease w found among those tested. Some people, however, were ment.
In 1965 Senate Bill 130 wa passed to facilitate control of Tuberculosis in Texas. Because of the discovery of antiuberculosis drugs it is no long. er the dread disease it was at
one time. An intense effort is being made to find all active cases and those persons at high risk of developing tuberculosis. The high risk grou includes persons who have a positive skin test and who are under 20 years of age. A positive skin has active disease but it does mean that he has picked up a mean that he has picked up a
tuberculosis infection at some time. As the result of a positive skin test, a chest x -ray is necessary to determine whether it has developed into disease.
Preve
Preventive treatment, for tu-
berculin reactors under berculin reactors under 20,
consists of the individual tak ing anti-tuberculosis drugs for one year and the drug will greatly reduce the individual's chances of ever developing active tuberculosis. During this year, the individual is follow with periodic $x$-raysian and The fact that ing preventing medication in no way means that this person is contaguious, but that an ef fort is being made to prevent
the spread of this disease.
