Planning Work Begins On Watershed Project

If County Judge Loyde Brewer and a newly-appointed committee have their way, the history of Farmer County will be preserved, and someday recorded so that the young generation may be able to better appreciate their West Texas heritage.

The Farmer County Historical Survey Committee held its organizational meeting at Bovina last Saturday night, as similar committees throughout the state convened in observance of Historical Survey Week.

A total of 24 persons, including all the active committee members except two, attended the Bovina meeting, and an air of enthusiasm was evident.

John Armstrong, of Route 1, Farwell, is heading the committee. Other officers are Ray Landrum of Friona, vice chairman, and Mrs. Robert E. Wilson of Bovina, secretary.

Other committee members are Mr. and Mrs. Joe Jesko of the Lazbuddie community, Mrs. Ray Landrum, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Wilson of the Rhea community, Robert E. Wilson, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Carpenter of the Oklahoma Lane community, and Mr. and Mrs. Windburn Hardage of Farwell.

Also appointed by Judge Brewer to serve in advisory capacities were Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Dixon of Friona; Mrs. Malinda Schlenker of the Rhea community; Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hastings of Bovina, Mr. and Mrs. John Aldridge of Farwell; H. Y. Overstreet of Farwell; Frank A. Spring of Friona and Mrs. Mabel Reynolds of Farwell.

Armstrong appointed Mrs. Reynolds as chairman of a committee to seek historic buildings for which the county might want to request identifying plaques from the state historical organization, as well as having them identified on the new state historical map.

Currently, such plaques are already adorning the County Courthouse in Farwell, as well as the old bank building west of the Courthouse.

Another committee, headed by Carpenter, is to find out if there are any graves of Civil War veterans in the county, so that they might be appropriately marked.

The group was shown a copy of a recently-published history of Deaf Smith County, and expressed interest in having such a book written and published for Farmer County.

No committee was appointed for this. The historical survey is to meet again January 30.

Here's wishing the committee a lot of luck. We're backing your efforts 100 per cent. (We're kinda "history bugs" anyway.)

County tax assessor-collector Hugh Moseley states that some poll taxes have been paid, but not nearly enough. True, 1965 is an "off year" as far as national elections go, but local elections will be held.

The poll tax is still very much a pre-requisite for voting in local, county and state elections. The Federal government passed a constitutional amendment outlawing the poll tax as a requirement for voting for federal offices, but as we stated, there won't be any politics along that line this year.

It's too bad that the new gymnasium for Friona High School isn't completed. With Dimmitt and Friona hooking up in a battle of four unbeaten teams here Friday, we have a feeling the old gym will get small in a hurry.

Such will probably be the case for the rest of the home schedule, as the remaining district games will increase in importance as the schedule draws to a close.

It is usually hard enough to seat a Dimmitt-Friona basketball crowd when it was just for the district lead. But now, with each school having a team tied for the lead, there's bound to be a following, both of hometown and visiting fans.

If anyone has a copy of the December, 1961 National Geographic Magazine, Bessie Holt, high school librarian, would like to talk to them. The school library needs this issue to complete a set of the magazines which spans some 30 years. Call her at school or at home.

Soil Conservation Service engineers from San Marcos arrived in Friona this week to begin the planning stage for the proposed series of dams on Running Water Draw.

Making a double-barreled news story was the fact that word was received here last week from Washington that funds had been approved to assist with the planning of the project.

Currently, six men are on the scene as surveying got underway on Monday of this week. The group is headed by Phil Grazier, the Acting Watershed Work Plan Staff Leader.

The crew will study the watershed from Curry County,

N.M. to Plainview, making a detailed map of the watershed and will estimate the amount of water the watershed will yield at various points. After the study is completed, the results will be made known to local groups in each county, along with recommendations for structures.

While the crew is working on the "upper" portion of the draw, it will be headquartered in Friona. Later, as it works toward Plainview, the headquarters will be shifted to that South Plains city, which was instrumental in starting the project.

Grazier points out that the draw will be surveyed in two portions, the "upper" portion

consisting of Curry and Farmer counties, and the "lower" Running Water Draw, in Castro, Lamb, Hale and Swisher counties.

The state SCS official estimated that by September or October the plans would be completed and be in the hands of local leaders.

Actual surveying for possible sites for floodwater retarding sites will begin in about a month, Grazier states. While flood prevention structures are the main reason for the project, "multi-purpose" (larger) structures also hold the interest of various groups up and down the draw. Such a structure is of interest to

the Farmer County delegation, mainly for possible recreation.

The current studies will determine if such a structure in Farmer County is financially feasible. The projected water yield for a given area must be sufficient to justify the extra cost of these structures.

The floodwater prevention structures are expected to aid in a recharging manner.

Others currently in Friona on the project are N.B. Greer, civil engineer; Don Clarke, geologist; Herbert McWhorter, economist; Allan Colwich, hydraulic engineer; John D. Rhea, survey party supervisor and Cliff Miller, surveying technician.

Irrigation Gas Users Slate Annual Meeting On Monday

The annual meeting of the Farmer County Irrigation Gas Users Association will be held Monday night beginning at 7:30 p.m. The meeting will be held at Hub Community Center.

Bruce Parr, president of the organization, urges all farmers in the county with irrigation wells to attend the meeting.

Parr states that there will be important detailed discussion on the Gas Users' battle to secure gas for irrigation at a price more acceptable to the

farmers.

Parr announces that a group of farmers in the Black Community has incorporated, under the name Plains Gas Farmers Cooperative Society, and has filed an application with the Federal Power Commission to purchase gas from Transwestern Pipeline Company.

Transwestern is willing to sell gas to the cooperative at 26 and one-half cents per megacycle foot. The Trans-

western company line runs across the county, in a north-east-southwestern bi-section. "I think we have the best chance of getting something done than we've had for some time," Parr states.

The irrigation gas users organized some three years ago, seeking a reduction in rates from Pioneer Natural Gas Company, which supplies gas for irrigation wells in West Texas. The organization sought legis-

lation to make irrigation gas rates subject to review by the Texas Railroad Commission.

The group pressed hard for this legislation at the 1962 session, but narrowly missed on the last day of the session.

It now appears that the organization has changed its tactics in its endeavor to purchase gas from another company, although Parr indicated that legislation would again be sought at the coming session.

Annual dues of \$2 per well again are due from the farmers, Parr pointed out. Next Monday's meeting will elect four new directors to the organization's board of directors.

Directors whose terms are expiring are D. L. Carmichael, Melvin Sachs, Vernon Symcox, and Roy Miller. Also, Parr's term as president of the group is expiring, as is Carl Schlenker's as secretary.

Holdover directors are Ellis Tatum, M. H. Carson, W. T. Magness and Freeman Davis. Vice president of the Gas Users group is Gilbert Kaltwasser, who has another year to run.

W. L. (Preach) Edelman has been named president of the Plains Gas Farmers Cooperative Society, which hopes to purchase gas from the Transwestern Company.

The new cooperative would plan to sell gas to farmers at a flat rate, rather than at a graduated scale, as is the case with Pioneer Natural Gas Company. The flat rate, Parr says, would be very close to what the lowest rate is with Pioneer.

Also as a part of the meeting, Prentice Mills will be present to explain the 1965 ASCS programs, and answer any questions which farmers might have.

ACCIDENT VICTIM

Shirley Services Held

Funeral Services for Jack G. Shirley, 42, well-known farmer of the Hub Community, were held Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Friona.

Shirley was killed about 10:15 a.m. last Friday when a truck in which he was riding blew out tire and overturned. He was riding in a truck driven by Glen Harrelson, 36. The accident happened six miles east and a half-mile south of Hub.

It was reported that Shirley had just purchased an irrigation motor at Terry's Shop in Friona, and he and Harrelson were on their way to deliver the motor to Shirley's farm.

The left rear wheel of the hoist truck blew out, and investigating officers said Shirley was thrown out of the truck and is apparently passed over his body.

Harrelson was treated for head lacerations at Farmer County Community Hospital,

was retained for observation Friday night and released Saturday. Harrelson had to walk the half-mile back to Highway 86 in order to summon aid following the accident.

Shirley had resided in the Hub Community since 1936. He was born in Wellington in 1922.

Survivors included his wife Christine, a son Jesse, 16, and a daughter Judy, 15. The children are students at Friona High School.

Other survivors are two brothers, J. B. Shirley of Hereford and Reaford Shirley of Oxnard, Calif., and two sisters, Mrs. Pat Busby and Mrs. Lester Dean, both of Friona.

Officiating at the services were the pastor, Rev. Bill Burton, and Rev. Russell McAnally of the Friona Methodist Church.

Pallbearers were Jack Tomlin, A. L. Black, T. I. Burleson, Weldon Stringer, Woodrow Fleming and Wes Long. Honorary pallbearers were Noyle Wood, Albert Cannon, Billy Sides, Buck Fallwell, Clarence Monroe, J. O. Latham, G. B. (Pete) Buske and Clyde Hays. Claborn Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Friona Youngster Shows Champ Calf At Hereford

Friona area 4-H Club and FFA members did themselves proud at the Golden Spread Western Junior Livestock Show at Hereford last weekend.

Gary Phipps, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Phipps of Friona, exhibited the show's Grand Champion steer. It was the first time in a long time for a Friona entry to take the calf show's top prize, according to Friona school officials.

This is the second year for Gary to feed show calves, and it was his first entry in the Hereford show. It was believed to be the first Friona calf to win the top prize since Weldon Tatum won it in 1958.

Gary's Grand Champion was an 836-pound Hereford named "Bubbles." The steer was bred by Phipps & Sons Hereford Ranch. It took the middleweight class championship prior to winning over the lightweight and heavyweight winners for the top spot.

Phipps also entered the third - place animal in the middleweight class. Under a new policy by the Hereford show, Gary was able to "buy back" his calf following the sale, and will enter him in the Amarillo Junior Livestock show which will be held next Monday.

Steve Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. Matt Brown, a member of Friona FFA chapter, entered both the first place lightweight and heavyweight Berkshires, and walked off with the breed championship trophy. It likewise was Brown's first time to enter the Hereford show.

Also in the swine division, two Lazbuddie 4-H club members nailed down two breed championships. Theresa Seaton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs.

Jimmie Seaton, exhibited the champion Hampshire barrow, and Loy Dale Clark, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Clark, had the champion of the Chester White division.

Other Friona area winners in the steer show included John Hoover, second place lightweight; Mike Riethmayer, third lightweight; Mike Smith, fifth lightweight; Steve Wagner, fourth middleweight; Bobby

Redwine (Lazbuddie) fifth middleweight; Jim Bob Jones, 10th middleweight; Hoppy Jennings (Lazbuddie), fifth heavyweight; Mike Riethmayer, seventh heavyweight and Gene Weatherly, 10th heavyweight.

Besides the winners already named in the swine division, Theresa Seaton of Lazbuddie had the third place heavy Berkshire, Mike Riethmayer of Friona.

Friona, Dimmitt Meet For District Lead

A Friona-Dimmitt battle for the district basketball lead, which will be renewed Friday at the High School Gymnasium, is nothing new. But it is different in that two teams from each school enter the contest with unbeaten district records.

In a real departure from the normal, four unbeaten teams will be in action. Going into the night, all four have 4-0 district records. The games will close the first half of district play. The second half will begin next Tuesday with Abernathy teams coming here.

The Friona and Dimmitt girls are used to head-on encounters with the district title at stake--they have been at it for years. The teams have been in the same district the past six years in a row, and in that time the Squaws have won four district titles, having to beat out the Bobbies almost every time, and the Dimmitt girls won district one of the other years.

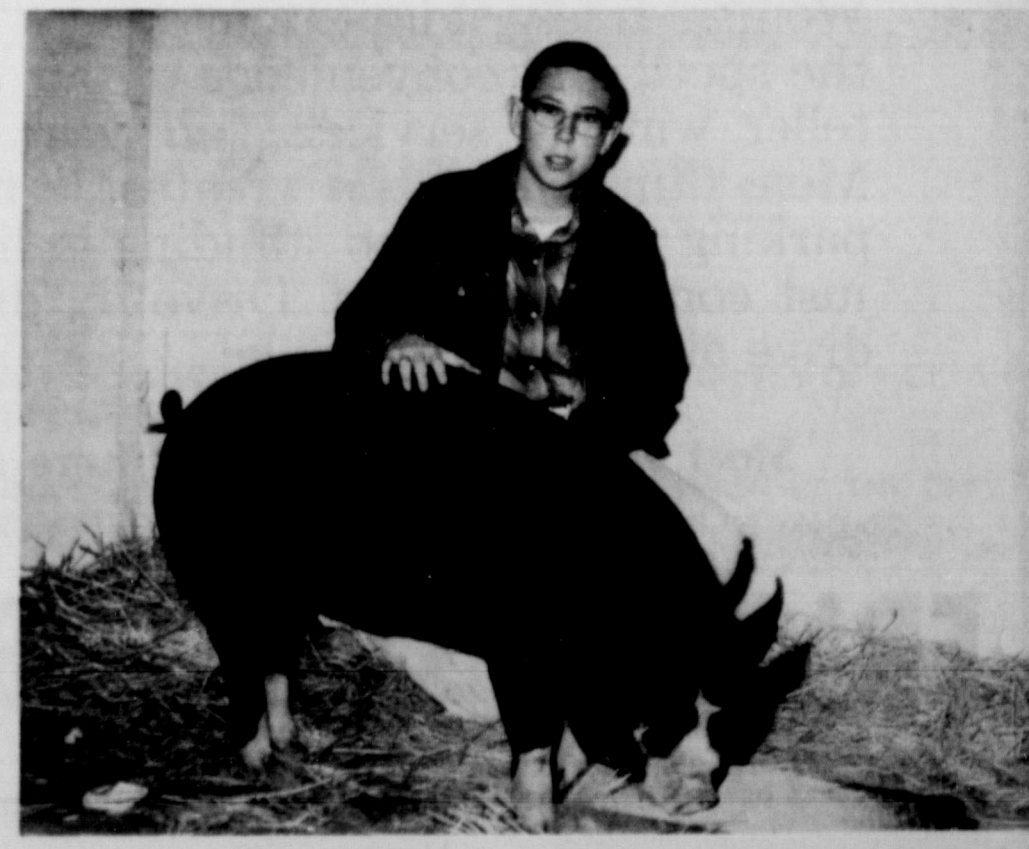
District games for the past six years show Friona girls

winning eight and Dimmitt four. The Squaws won district in 1958-59, yet one of their three season losses was to Dimmitt. The Squaws lost only one district game two years ago, and that was to Dimmitt. That incidentally, is the last time the Squaws have lost a district game.

The Squaws will have revenge as an added incentive to the district lead. The local girls are still "smarting" from a 40-39 overtime loss to the Bobbies in the Farwell tournament finals, and will be out to even the score.

The Chiefs haven't had quite as good luck with the Bobcats. As a matter of fact, Friona has beaten the Dimmitt boys just once in the past 12 games--but that was a 36-34 upset in 1963 when the Bobcats were district champs.

Friona's games are doubly important, since Dimmitt will be met again in the last game of the district schedule, on the Dimmitt court.

The Friona girls jumped ahead, 5-0, then led 15-5 midway through the opening quarter. Then the team's scoring stalled momentarily, and Olton was able to pull to within four points at 16-12 and 18-14, but that was the closest the visitors got the rest of the way. Teto Jennings got a hook shot, and followed it with another and a free throw to vault

the Squaws into a 21-14 and 28-18. The Squaws had a 14-point spread at 36-22 shortly before halftime, but Olton rallied for a 36-26 score.

The Squaws went to work at the start of the second half and built up a 15-point lead at 43-28. Janet Rushing came off the bench to score 10 second-half points, and helped the Squaws to a 50-34 lead after three quarters.

Linda Davis clicked for eight fourth quarter points, her final two free throws with 3:44 left in the game bringing the team a commanding 26-point lead at 62-36. Reserves flooded the scene at this point.

of free throws (Friona's final points of the game) with 1:52 to play, giving the Squaws their longest lead at 67-40.

Gene Weatherly sank a jump shot eight seconds deep in the game, and the Chiefs were off and running toward their highest point total in district play. The Chiefs led 7-0 before Olton scored, and then built up a 15-2 lead midway through the opening period, as Coach James Anglin had the team begin a full-court press.

The press paid off, and by the end of the first quarter fans sensed the Chiefs had the game well in hand, as the home team led, 25-6.

Coach Anglin began his policy of liberal substitution at

this point. The lineup change stalled Friona's scoring, as the Chiefs didn't score a point during the first half of the second quarter, but then Olton just scored one point, so nothing was lost.

The team's press began paying dividends toward the end of the half, as Friona tallied 18 points in the last 3:57 of play to shoot into a commanding 43-11 lead.

Midway through the third quarter the Chiefs had made it a 40-point lead at 58-18, and it was all over but the shouting. Reserves played the entire second half, and they did right well by themselves, scoring 31 points.

Everyone on the team got

into the scoring, with eight players scoring at least six points. Larry Buckley's 12 points led the Chieftains. His comparatively low maximum proved that he saw only about one-half a game's action.

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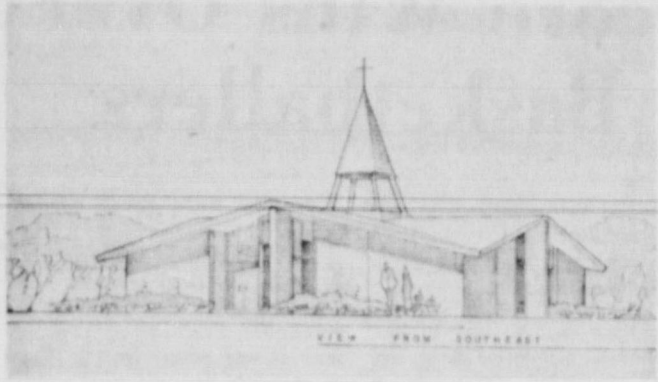
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What Lutherans Believe--

"By Grace are ye saved thru faith, and that not of yourselves; it is a gift of God; not of works, lest any man should boast." Ephesians 2, 8-9.

There sure are lots of churches in the world, aren't there? The average person sort of feels that they are all pretty much alike. In many ways they are. They speak of God, of an afterlife, and give rules of conduct to live our present life. Yes, the churches perform a valuable function.

Why a Lutheran Church? Couldn't we get along without it? Aren't there enough now? Couldn't it just be submerged into all the rest?

Of course we could get along without the Lutheran Church, as such, that is, as an organization. The Church of Jesus Christ is not an organization, but an organism. There's quite a difference.

The simplest way to think of the contribution the Lutheran Church is to think of three concepts on which it is built. They are: 1) Man is saved by grace alone, 2) Man is saved by faith alone, and 3) The scriptures alone are the final authority on all matters of our relationships to God and our fellow-man. We shall take each of these thoughts separately in

the following weeks. Thus you see the Lutheran Church does not claim to save you, God saves you in Christ Jesus. Nor is it merely called the Lutheran Church to say that is following Luther. Those who followed the above teachings were called Lutherans by those who opposed them. They preferred to be called Protestants or Evangelicals. But the name has stuck. And it stands for: 1) Grace Only 2) Faith Only 3) The Bible only.

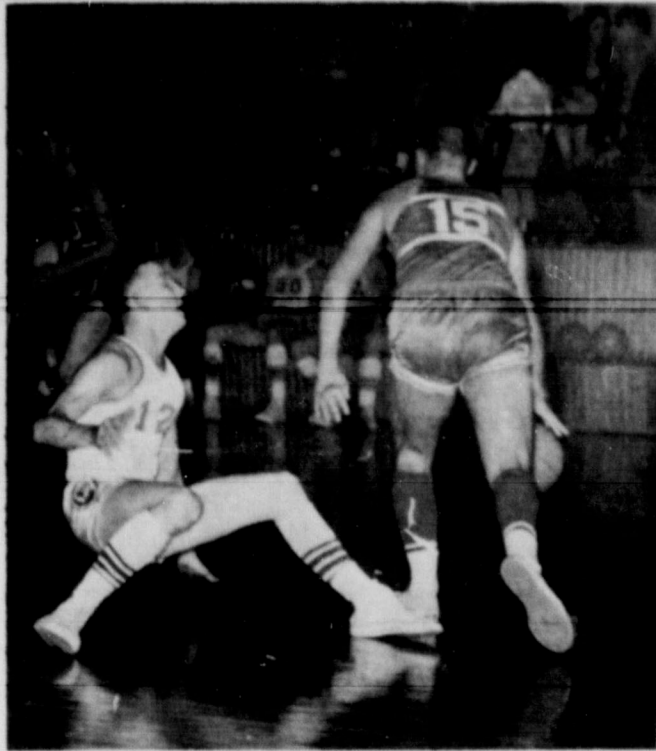
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Foster Attends Annual School

CHIEFS HAVE TO RALLY

Teams Score Wins Over Lockney Basketballers

Friona's basketball teams scored wins on the road last Friday, making each team's record 3-0 in District 3-AA, but both teams had to do a little more scrapping than they might have planned on prior to the game.

The Squaws made their season record 16-3, pulling away from a 25-21 halftime lead to take a 60-33 win over the Lockney girls, while the Chiefs, who won their 14th season game, really had a scare before taking a 44-39 win.

In the girls' game, the Squaws hit a good 52 per cent of their shots from the field, marking the fifth straight game they had hit 50 per cent or better on field goals.

Teto Jennings had another torrid performance, getting 11 of 18 field goal attempts and 13 of 19 free shots, to emerge with 35 points, and playing very little more than half of the game.

Miss Jennings scored 16 of Friona's 18 first-quarter points, as the Squaws racked up an 18-9 first quarter lead. Coach Mel Williams let reserves play most of the second quarter, so that Lockney was able to pull close, 25-21 by halftime.

Starters took over in the third quarter once again, and Jennings led the onslaught with 10 points, as the Squaws outscored Lockney, 21-1, to take a commanding 46-22 lead.

The Chiefs fell as much as 10 points behind in their game before rallying in the second half to avoid being upset. The team hit just four of 17 shots from the field in the first half, despite getting shots which they wanted.

"We just weren't mentally

prepared for the game. The boys evidently thought it would be a push-over," Coach James Anglin explained.

Lockney had a lead of 23-13 shortly before halftime, but Danny Murphree hit a basket before the buzzer to trim it to eight, 25-18.

Larry Buckley, who scored only two points in the first half, paced the team with 11 points in the third quarter as the Chiefs scored five quick baskets to overtake the Longhorns. After Friona took the

lead they were never headed again.

After taking a lead of 31-26 into the final quarter, the Chiefs slowed the game down somewhat. They had an 11-point lead at one point, but Lockney managed to pull the final margin to within five points.

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On The Farm In Parmen County

Texas landowners wanting to order trees or shrubs from the Texas Forest Service should get their orders in real soon. The deadline is February 12 and the cost is \$1.50 per hundred plus the 2 per cent sales tax.

Their supply of Austrian and ponderosa pine and sycamore have been depleted and are no longer available. However, they have 14 other species available which includes Black Locust, Mulberry, Catalpa, Osage Orange (bois d'arc), Redcedar, Eunomys and Buffaloberry.

Application blanks are available thru the County Agent's office. Orders for species shown on the application must be in multiples of 50.

All seedling orders will be packed in moss and moisture proof paper and shipped prepaid direct to the purchaser. This is a good opportunity to start a windbreak around your farmstead, so call the office for your application blank.

STOCK WATER
Take advantage of this pretty weather we've been having because we all know there is plenty of cold weather ahead.

Breaking ice on stock watering troughs or tanks is no easy, pleasant task. This irksome job can be avoided by installing an automatic livestock waterer, equipped with an electrical heating element.

Water should be available for livestock at all times, even in the coldest weather. Automatic waterers keep a continuous supply of fresh water on hand.

Electrically heated waterers come in different shapes and

sizes for all types of livestock. Basically, a unit consists of a tank fed by pressure or a gravity water system, a float valve, a heating element controlled by a thermostat, and a housing to support the tank and exclude outside air movement around it.

We suggest purchasing the smallest unit that will provide ample water for your livestock. A general purpose bowl-type waterer will handle up to 30 head of cattle for 60 hogs. Types which have the heating element immersed in the water or are attached to the underside of the tank are usually more efficient than those warming the space enclosed by the housing.

The thermostat, being an important part of the automatic waterer, should have a five degree range between the "on" and "off" operating points for best results. Cattle or combination waterers should be insulated on the sides to conserve electricity. Covers are also recommended for reducing operating costs and as an aid to keeping the water clean. It is important to select a unit which can be cleaned easily.

Water temperature should be maintained just high enough to prevent freezing. This will usually be between 45 and 50 degrees. F.

CATTLE ON FEED

There were 1 per cent more cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market on January 1 than a year earlier in 32 major feeding states. The total was 9,350,000 head.

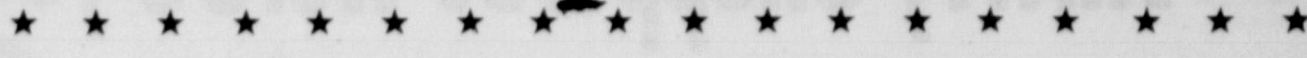

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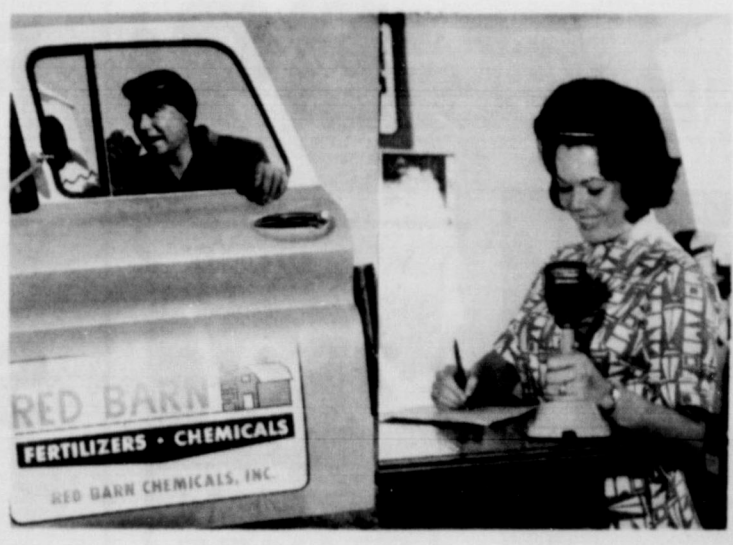
