Eagles Taste Defeat Revenue Sharing By AA McCamey; Revenue sharing funds re-To Go To Clint

The Sanderson Eagles bounced off of a 48-0 trouncing of the Class B Grandfalls Cowboy football team to feel the pain of a similar defeat at the hands of the Class AA Mc-Camey Badgers Friday night of last week. The game was played in McCamey and ended 53-7.

McCamey had a 26-0 halftime score and scattered their touchdowns out over all of the

ball game.

The Eagle tally was in the fourth frame and a lateral by Quarterback Robert Kline to Halfback Bill Mott, who threw a pass to End Ricky Marquez resulted in a 76-yard pass play and six points. Mott booted extra point.

In statistics, McCamey led 18-9 in 1st downs, 345 yards rushing to 65, 123 passing in 8 completions of 11 tries, to 114 yards for Sanderson in 5 passes of 16 tries. McCamey intercepted 3 of the Eagle throws, and recovered 4 miscues by Sanderson. McCamey was penalized 9 times for 105 yards and Sanderson twice for 20 yards. Besides the seven turn-overs by the Eagles in interceptions and fumbles, they gave up the ball 9 times with punts; McCamey punted three times.

The Eagles will go to Clint this week for their first district game of the season. The game begins at 7:30 their time.

The revenue sharing money received by the county may be spent for only certain things and the reports published must indicate the plans for spending the money, then another report reporting the category or purpose for which the money was spent.

According to the reports published, the fund has a balance of \$41,186.00, which reflects the amount of interest earned.
