Lee Kelly, 81, Former Resident, Is Interred Here

Funeral services were in the First Baptist Church Friday afternoon for Lee Kelly, 81, with Rev. Paul Tatum, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

Mr. Kelly died in his home in El Paso October 8 after a long period of failing health. He was a retired clerk of the Southern Pacific Railroad after 46 years of service.

Born in Alabama March 28, 1892, Mr. Kelly first went to work for the S.P. in Alpine in 1918 coming to Sanderson later and making his home here until 1958. He was married to Myrtle White who died in 1949, and then married Mrs. Edna McNutt in 1955. They moved to Fort Hancock in 1958 after he took his retirement and four years later they moved to El Paso.

Besides his widow, he is survived by three sons, Jerome, Fred, and Eugene Kelly, all of El Paso; five daughters, Mrs. Mary Brown and Mrs. Ruth Ann Maddy of Arizona, and Mrs. Sarah Jeffers, Mrs. Ruthy Lee Landingham, and Mrs. Willo Kornegay of El Paso; also three step-children, Rollie McNutt, Roswell, N.M., Mrs. Mary Swanson, Cimarron, N.M., and Mrs. Ruth Sheard, Waco; a brother, Earl Kelly, of San Antonio; also 29 grandchildren and 24 great-grandchildren. Mmes. David Shoemaker, Mike Fielding, and Johnny Black of Sanderson are three of the granddaughters.

Adult Education Courses To Begin, Registration Soon

A special curriculum is now available for persons over 16 years of age as of September 1 of the current school year. There will be three levels of instruction: beginning - up to the 3rd grade level; intermediate - from the 3rd grade up to the 7th grade; and advanced - including the 7th grade and 8th grade; and the GED level - for those who have completed the 8th grade, but have not completed the equivalent of a high school education.

There will be no cost for the courses which will be at night and all persons interested are asked to register at the junior high school Monday, October 22, at 7:00 p.m.

A suggested 100 hours of instruction is recommended for each level and upon completion of the highest level of instruction, students will be recognized as having completed their high school education.




Shower Honors Mrs. Stephen Young

Eighteen guests registered and there were other gifts sent to the shower.



Inside the old walled city of Jerusalem is the site of the ruins of an ancient temple. A wall of that temple left standing is called the "Wailing Wall" During Yom Kippur (which begins the evening of the final day of the then days of penitence) Jewish worshipers gather at this site of religious pilgrimages which have endured through the centuries. This scripture from The Living Bible is the authority for observance of Yom Kippur. the Day of Atonement.

"This is a permanent law: You must do no work on the tenth day of the seventh month (of the Hebrew calendar), but must spend the day in selfexamination and humility. This applies whether you are born in the land or are a foreigner living among the people of Israel; for this is the day commemorating the atonement, cleansing you in the Lord's eyes from all of your sins. It is a Sabbath of solemn rest for you, and you shall spend the day in quiet humility; this is a permanent law. This ceremony, in later generations, shall be performed by the anointed High Priest, consecrated in place of his ancestor Aaron; he shall be the one to put on the holy linen garments, and make atonement for the holy sanctuary, the Tabernacle, the altar, the priests, and the people. This shall be an everlasting law for you, to make atonement for the people of Israel once each year, because of their sins." (Leviticus 16:29-34)

"Nine days after the Festival of Trumpets, all the people are to come together before the Lord, saddened by their sin; and they shall offer sacrifices by fire to the Lord. Don't do any work that day, for it is a special day for making atonement before the Lord your God. (Leviticus 23:26-28)

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
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

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
