It's not difficult at all to say: "Happy birthday, dad!" or wish "many happy returns", but we know that Tuesday was not a happy day for him, and there is little likelihood that the next birthday will be happy.

We would not like to leave the impression that his days are spent in unhappiness, as they are not. There is just nothing apparently that strikes him as a happy time, or unhappy time. That just seems to be the way a brain starved of blood reacts. He has never, yet, voiced any unhappiness, sadness, homesickness, loneliness, or anything akin to these "down" attitudes. Our thankfulness for this fact is unmeasurable, since the presence of, or the expressions of these attitudes would make it difficult for everyone!

 We had no more than gotten the paper in the post office last week when Ernest Harkins called to tell us of the rabid fox killed at his ranch. And our predicting such incidences had absolutely nothing to do with the fact that it happened.

We just hope that there is no more serious consequence of the growth of stray dogs and cats, and their multiplying on top of multiplying.

All of the county's laws forbidding stray dogs, all of the realization of the facts of the dangers, and the predicting of serious consequences by us or anyone else is not going to get rid of the strays or control the stray dogs. It is going to have to be the action of people in the knowledge of those facts.

It's not the statute on the books or the determination of a fact in the mind, but putting those things to work that will alleviate the situation.

And it might take some serious situation to cause us to act. It usually does!

Mrs. L. Falcon Interred Saturday

Funeral rites were in St. James Catholic Church Saturday morning for Mrs. Leocadia Lopez Falcon, 70, who died in an Alpine hospital Wednesday morning after being a medical patient there for five weeks. Burial was in Santa Rita Cemetery.

Born in Alpine on December 9, 1893, she came to live in Sanderson with her parents at the age of three and had made her home here since. She was married to Honorato L. Falcon Sr. November 25, 1912, and he preceded her in death in 1967.

Twelve children were born to the union and 10 survive, including four sons, Jose Falcon of Monahans, Honorato Falcon Jr., Andrews, Fred Falcon, Houston, and Susano Falcon, Pecos; six daughters, Mrs. C. H. Cates of Hazel Park, Mich., Mrs. Pascuala Falcon and Mrs. Eulalio Ybarra of Sanderson, Mrs. Jose Alvarez Sr., Fort Stockton, Mrs. Santos Gutierrez Sr., El Paso, Mrs. Maria Ramirez, Houston. She is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. Enemencia Ponce, Sanderson, Mrs. Paula Flores, San Angelo, and Mrs. Luz Ponce, Andrews; two brothers, Catarino Lopez, Del Rio; Ben Ponce, Andrews; also 42 grandchildren and 29 great-grandchildren.

Rabid Fox Killed Here Recently

Ernest Harkins reported last weekend that a rabid fox had been killed in the yard at his ranch home recently. The animal's head was sent for laboratory examination and the result of the rabies check was positive, according to Harkins.

The pet dogs and cats were destroyed, Harkins stated, on the advice of the veterinarian when it was learned that the dogs had been in a fight with the rabid animal and had received wounds.

It was the fight that attracted the attention of the Harkinses and their visitors and their first search failed to disclose anything wrong; they were later alarmed by the action of the animals and went looking again and found the fox lying on the grass in the yard.

Matt F. Bader, 62, Former School Supt., Buried Last Friday

Requiem Mass for Matthew Frank Bader, 62, of Castroville was celebrated at 2:00 p.m. Friday in LaCoste. Burial was in San Antonio.

Bader was superintendent of the Medina Valley Independent School District, having served there since leaving Sanderson in 1962. He had been superintendent of the local schools since the 1950-51 school year.

Justice of the Peace John Parma of LaCoste returned a verdict of suicide, according to a San Antonio paper. Bader's body was found Wednesday at the football field in Castroville, according to reports, the victim of a gunshot wound.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Ann Bader, of Castroville and son, Brucks Bader, of Houston, and a brother.

Mr. and Mrs. F.M. Wood attended funeral services in LaCoste. Their daughter is the daughter-in-law of the deceased Mr. Bader.

Bids Sought For Precinct 2 Loader

A notice for bids is in other columns of The Times for the county to purchase a loader, specifications listed in the ad.

The loader will go in precinct 2, according to Austin Chriesman, commissioner of that precinct, and is used in connection with the maintainer and dump truck in maintaining the roads to all the ranch headquarters in that precinct. He said the loader now in use is about 20 years old.

It was not stated if revenue sharing funds or regular tax money would be used to pay for the loader.

Chriesman was asked about the progress in drawing the lines for the division of the county into newly-designated precincts, he said that he was giving serious consideration to this proposal and trying to put the lines of his precinct in a place for the most economic and feasible method of dividing the road work. He said the division of the county's population within the limits of the law was already accomplished but the division of the ranch roads was the problem.

Rankin Wins 20-9 Over Eagles Here

The Rankin Red Devils won their game here Friday night of last week by a 20-9 score.

The game could not have been more evenly matched during the first half which ended 6-2 in favor of the visitors. On punt exchanges of the ball by punts, lengths of time with the ball, and penetrations into opposing territory, there was little difference except the four points of the score and the drive that ended in a touchdown for Rankin.

Ernest Black scored the first TD from the 1-yard line in the second period.

Sanderson's two points came when a punt was ruled touched on the playing field, was recovered by the defender in the end zone and he dropped to his knee.

To open the second half, Sanderson's Bill Mott kicked off twice out of bounds, each resulting in a 5-yard penalty. The third attempt appeared to be heading for the side lines and the Rankin defender let it roll. The ball was covered by one of the Eagles, giving them possession on the 20.

Quarterback Robert Kline and End Jake Murrain for a touchdown pass for 18 yards and Mott tacked on the extra point.

Second half scores by Rankin were by Greg Copeland for 11 yards with Ernest Black kicking the extra point, and a 15-yard run by Eric Fitzhugh and another extra point by Black's kick.

This is the first loss of a district game for the Eagles this season and they will go to Marfa Friday night. Marfa is the underdog in the game, according to mutual foes and win-loss records.

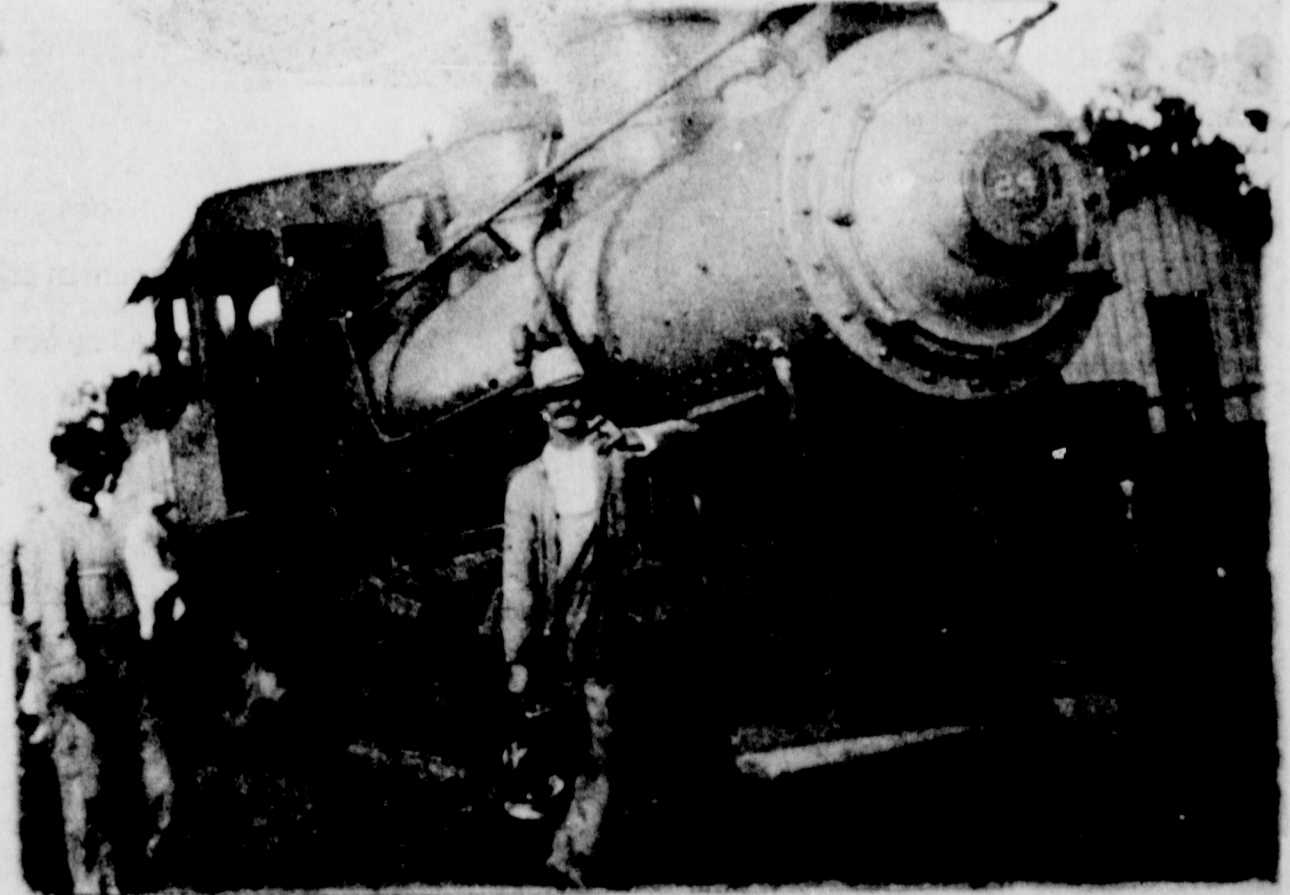

CROP Canvass For Local Funds Is Planned Soon

Volunteers are needed to successfully canvass the community for CROP. A planning session will be led by the two co-chairmen, Rev. Richard White and Rev. David Marx, at the residence of the Presbyterian minister on Tuesday, October 30, at 7:30 p.m. Everyone interested in having a personal active role in the hunger appeal is invited to attend.

CROP, a relief agency of Church World Service, is seeking to help in its massive assistance program to the famine in the sub-Saharan zone of West Africa. Several million Africans are facing starvation in the wake of the most drought in six decades. The United Nations estimates the toll to exceed six million by the end of the year.

Church World Service has already shipped nearly 250,000 tons of food and medical supplies to the emergency area which stretches 2,600 miles across the African continent from the Atlantic to the Red Sea. The Billy Graham Evangelistic Association donated \$71,000 and sent associate evangelist Howard O. Jones to assess the area for further needs.

CROP also sends seeds, tools, etc., and tools and skilled personnel to assist local building of wells, irrigation ditches, and roads. The need for increasing all forms of assistance is immediate.

CROP receives its support from community-wide appeals. Its channels are through Church World Service and Catholic Relief Services. The campaign to step up its efforts has received endorsement of Bishop Edward E. Swannstrom, Executive Director Catholic Relief Services, Dr. J. Harry Haines, Executive Secretary United Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief, Dr. Charles Kraemer, moderator of

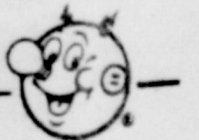


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Culture Club, Guests Hear Iraan Speaker

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Historic Committee Hears W.G. Downie
