#### Andrew Riess Jr. Former Resident. Killed in San Angelo Eagles 12-7

Andrew John Riess Jr., 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. A.J. Riess, of Winters, was the victim of a stabbing in San Angelo late Friday night, according to reports from that city. The Riess family formerly lived in Sanderson and he was high school and elementary school principal here for several years. Young Riess was a graduate of Sanderson High School and was a senior at Angelo State University and a life insurance representative at the time of his death.

The stabbing occurred at a drive-in grocery and he was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital there.

An. 18-year-old youth is charged with murder with malice, and another man was charged with possession of a prohibited weapon in the case.

**Riess** was interred Monday in San Angelo following services from Mt. Carmel Catholic Church.

Survivors include his parents who lived in Sanderson from 1958 to 1970, moving to Winters where he was in the television repair and sales business; also a sister, Miss Maurine Riess of Waco.

# **Bears Edge By**

The Balmorhea Bears narrowly edged by the Sandersor. Eagles there Friday night of last week by 12-7. It was all but a cinch for the district title for the Bears who have not lost a district game and have only one game left in their season's schedule.

Sanderson has only the loss to the Bears in their district standing and have Wink to play here next Friday night. Both teams were scoreless during the first half.

The Bears scored first in the game, in the third quarter, after they had driven to the Sanderson 4-yard mark from where Juan Jimenez carried the ball over. Their try for the extra point was no good.

During the same period, Robert Kline went over the goal line from the 18 and Bill Mott added the extra point on a place-kick, giving the Eagles an edge of 1 point.

In the fourth frame, the Bears were able to pull the win from the fire when Abel Baeza ran 75 yards for a touchdown.

Balmorhea had an edge in 1st downs 13-12, in total vards 345-220, yards rushing 295-177, and yards passing 50-43, completing only 1 of 5, and Sanderson's completion record was 4 of 13, losing 1 to the Bears by interception. The Eagles also lost a fumble and gave up the ball 8 times on punts, to 4 punts for the winners. Balmorhea was penalized 10 times for 140 yards, the Eagles 8 times for 90 yards. The final game for the season for the Eagles will be Friday night against Wink, who has had a tough season trying to find someone they could beat.

## County Re-districted **Commissioners** Buy New Loader

Redistricting of the county was accomplished at the regular meeting of the Terrell County Commissioners' Court on Monday. The action had been promised by the group at their meeting in October.

All of the precinct lines were brought into Sanderson so that there was a difference of only about 10 people from the total population of each precinct, according to figures that had been furnished from a survey about a year ago.

The effective date of the new precincts will be January 1, 1974, according to a motion passed by the commissioners. Elections after that date will be according to precinct lines established at the meeting Monday.

There has been some discussion about the possibility of holding elections in two places in some of the precincts in order to facilitate voting by people who live in the country and in town.

The Times has made a sincere effort to mark the precinct lines both in town and in the country, and any erroneous designation, by word or mark of the official designations by the commission ers is accidental. The precinct designations, as we were able to transcribe them from the several maps used. are found on page four.

Terrell County Commissioners Court Monday authorized purchase of a loader. Treanor Equipment Co. was the only bidder and the total was \$18,352.00. The court will advertise the old loader in precinct 2 for sale with the receipts to be applied toward the total cost of the new machine.

Other business accomplished by the court included the authorization of payment of all bills presented to the court; read a letter from the Young People's Chamber of Commerce urging installation of fire hydrants near the three local schools After some discussion, i. was decided to get recommendations from the fire department as to style, size, location, etc., and to seek help from the Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, since they are owners of the present water distribution system and make reports and recommendations at the December meeting.

There was also some discussion of the percentages of distribution of total tax revenue of the county among the four newly-designated precincts.






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## New Voting Didricts

The voting precincts for residents of Terrell County are shown below and at the right. Residents are asked to remember their voting precincts to facilitate and speed up the voting and/or registering process.

Precinct 1 is marked by diagonal lines in the illustration at right and roughly includes everything west of the east right-of-way on US 285, south of the south side of Oak St., the four blocks north of Oak St. between First and Second Sts., the two blocks north of Oak St. between Second and Third Sts., all the Newberry Addition, and south of the railroad east of Sanderson to a north-south line dividing Block 149 and Block A2.

Precinct 2 will include the two blocks between Oak and Hackberry Sts. eastward from Third St., and the block that is bounded by Fifth, Mansfield, Hudspeth, and Hackberry Sts., north of the railroad until the east boundary of precinct 1, then including the land north and south of the railroad from the Rio Grande north to the dark line indicated on the map.

Precinct 3 is east of the east right-of-way line of US 285 in the county, all residents of Sanderson north of Oak St. and not otherwise shown on the map at right, and eastward to the northsouth line indicated on the map below.

Precinct 4 includes all the northeastern part of the county and the corridor coming into Sanderson, all indicated on the map below, and the blocks east of Second St. between Hackberry and Richard Sts. with the exception of the block between Fifth and Hudspeth Sts., which is in precinct 2.

The redistricting of Terrell County was accomplished by the commissioners' court at their regular meeting on Monday. The lines were indicated to equally divide the population and to eliminate all precincts with less than

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


#### Youth Sub-District Meeting Here Last Sunday



#### Cong. O. C. Fisher Will Not Run For Re-Election

Congressman O.C. Fisher revealed to his constituents last week that he has decided not to seek re-election. He said he will retire after completing his 16th term in the House of Representatives.

Fisher said his decision is based on his health. He had heart bypass surgery last June in Houston. He is 69.

In a brief statement, Fisher said: "Altiough I am feeling real good and will continue to work full time, following a medical check-up, my doctor thinks I would be well advised to try to reduce some of my activities for a while.

"For that reason, I have reluctantly decided to retire from Congress at the end of 1974.

"In my making this decision, I am particularly sorry to disappoint so many friends and supporters who have urged me to postpone my retirement.

"The support of such wonderful people has been a most rewarding experience. My personal gratitude is beyond description."

Congressman Fisher served nearly a half-million constituents in his sprawling 21st Texas District which covers Terrell County and 29 others including a portion of Bexar County. He is the secondranking comgressman on the powerful Armed Services Committee.

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#### Safety first ....

When you go to your community blood bank you will be asked certain questions about your medical history to insure your safety and that of the recipient.

Persons with a history of tuberculosis or hepatitis, or those with active allergies, for example, cannot be accepted. Anyone who has had major surgery, received a blood transfusion, or been pregnant in the last six months will be asked to donate later. The donor's weight, temperature, blood pressure, and pulse will be taken, and his hemoglobin will be tested.

The collection of blood is made under medical supervision by a medical technician or nurse. The blood is withdrawn from a vein in the donor's arm into a plastic bag which contains a solution which preserves the unit of blood for three weeks. The entire process of giving blood usually takes less than an hour.




