Commissioners Have Long Meeting, Pledge Concentrated Effort On Dams

The Terrell County Commissioners Court met Monday morning in their regular session and had several items of business, though there was no posted agenda or notice of meeting.

Mrs. W.H. Grigsby appeared on behalf of the Terrell County Historical Survey Committee to ask for help in finding a building for a local museem. Mrs. P.G. Harris Jr. also pointed out the local need of a museum, following which Mrs. Grigsby proposed the pur-chase of the McClymont Building on the corner of Oak and First Sts. She stated that Mrs. Jim Kerr, owner of the building, stated that she would sell the building to the county solely for the purpose of a museum, and a lot 50' by 85' for \$5,000.00. The commissioners reported that they would give an answer to the plea at their next regular meeting, giving them an opportunity to look over the project, the building, etc. Mrs. L.G. Hinkle and Mr. and Mrs. Carlton White were also on hand in behalf of the Historical group.

Other official business included the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting, and allowing all the bills presented for payment.

Mrs. Lille Mae Shelton, 75, died in a Del Rio nursing home Sunday night after a long period of failing health. Funeral services were in the First Baptist Church here Wednesday morning with Rev. J. H. 
