LISTEN TO LUKE

Albert:---
Unusual and interesting occurrences have unusual and interesting outcomes sometimes.

The three dogs killing the young deer last week will probably be more of an eye opener than the killing of several sheep by the same or other dogs. And, frankly, we hope that it is some kind of eye opener!

The loss of livestock, domestic and wild, to predators is probably much more than has ever been known. But the loss of sheep in pastures near town to dogs can be closely estimated -- too many!

There is just utterly no sense in people owning (?) dogs that are turned loose on a town to do whatever their animal instincts direct. There has long been the thinking that everyone is entitled to own (?) a dog and not have to be responsible for the actions that dog -- too long there has been this notion!

Where is our sense of fairness? Where is our sense of justice?

If dogs can and do catch a deer, is it unreasonable to presume they can catch a sheep or goat? And if dogs catch sheep, goats, and deer, is it unreasonable to presume that coyotes don't do the same thing?

And speaking of coyotes -- on our way to Odessa Thursday of last week, we saw two coyotes about 4:30 p.m. running and playing (apparently) on the sand dunes north of Imperial, and they crossed the highway twice in front of us. Having just heard about the deer and dog incident, we wondered more and more about the coyotes.

The point always boils down to: A person has the right to have or protect animals, so long as owning (?) or protecting those animals does not interfere with the rights of others.

At least that's the way we look at it!

And that right goes for people who like cats, chickens, horses, or whatever else you want to mention.

People whose yards are invaded by neighbors' dogs, cats, chickens, or other pets, might serve notice that they are taking up raising rattle-snakes and notice the response of their neighbors.

If you own dogs, cats, or chickens, pen them up in your yard and see if you like living with them that closely. Chances are your neighbors have them more than you do!

In case any reader wonders: There are several candidates in the various races of the district and state who have announced with the proper officials to have their names printed on the ballot, but the announcement to the paper has not been accompanied by a check, so there has been little or no mention of the fact. We charge a fee for political announcements and the local candidates have all announced with the paper. It

E.L. (Lee) Davenport ...seeks legislative post

E.L. (Lee) Davenport of Del Rio, has entered the race for representative of Texas' district 70, the post vacated by Hillary Doran, subject to action of the Democratic Primary.

Mr. Davenport was in Sanderson Thursday of last week on a swing of the towns in the district, and stated that his primary purpose in seeking the legislative post was to work intensely for better schools in the state. He stated that the recent information about school financing was one of the primary reasons he was in the race, to try to work where it counted in getting sufficient and adequate financing for public schools of the state.

During the visit to Sanderson, he expressed his decision to visit County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, who is also ex-officio county superintendent; Supt. Carroll B. Card, and high school principal Jim Payne.

He stated that he would appreciate the consideration of the voters of the county in the primary election.

Mr. Davenport has been a school principal 26 years, 13 years as teacher of history and government, and 2 years drivers' education.

He stated that secondary interest would be traffic safety and conservation of natural resources.

Graham Childress Enters Race For Pct. 4 Commissioner

The Times has been authorized to announce the candidacy of Graham Childress for Commissioner of Precinct 4, subject to action of the Democratic Primary on May 4.

Childress is a rancher in Terrell County. He is a 1958 graduate of Rice University, a naval veteran of the Vietnamese conflict, and has ranched in the precinct since 1966. His parents have ranched in Precinct 4 since 1935.

In running for his first elective office, Childress earnestly solicits the support of all voters in Precinct 4 and the good will of all Terrell County residents. If elected, he stated that he would occupy the office with integrity and fairness.

Chandler Reneges In Precinct Race

Clarence Chandler called The Times by telephone last week and stated that he had withdrawn as a candidate in the race for County Commissioner of Precinct 4 in Terrell County.

He stated that his withdrawal was for business reasons and that he appreciated the support that the people in that precinct had given him in the past and that he would fill out the balance of the term he was elected to, but would not seek re-election.

THREE DOGS KILL DEER

Three dogs killed a small deer on the mountain behind the home of Mr. and Mrs. Aubry Harrell last week.

Mrs. Harrell stated that she got out of her car and heard a bleat, then saw three dogs chasing a small deer. She ran toward the house to get help for the deer and the animal ran into a fence, permitting the dogs to litterally tear it to pieces before they could be scared away.

Several shots were fired at the dogs, but so far as is known, they were not hit.

It was surmised that the deer had been chased for quite a while and was unable to jump the fence.

D. D. Callahan Gets Probated Sentence After Nolo Contendere Plea In Court

Dennis Dee Callahan pleaded nolo contendere - no contest - to a charge of assault with intent to murder with malice aforethought Monday in district court here. The defendant had previously waived his right to a jury trial and District Judge George Thurmond found Callahan guilty after examining the evidence. His penalty was set at three years in the state penitentiary.

A plea for a probated sentence was entered and Judge Thurmond probated the sentence for a period of six years.

The charge grew out of an incident on January 18, 1973, at a local beer hall. Augustin Maldonado, who was operating the beer hall on the night of the shooting, was shot in the back after an argument with Callahan. The shooting took place after an argument between the two men, during which Callahan was asked to leave the premises. He did so with the statement that he would return. Callahan did return to the beer hall and was met at the door by Maldonado who asked him to not come in and when he turned his back, he was shot, according to the statement of Sheriff Dalton Hogg at the time.

Montie Wallace, Former Resident, Dies In Stockton

Montie A. Wallace, 83, died Monday in a hospital in Fort Stockton.

Funeral services were Wednesday and burial was in that city.

Wallace was born January 19, 1891, in Travis County and moved to Fort Stockton in 1956 from Terrell County. He had worked on the Downie ranch for many years prior to his retirement. He was married to Fay Moore in 1926 in Fort Stockton, and had served during World War I in the U.S. Army.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Montie A. Wallace Jr. of Arlington, Va.; three sisters; and three grandchildren.

His residence was not included in the precinct he serves in the re-drawing of the precinct lines; and the town residence of Pct. 2 Commissioner Austin Chriesman is in Precinct 3, which may or may not be any kind of a problem.

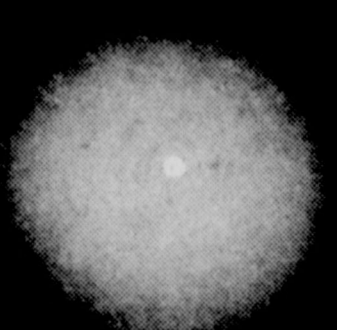

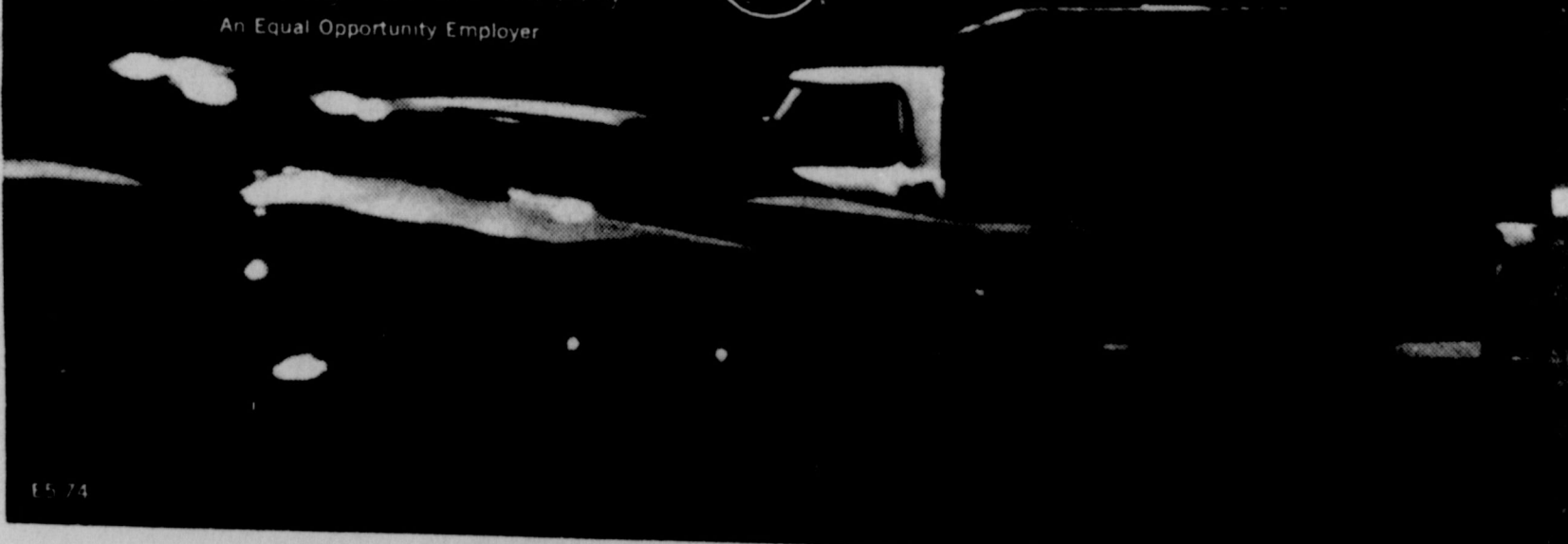

Library 'Friends' Methodist Women Hear Good Reports Meet on Monday From Activities

A set of animal encyclopedias, which had been recently presented to the library by Mr. and Mrs. C.J. 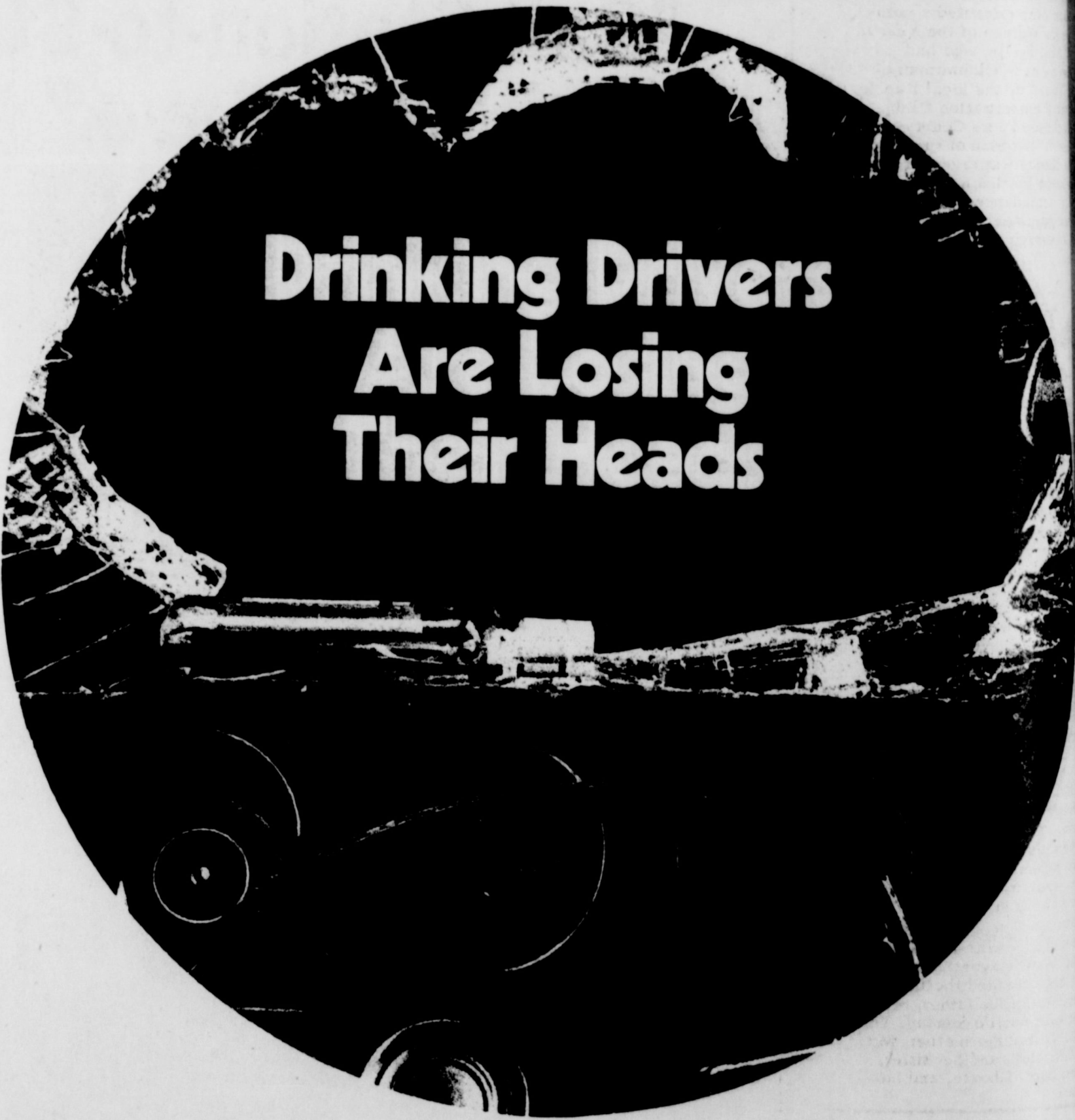

Voter Registration Rules Are Noted

The Times is making a reminder to Terrell County residents to take care of their voter registration before the deadlines for the 1974 primary and general elections.

The last date to register before an election is 30 days before. The first primary will be May 4, the second primary will be June 1, and the general election will be November 5.

There will be a school board election and also an election for directors of the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District #1 in April.

A citizen needs to be a resident in the state and county for 30 days to register to vote.

Any change in address - from one precinct to the other, included - has to be made five days before any election in which you wish to vote.

Any person who registered for the 1972 voting year does not have to re-register for 1974 elections, as long as he remains in the same county and is not convicted of a felony, nor declared mentally incompetent.

Those registrations are still valid, even if the voter failed to vote in the primary or general election in 1972. Any person who voted in the May primary, the June run-off, or the November general election in 1972 will have his registration extended for one additional voting year.

For persons who did not register in 1972, or for new residents of the county, any application received after January 31, 1973, will receive a "B series" registration certificate which will be effective as of March 1, 1973. The certificates will be valid for the 1973, 1974, and 1975 voting years.

Toll-Free Calls For IRS Info

You can now telephone the Internal Revenue Service toll free for tax information. The number is 800-252-1000 for residents in the southern half of Texas.

Announcing the new service, IRS District Director Richard J. Stakem Jr. said "it means that a person can now pick up a telephone and call us for information without having to pay a long distance charge."

Previously, free telephone service was available only to residents in cities with IRS offices. And, taxpayers living in Austin, El Paso, Houston, and San Antonio will continue to call their local offices for tax assistance.

The new telephone system will be in operation during regular office hours, 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on weekdays.

"A specially-trained taxpayer assistance staff will handle the calls, as well as aid taxpayers who come in to our offices with tax questions too complex to work out over the phone," Stakem pointed out.

He added that if you forget the toll free number, you can find it on the inside front cover of the tax forms package that you receive through the mail.
