Mr. Davenport was in Sanderson Thursday of last week on a swing of the towns in the district, and stated that his primary purpose in seeking the legislative post was to work intensely for better schools in the state. He stated that the recent information about school financing was one of the primary reasons he was in the race, to try to work where it counted in getting sufficient and adequate financing for public schools of the state.

During the visit to Sanderson, he expressed his deeision to visit County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, who is also exofficio county superintendent; Supt. Carroll B. Card, and high school principal Jim Payne.

He stated that he would appreciate the consideration of the voters of the county in the primary election.

Mr. Davenport has been a school principal 26 years, 13 years as teacher of history and government, and 2 years drivers' education.



Voter Registration Rules Are Noted

The Times is making a reminder to Terrell County residents to take care of their voter registration before the deadlines for the 1974 pri- . mary and general elections.

The last date to register before an election is 30 days before. The first primary will be May 4, the second primary will be June 1, and the general election will be November

There will be a school board election and also an election for directors of the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District #1 in April.

A citizen needs to be a resident in the state and county for 30 days to register to vote.

Any change in address from one precinct to the other, included - has to be made five days before any election in which you wish to

Any person who registered for the 1972 voting year does not have to re-register for 1974 elections, as long as he * remains in the same county and is not convicted of a felony, nor declared mentally imcompetent.

Those registrations are still valid, even if the voter failed to vote in the primary or general election in 1972. Any person who voted in the May primary, the June run-off, or the November general election in 1972 will have his registration extended for one additional voting year.

For persons who did not register in 1972, or for new residents of the county, any application received after January 31, 1973, will receive a "B series" registration certificate which will be effective as of March 1, 1973. The certificates will be valid for the 1973, 1974, and 1975 voting years.

Toll-Free Calls For IRS Info

You can now telephone the Internal Revenue Service toll free for tax information. The number is 800-252-1000 for residents in the southern half of Texas.

Announcing the new service, IRS District Director Richard J. Stakem Jr. said "it means that a person can now pick up a telephone and call us for information without having to pay a long distance charge."

Previously, free telephone service was available only to residents in cities with IRS offices. And, taxpayers living in Austin, El Paso, Houston, ar and San Antonio will continue to call their local offices for tax assistance.

The new telephone system will be in operation during regular office hours, 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on week-

"A specially-trained taxpayer assistance staff will handle the calls, as well as aid taxpayers who come in to our offices with tax questions too complex to work out over the phone," Stakem pointed out. He added that if you forget

the toll free number, you can find it on the inside front cover of the tax forms package that you receive through the mail.
