week, according to Mrs. A.J. Hahn, deputy tax assessorcollector.
The most important item on the card was the precinct number, since precinct lines

al card to check their address Each voter should be sure

Voting strength is heaviest in precinct 3, according to figures released by Nirs. A. Hahn last week. Mrs. Mahn, deputy tax assessor-collector lists of qualified voters in the county and released the figures to The Times. She said that there would be a few changes in the total figures, as there had been some resi dence changes of qualified voters, but she thought the chang

In Precinct 1 , there are 430 residents and 273 qualified voters; Precinct 2, 436 residents and 198 voters; Precinct 3, 424 residents and 356 voters; Precinct 4, 415 residents and 237 voters. Precinct 1 probably has the
smallest number of voters smallest number of voters outsince it takes in only the southwesternmost part of the county from about 12 miles east of Sanderson and directly south to the river. Precinct 3 probably is second in lowest number of residents outside 2 as third-lowest, and Pre cinct 4 heaviest out-of-Sandersun population.
If the registered voter figures are subtracted from the total population figures in each precinct, then the remainder is the total of nonqualified voter - including children and unregistered res 08 , and 178 in each of the four precincts respectively.
