If they were the governing body of an incorporated Sanderson, they would have these problems of sanitation
and street maintenance with some kind of limitation on available funds, and they als would have other obligations and duties they do not now have. But the ir duties would be restricted to the boundarles of the incorporated town,
rather than the boundaries of the county. And their duties and obligations would also have legal bounds beyond which they should not pass either willingly or from pres sure of any group or individual. Their governing of an in corporated town would not be ments, which might legadvantage.
