Somewhere there should be some more definite rules and laws to back them up, rather than opening each election to any aspirant who is not contested by a costly and trying court settlement.

Maybe from all of this, such a clear-cut decision will come. We hope so!

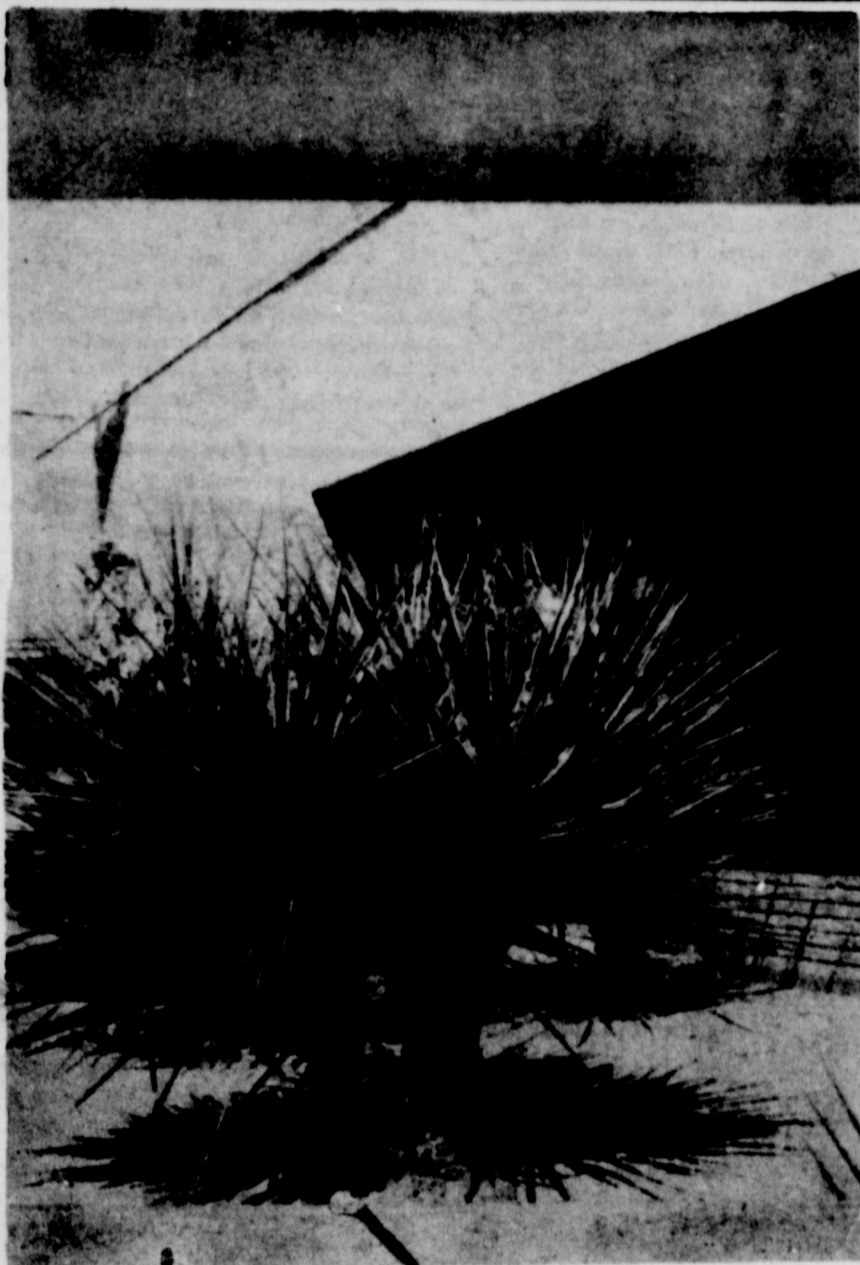
Another question posed last week was: "Where is the school going to get additional tax money?" Simple! It will come from the taxpayers!-Some or all of them!

The school board names a board of equalization that has the authority to adjust and equalize taxes. If there are no adjustments or equalization coming from that group, then the board either raises the tax rate or evaluations to supply the needs for operating the schools after the approving of the budget for next year.

Additional properties that may have been eligible for taxation and addition to the tax roll would raise some additional tax revenue, depending on the value of the items added to the tax roll.

The directors of the water control and improvement district have named Carlton White as election judge, and clerks will be Mrs. Jack Laughlin and Mrs. Cruz Marquez Sr.

The terms of three incumbent directors - Greene Cooke, Mark W. Duncan, and James Caroline - expires at this time and all three have announced for re-election.

Barton Massey has filed for election to the post of director of the water control and improvement district.

Polling Places Clarified For Voters In School Election

Several questions from readers about polling places for the school election indicate some confusion on the part of voters from the wording of the election notice published last week.

Residents of Sanderson will vote at the courthouse, residents of what was formerly Precincts 2, 3, and 4, prior to redistricting the county, will vote in the designated places: Dryden Methodist Church, Herman Couch ranch house, and recreation hall at the El Paso Natural Gas Co. plant.

The voting precincts designated by the school board have nothing to do with the precincts designated by the commissioners for purposes of equal division of the population of the county.

Wildcat Marked On Harkins Ranch

Chevron Oil Co. will drill a 24,000-foot wildcat in Terrell County, 30 miles north-east of Sanderson as the No. 1 Sid Harkins-State. Location is 2,080 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 13-602-Robert Belcher.

More specifically, the well will be about 1-mile east of the Harkins ranch house.

Commissioners' Actions Noted

Several visitors appeared at the meeting of the Terrell County Commissioners Monday morning when the group met at the courthouse at 9:00 a.m.

County Judge R.S. Wilkinson told the commissioners about the receipt of a 10-year plan submitted by the Texas Highway Department, giving some details of the plan and of that group's asking for a resolution by the commissioners approving their plan. The plan was approved.

The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved, including the called meeting on February 18.

Mrs. Irvin Robbins appeared before the court and asked for labor for the construction of curbs around an area adjacent to the Terrell County Public Library so that grass and other greenery could be planted, explaining that the "Friends of the Terrell County Library" would pay for the materials. Approval was given the request.

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Gas Flows From Terrell County Well

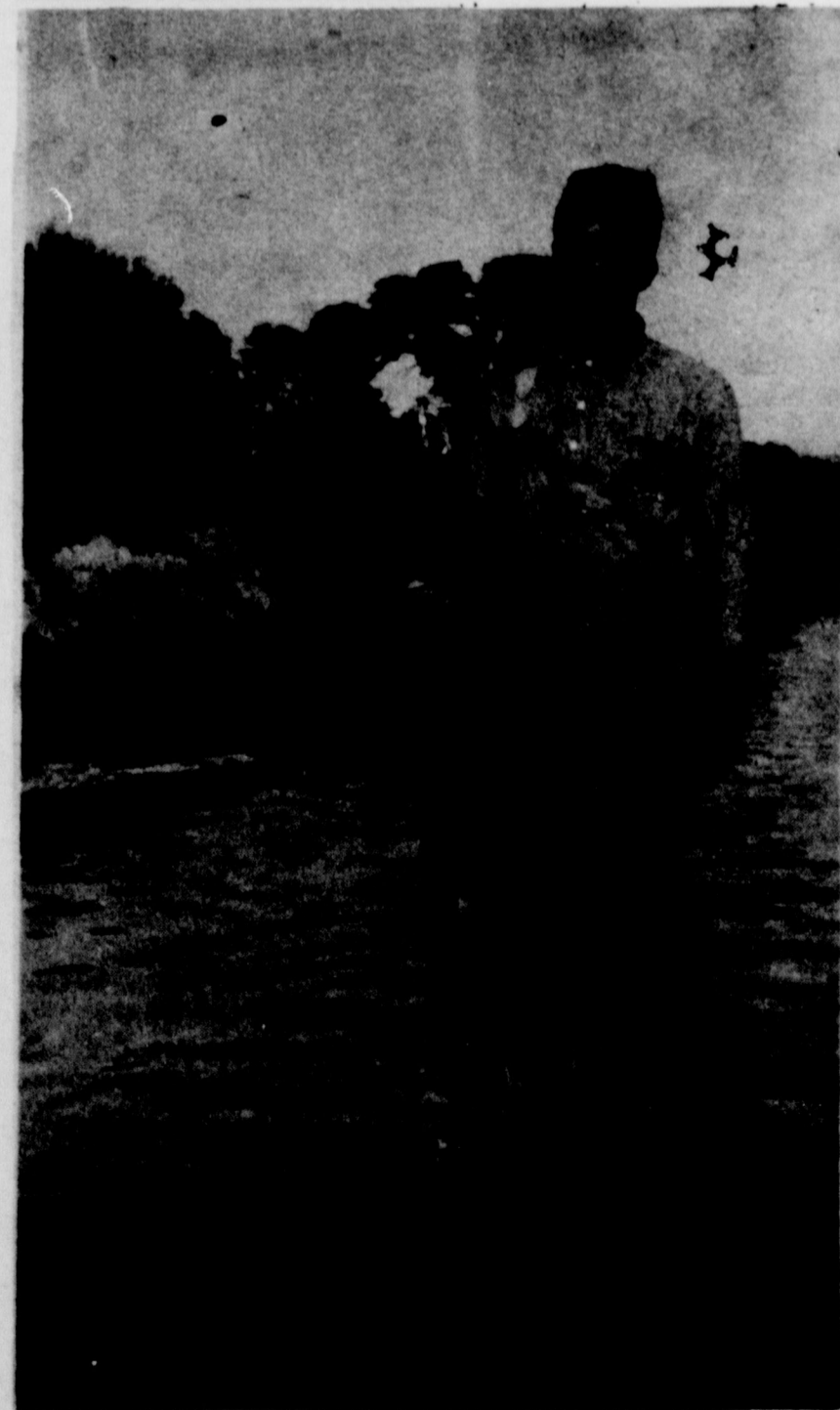
Skelly Oil Co., Midland, No. 1-18 Culbertson, in Section 18, Block 2, CCSD&RG NG Survey in Terrell County, a 16,200-foot wildcat 27 miles southwest of Sheffield, flowed gas at the rate of 112,000 cubic feet daily and recovered 368 feet of slight gas cut mud on a drillstem test in the Wolfcamp.

Gas surfaced in five minutes, flowing at the above rate, on the one-hour and 40-minute test at 9,350-9,412 feet. Flowing pressure was 130-62 pounds; one-hour initial shut-in pressure, 2,304 pounds; and 180-minute final shut-in pressure was 3,055 pounds.

Drilling continued below 9,785 feet.

Currently, the school district uses a fraction of 24.5% as the basis for figuring the taxed valuation, according to our understanding. Thus, if your house has a value of \$10,000.00, it is taxed on the value of \$2,450.00. The county uses the fraction 10%, according to our understanding.

The school tax rate currently is \$1.65 per \$100 valuation, \$1.35 being for local maintenance, and 30¢ for interest and sinking fund.

Back to the boards of equalization: the county commissioners sit as a board of equalization for county taxes and the school board appoints a board of equalization. Last year Dudley Harrison, Troy Druse, and Jack Hardgrave sat as this group.

and payment and they were approved - with the exception of two that had to be checked - and payment was authorized.

The commissioners agreed to invest \$80,000 of the Permanent School Fund in a manner approved by the National Bank of Commerce of San Antonio and Jack Hayre was authorized to contact that institution for a recommendation.

H.M. Petty appeared before the group and asked the court consider paving certain streets in the Lomita Terrace Addition. After some discussion about this project and the seal-coating of other local streets, it was decided to get figures on the amount of streets involved, bids or estimates on finishing and seal-coating and plan to complete the project if at all possible. It was pointed out that the property owners of Sanderson paid for one-half of the cost of surfacing the streets in front of their property and this would be the basis for consideration of surfacing the streets in that addition to the town. The commissioners decided to get together and inspect the local streets for a decision on possible costs.

The court passed a motion to ask for bids for the feeding of people in the local jail.

Judge Wilkinson was authorized to contact postal officials concerning the rumored cancellation of mail truck service from San Antonio beyond Dryden this way.

County Attorney Jack Hayre asked permission to hire part-time stenographic help in the project of securing easements for the flood control project and the amount of \$3.25 per hour was approved for part-time help.

LEGAL NOTICE

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas, before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.

Seal Coat Planned On Area Highways

A contract for seal coat work on 339.9 miles of highways in the Odessa district was awarded by the Texas Highway Commission during its February meeting in Austin.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer Paul H. Coleman.

Jones Bros. Dirt & Paving Contractors, Inc., Odessa, was awarded the contract with a low bid of \$1,328,847.99. The work will take an estimated 100 working days to complete.

The project includes: 4.213 miles on US 90 from 3 miles west of Sanderson to Sanderson Creek in Sanderson and for 17.368 miles from .6-mile west of Mofeta to 10 miles east of Dryden.
