SSI Program Gives More Aid To Needy Folk
Beginning in January 1974, the federal government in Security Income (SSI) proecurity income (SSI) proment to people in financial need who are 65 or older, or blind, or disabled. In an ef fort to locate and inform eligible persons, a short-term utreach project called SSiAlert has been initiated unernor's Committee on Aging. for enroll No fee is charged for enrollment in the income program, coordinator of SSI-Alert. Eliibility is determined according to Federal guidelines by he Social Security Administration.
In general, these benefits can be paid to people whose ncome is below $\$ 160$ for a single person or $\$ 230$ for a couple, if this income comes from Social Security, retirelow $\$ 365$ for a single person or $\$ 505$ for a couple, if this ncome is from wages, salares, or self-employment income.
This means that even per sons who already receive Social Security can receive Sup plemental Security Income, ial Secirity tax money. In addition, those who qualify for SSI are automatically eli-
gible to receive Medicaid payments for medical care. The first SSI payments were made in Jancary 1974. These are the new gold-colored made immediately inould be begin receiving payments soon as possible. Under no oon as possible. Under no wishing to apply for SSI bene fits pay a fee to anyone for this service. If any person at empts to charge a fee, the pplicant should refuse to $p$ t and should report the incident to the local SSI-Alert In Terrell County. revived again this week by a revived again this week by
reader pointing out specifically another article in the book of Texas Election Laws. The Times previously printed the article on "residence requirements" from the Texas Election Law book for the information of readers. This ar ticle is printed for the same
purpose: so that readers may purpose: so that readers may make up their minds or get an interpretation from someone more qualified.
"Article 1.05. Ineligibility. "No person shall be eligible to be a candidate for, or to any public office in this state unless he is a citizen of the United States eligible to hold such office under the Constitution and laws of this state and is under none of the disabilities for voting which are
stated in Article VI, Section 1 of the Constitution Section as on the date of his appointment or of the election at which he is elected, and unless he will have resided in this state for a period of twelve months next preceding the applicable date specified below, and for any pubstatewide, shall have resided for six months next preceding such date in the district, county, precinct, municipaliy or other political subdivision for which the office is to e filled:
"(1) For a candidate whose name is printed on the ballot election, the applicable date is the last day on which any candidate for the office involved could file his applicaion to have his name printed on the ballot for that primary li(2) For
nonpart isan candidate in o general or special election the applicable date is the last
day on which the candidate's day on which the candidate's application for a place on the allot could be delivered to ceiving the application.
