## How You Look At It!

When we had a chance to get out of town following the ash flood which hit Sanderson last week, we found some startling damage to some of the range land to the west. Up to seven inches of moisture was reported to have fallen to the west, washing out large ditches, tearing down several miles of fence, washing out large portions of the earthen dike that protects the highway and railroad on the Eaton ranch west of town, and damage also to the highway in several places. Some livestock was seen dead and lodged in fences and trees or brush. Estimates are that much more stock was lost than was visible at first. One of the most startling sights was the damage done by hail on the Frank Warren ranch west of Longfellow. The hail was reported to be no larger than golf balls, but mostly large marble size, according to reports. The damage was as though a huge blow-torch had passed over the area, leaving not one sign of live growth - only stalks of plants. Spanish daggers and prickly pear were shredded and bark knocked off the side of cedar posts. It was not a pretty sight, regardless of how you look at it.

Sanderson youths brought further recognition to our town and county in their win of state championships: Gaye TenEyck in journalism headline writing, and Ricky Marquez in the mile run. There was no discredit to anyone or any place in the performance of Bill Mott in the discus. He just didn't get it all put together at the right time.

## Gas Discovery In County Finaled

CGK Petroleum Inc., Midland, No. 1 Keith Mitchell, Terrell County Wolfcamp gas discovery, 22 miles southwest of Sheffield, 1/2 mile west of the one-well KM (Ellenburger gas) field on one mile south and slightly east of the one-well Little Canyon (10,000 Strawn gas) field, was finaled for a calculated, absolute open flow of 16,189,000 cubic feet of gas per day. Production was through perforations at 9,185-668 feet, which acidized with 4,000 gallons. Drilled to 9,733 feet, operator ran 4-1/2-inch liner from 3,832 feet to total depth and plugged back to 9,690 feet. Location is 990 feet from the north and east lines of section 12, Block 1, CCSDE RGNG Survey. The KM opener, Amoco Production Co. No. 1 Mitchell, was finaled November 27, 1967, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 53.6 million cubic feet of gas daily from open hole at 17,410-18,644 feet. It flowed gas for 16 hours at the rate of 2.7 million cubic feet daily when drilling reached 9,365 feet.

## Voting Strength Of County Shown In Saturday Turn-Out

Voting statistics are given in detail in The Times this week showing a breakdown of votes in the absentee box, and in the precincts after the division of the county into new precincts.

There were 310 votes tabulated in the absentee box, with the greatest number of absentee ballots coming from precinct 3.

Almost 800 ballots were cast with the greatest number of votes cast in the race for County Judge of Terrell County, with the County Clerk's race and the pari-mutuel referendum vieing for second-place honors in vote-getting.

Locally, there will be a run-off apparently in the race for the county clerk's post between incumbent Ruel Adams and Mrs. H.M. Petty, and another run-off looks probable in the job of Democratic Chairman in Precinct 4. W.C. Baker, who is employed at the El Paso Natural Gas Co. plant in eastern Terrell County got 33 votes and Mrs. George Escobar, bookkeeper at Kerr Mercantile, received 29 votes, with seven single votes among as many people written in for that post.

Not listed in the unofficial returns published in the paper this week are a few single votes received for people in the county Democratic Chairman's write-in space. These votes had no bearing on the outcome as there were less than 10 write-ins for that office.

Write-in votes were allowed only in the Democratic chair-

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We read some articles about Special Watergate prosecutor Leon Jaworski last week and we would like to try to express some of the ideas he has expressed by quoting from the source we read.

"We have failed to impress upon the very young how the law functions to protect individual rights - how it provides for orderly, democratic change; what the difference is between dissent and violent protest; why individual rights must be balanced with individual responsibility to the total society.

"The old truth remains, you see, that you cannot achieve good by evil means. Apparently nothing is so difficult to understand in our present society.

"The tired old excuse is still that the end justifies the means. It has always been wrong. It is wrong still."

And he quoted Lincoln on the law: "Let it be taught in the schools, in seminaries and in colleges; let it be written in primers and in almanacs; let it be preached from the pulpit, proclaimed in legislative halls, and enforced in courts of justice. In short, let it become the political religion of the nation."

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**Dedication Of Local Church Sunday By Bishop O. E. Slater**

The El Buen Pastor Methodist Church of Sanderson was dedicated Sunday morning with a special service by Bishop O. Eugene Slater of San Antonio.

Invitations had been sent to former members now residing elsewhere and a cordial invitation had been issued through the press to everyone in the community to attend. A large crowd had gathered in the sanctuary when the service began at 10:30 a.m. Mrs. Cruz Marquez, organist, played a medley of old hymns of the church as the congregation assembled.

After "He" had been played by Mrs. Marquez as a prelude, Rev. Luis G. Gomez of El Paso, district superintendent of the Rio Grande Conference, extended the welcome and gave the invocation. Special music was provided by the choir of the First Presbyterian Church with Mrs. J.L. Whistler as director and Mrs. R.S. Wilkinson as organist. She also played the accompaniment for the special number by the choir of the First United Methodist Church.

Mrs. Gus Flores Sr., a longtime member of the church, gave a history of the building of the church in Spanish and Mrs. A.H. Zuberbueler gave the same history in English. The old adobe church building on the corner, which has a State Historical Survey Marker, after being in use for 60 years, finally outgrew its usefulness and during the pastorate of Rev. Noe Montez, funds were made available in 1959 from the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church and through contributions from local friends to build a new church. Many problems arose and the decision was made to invest the money in a house to rent to make more money. The flood of 1965 caused considerable damage to the house and so the congregation with Rev. Moises Yanez, now of El Paso, as pastor, decided in March of 1966 to proceed again with plans for a new church building. The lots were bought two years later and on April 7, 1968, a ground-breaking ceremony was held. The late O.J. Cresswell was the contractor for the building which was completed on October 3 of the same year and it began to be used after a special service on November 10, 1968. Rev. Amado Elias, the present pastor, provided the leadership for the reduction of the debt owed to the Board of Missions and the rent house was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Dudley Harrison, making it possible

to pay the church debt and, from the balance on hand, to make some repairs to the parsonage next door, provide a folding door for the sanctuary, and carpet for the altar and aisles of the church.

The congregation joined in singing hymns, with Mrs. Jesus Marquez as organist, and giving responsive readings after the introduction of the visiting ministers and their wives. Juan Salazar sang "How Great Thou Art" as a solo with Mrs. J.M. Davis playing organ accompaniment.

Dr. Slater used the subject "Ye Are God's People" for the sermon preceding the dedication rites.

Arrangements of flowers and potted plants in bloom, con-

tributed for the occasion, decorated the church.

Attention was called to the new baptismal fount made by Samuel Zepeda of San Antonio and presented as a memorial to his late parents, Mr. and Mrs. Juan Zepeda Sr., of Sanderson.

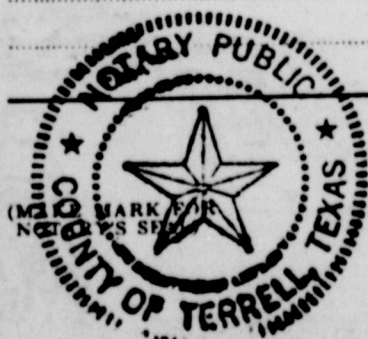

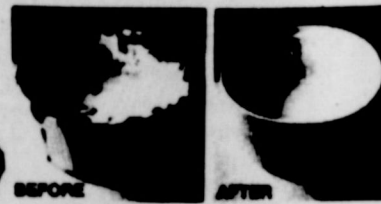
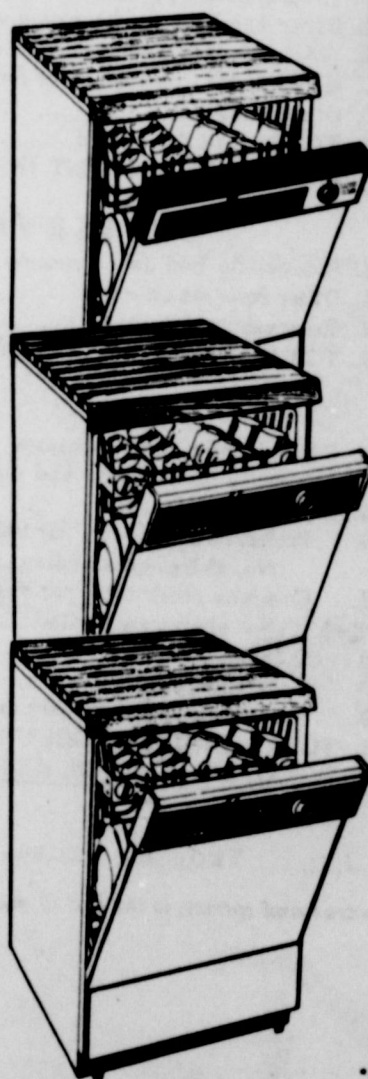

## Border Patrol's 50th Anniversary Marked May 28

The United States Border Patrol will celebrate its Golden Anniversary May 28, 1974. Composed from the very best of hard-working and dedicated officers enforcing unpopular laws, the Border Patrol has fought an uphill battle all the way to insure each American citizen and legal resident alien the right to economic security, and the right to be free from undesirable alien forces that could sweep the boundaries that demarcate the greatest nation on earth.

The Times was furnished with a detailed and interesting history of the organization and photographs of some earlier-day activities of the organization, all of which is far too lengthy for publication.

The history includes the fact that beginning in 1880, laws were passed to exclude alien contract labor and later became the chief concern of immigration legislation.

The Act of March 3, 1903, among other things, created a professional Immigration Officer and gave the position Civil Service status.

The history continues: "In 1911, a report to Congress by an Immigration Commission showed that contract labor abuses continued, and would do so until concentrated drives were made against perpetrators of the abuses, i.e., the employers in this country and the transportation companies that brought the illegal laborers to the American ports. The report called for laws with real force to them, and for quota limitations on immigration. On May 28, 1924, Congress created the Border Patrol, the uniformed enforcement branch of the immigration service in an effort to prevent the escalating entry of aliens illegally into the United States as legislation increasingly made it more difficult for undesirable to enter legally."

"The 1968 and 1973 Annual Report, Immigration and Naturalization Service, on page 93 and 91, respectively, show the importance of the Patrol in combatting the flow of narcotics into the United States over the past 15 years. From 1959 through 1963, the Patrol was instrumental in seizing \$248,720 worth of narcotics. The next five year period (1964-1968) ended with the seizure of \$3,424,493

## Mental Illness Funds Sought

Citizen volunteers will be going door to door in Sanderson from May 4-31 asking for a contribution in the fight against Texas' #1 health problem - mental illness. The drive is sponsored by the Texas Association for Mental Health.

TAMH is a volunteer organization working to improve the quality of mental health services in Texas. In 1957, the association successfully worked for the passage of the community mental health center law. This law has resulted in the development of mental health centers which provide treatment, consultation, and research in a community based setting throughout Texas.

The association has also had a direct role in updating laws to protect the rights of the mentally ill, in obtaining the money necessary to provide treatment for emotionally disturbed children, and in providing referral services for those in need.

This year, the association is placing special emphasis on the needs of children and youth and upon the continued transfer of mental health service from the state hospital to facilities in the community.

The Mental Health Association receives no public funds. Its income is derived from community drives throughout the state.

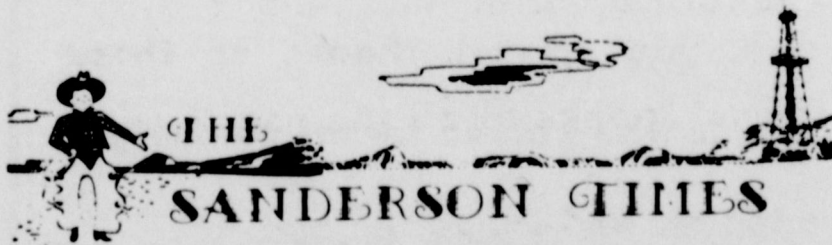
